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A Six Game Season... Thank You Cleveland

Not for blowing a three games-to-one lead in the World Series to save the city of Pittsburgh from agonizing over their little, hapless brother laying claim to the "City of Champions" moniker. No. While that was nice, it wasn't what warranted these thanks.

Edging further onto the ledge, Steelers fandom needed something to draw it back away from the lure of jumping off one of the many bridges connecting the banks of the three rivers running through the region. Something to slow the skid that had dragged the team and its fans through the mud for most of October and November.


Thank you, Cleveland, for being who we thought you were and standing tall as the NFL punching bag that you are, allowing the Steelers to regain a sense of normalcy after losing four games in a row. Heading into Week 11, the Blitzburgh label had long since been removed from a defense starving for sacks and third down stops. Dead last in the NFL with just a baker's dozen worth of quarterback takedowns, Defensive Coordinator Keith Butler's crew erupted for eight sacks in Cleveland, including a special milestone for a Steeler great, James Harrison.

Named a starter during the week leading up to the Browns

game, the 38-year old linebacker became the franchise's sack leader after notching one to give him 77 and a half for his Steelers career, passing Jason Gildon. While a win against winless Cleveland doesn't necessarily do anything








The Steelers began the season winning four out of five games, stuffing the run and lighting up the scoreboard. In the four losses since, the rushing defense fell to 16th in the NFL, allowing 102.7 yards per game. On a blustery Sunday on the shores of Lake Erie, just 33 yards were gained on the ground as the Steelers reasserted themselves in the shadow of Cameron Heyward's move to injured reserve, under a code red on their season.

Whether or not this win will build confidence in a team that began to question itself inwardly and outwardly in the media is yet to be seen, however a loss would have been disastrous. Making that 132-mile trek back from Cleveland, Steelers players and fans – those who braved the conditions – can gain a little perspective on the 42-day span between








wins and find some mental footing for considering a late season run.

A trio of losses came against division leaders New England, Baltimore and Dallas. No shame in losing to the Ravens on the road, the Steelers haven't won there since 2012 and haven't swept their rivals since 2008. The Patriots and Cowboys have the two best records in the NFL. And the team that kicked off this streak of misery – the Miami Dolphins –








have won five in a row. If you are the rationalizing type, you can go to town with that and feel good that the black and gold took care of business against the orange and brown.

Approaching Thanksgiving, Pittsburgh sits at 5-5, tied atop the AFC North with Baltimore and faces just one team with a record over .500 the rest of the season, the New York Giants (7-3) at home. They play each team in their division once more, plus Indianapolis and Buffalo (both 5-5).

The Ravens are 2-3 in their last five games and have a somewhat tougher schedule. On paper, at least. They also have one more game against each division team, but take on Miami (6-4) and Philadelphia (5-5), with a trip to New England looming.

With Cincinnati at three wins and superstar wide receiver A.J. Green suffering a torn hamstring, the AFC North is a twoteam race in what has become a six-game season to decide the division winner and play beyond New Year's Day.

Movie Reviews

NIGHTWIRE - FILM REVIEWS by FIORE

DOCTOR STRANGE

The current cinema craze for superheroes is bringing many to the big screen who should truly stay on the inked page. This is the situation with DOCTOR STRANGE. It is a film totally dependent on its own special effects, wasting the talents of top cast and crew members. Director Scott Derrickson pilots a venture into mysticism and magic with convoluted visual effects and a mere mundane plot.

Dr. Stephen Strange is a brilliant surgeon. Like most brilliant surgeons, he is arrogant, egotistical and self-centered. A car accident deprives him of the use of his hands. Numerous operations fail and in an act of total desperation, he seeks to return to his previous glory through magic and mysticism. This template is standard fare in the world of superheroes. Yet, while watching DOCTOR STRANGE, I had a strange (pardon the word usage) deja-vu experience. Then it occurred to me this script, penned by Jon Spaihts, Scott Derrickson and C. Robert Cargill is basically the same story in Ryan Reynold's GREEN LANTERN; a film many comic fanboys despised, but I enjoyed. Even the evil presence from the Dark World bears a striking resemblance to Parallax.

Benedict Cumberbatch plays Dr. Stephen Strange. It is not his best performance, with the script partially to blame. One can





easily see he is trying his best in key scenes, but the transition from ego-centered surgeon to alternate universe warrior is haphazard.

Tilda Swinton is the Ancient One, an all-powerful mystic who recruits Strange. Swinton is a chameleon actress, changing her look into bizarre caricatures with every outing. Here, she does her best impression of Master Po. While she attempts to bring gravitas to the endeavor, she is stilted by The Ancient One's insistence of repeating the same mantras, as if somehow, they will gain more meaning.

Much more comfortable in their roles are Benedict Wong, as Wong (really, I couldn't make that up), Chiwetel Ejiofor as Mordo and Mads Mikkelsen as Kaecillius. They have embraced the absurdity of this superhero tale and seem to be reveling in its milieu.

Behind the camera, kudos abound for Production Designer Charles Wood. Folding realities upon one another is no easy feat, and in 3D IMAX it does look spectacular. Of course, Director of Photography Ben Davis is complacent in this look. It is his use of cant camera angles and arc camera movements that allow worlds to collapse on one another.

DOCTOR STRANGE is not a bad movie, but like its main character, it suffers from an identity complex. It is not as serious as the CAPTAIN AMERICA series, and not as humorous as the GUARDIANS OF THE GALAXY, even though it tries to be both. The computer geeks rule this film, and it didn't have to

be so. There is enough talent here that story and character development would have been more entertaining.

THE GRADE FOR DOCTOR STRANGE = C

HACKSAW RIDGE

HACKSAW RIDGE is proof positive Mel Gibson is a most excellent filmmaker. It is, without question, one of the best films of the year. HACKSAW RIDGE is the tale of Desmond Doss, the only man to ever be awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for heroic deeds while maintaining his strong religious beliefs, and never lifting a gun, during WWII. Gruesome war scenes broke a glass ceiling with Tom Hank's SAVING PRIVATE RYAN; but the battles in HACKSAW RIDGE reach a new level of brutality. Production Designer Barry Robison unleashes war's hell with no veiled sensitivities, making Doss' deeds even more astounding.

Gibson orchestrates HACKSAW RIDGE masterfully. The film is easily divided in two; the second half concentrating on the battle and Doss' attempts to save his ravaged battalion. The first half establishes the characters and Doss' internal conflict of wanting to help with the war effort, while still remaining true to his personal and religious beliefs. This first section could easily have dawdled the film, but screenwriter Andrew Knight fills it with downhome humor, providing laughs and chuckles as a set-up for the horrors to come.





Starring with Andrew Garfield are Teresa Palmer, as Dorothy Schutte, Doss' love interest; Vince Vaughn as Sergeant Howell; Sam Worthington as Captain Glover; and Hugo Weaving as Tom Doss, Desmond's father. Weaving's performance is especially noteworthy.


Topping off the excellent cast is a rousing score by Rupert Gregson-Williams. There is a special thank you note to James Horner, music writer extraordinaire as it is apparent Williams patterned his music after the legendary composer. Simon Duggan, a stalwart in cinematography, provides exemplary work in HACKSAW RIDGE, especially during the battle. His use of camera angles is exceptional on the stretcher scene; strong enough to earn one of the key scene spots in this review.

Gibson, still demonstrating distain for the Hollywood elite and the machine they run, crafts a fine film, returning to his homeland of Australia for the film's production and incorporating a few family members into the cast and crew, to create a truly fine American film. Don't miss this one. See it on the big screen. It is that good.

THE GRADE FOR HACKSAW RIDGE = A

THE TAKE

One could easily have the impression the only decent French action films involve long sequences of par quor and Luc Besson. THE TAKE provides a more eclectic response. Director James Watkins sits atop a very fast-paced and intriguing action flick, easily keeping par with any of Besson's work. The film has fight sequences, car chases, plot twists, innocent victims forced to act heroically and a rogue agent who proves to be a oneman army. Good stuff for an action film.



Richard Madden plays Mike Mason. Mike is a kingpin pick-pocket. His style and precision in sleight of hand thievery is unheralded. He does not have a comfortable home life, however, so he moves to Paris to practice his trade. He is doing quite well for himself, until he makes the fatal mistake of lifting a handbag from Zoe. Zoe is played by French actress Charlotte Le Bon. Zoe is a leftwing activist who wants revolution, but doesn't want anyone to be hurt while revolting. When Zoe realizes the bomb she is carrying might actually kill people, she backs out of the deal. Before she can toss the bomb, hidden in a teddy bear, into the river, Mike comes along and steals the handbag. He takes the money, cell phone and discards the bag outside of an apartment building, when the bomb explodes, killing four people. Unfortunately for Mike,

surveillance cameras capture his visage and he is soon labelled a terrorist and becomes the subject of a massive manhunt.

Laren Dacre, played by Kelly Reilly is head of American Intelligence in France. When it is discovered Mike, an American, may be a bomb terrorist, she initiates her own investigation.

Her point man is field agent Sean Briar, played by Idris Elba. It's not long before Briar discovers Mike is not a terrorist, and Zoe is not a criminal jihadist. Now he must prove their innocence and capture the real bad guys before Paris is thrown into flames from riotous mobs. To do this, he must avoid Victor Gamieux, played by Jose Garcia, the head of France's Homeland Security and antagonist Rafi Bertrand, played by Thierry Godard. Acting for THE TAKE is superb for an action film, even for audiences who may not be familiar with the French stars.

Director of Photography Tim Maurice-Jones who is best known for his work on Guy Ritchie's LOCK, STOCK AND TWO SMOKING BARRELS, provides complimentary shots of Paris. His camera angles on the fight sequences are suspect, as they highlight not the fight itself, but rather large swinging limb movements.

All told, THE TAKE is a respectable action yarn with predictable, yet enjoyable plot twists. Fans of the genre will be happy.

A great way to not only survive winter, but learn to love it is to check out all the seasonal offerings from your favorite breweries. From stouts to hoppy IPAs, to the titular winter warmers...there's a lot to love in the world of craft beer when the temperature drops.

Anderson Valley

Kicking off our alphabetical list is Anderson Valley Brewing Company. Founded in 1987, Anderson Valley has grown into a varied and respected brewery that produces everything from the tried and true styles to the wild and interesting Gose





series. Continuing their annual tradition, this winter AVBC is again releasing Winter Solstice, their take on the classic winter warmer style. At 6.9% ABV, this beer pours a translucent copper with a thick and creamy head. Expect to taste sweet malt and caramel as well as some nutty tastes in the background.

Bell's Brewery

Bell's Brewery is no stranger to seasonal beers, and their everpopular Winter White Ale is making a comeback once again this year. An odd entry into our list, this beer is a wheat ale fermented with Belgian yeast to give it subtle banana and clove flavors with absolutely no spices added, and at 5% ABV it's very easy to drink and very refreshing.

When it comes to big winter beers, it's hard to beat the Russian Imperial Stout. These big, intense beers were once favorited by the Russian Tsars, but today you don't have to be Russian to fall in love with the big kids on the stout block. Bell's brews their Expedition Stout to have a huge malt body that features complex flavors including chocolate, dark fruit, and sweet malt that coincide nicely with American hops. Great as a fresh beer,







Expedition Stout is brewed to age with the best of them, with a 16-year old vintage winning a Great American Beer Festival gold medal in 2011.

Dogfish Head Craft Brewery

Hailing from Milton, Delaware is none other than Dogfish Head Craft Brewery. Known for their weird and wild beers that always seem to work surprisingly well, their love of collaboration could be argued as second to none, too.

A great example of this love of collaboration paired with a penchant for experimentation is their Pennsylvania Tuxedo. This 8.5% ABV beer is a pale ale that's brewed with Pennsylvania spruce tips, and is a homage to the flannel-suited hunters that fill the woods of north-central Pennsylvania. Brewed in partnership with Woolrich clothing company, the beer features a grassy citrus kick with undertones of spruce, the source of which were hand-picked by Dogfish Head themselves.

Who says you can't have a beer for breakfast? Dogfish Head decided to take the idea of the breakfast stout to the

next level with their Beer For Breakfast Stout. Originally released in 2014, this beer features a little of everything that makes breakfast great, including Guatemalan Antigua cold press coffee, maple syrup, and Rapa Scrapple. Add to this Applewood-smoked barley, flaked oats, molasses, milk sugars, brown sugar, and roasted chicory and what you have is a 7.4% ABV beer that's calling for you to make breakfast any time of the day.

East End Brewing Company

In a bid to clear the snow and warm things up for everyone in Pittsburgh, Scott Smith from East End Brewing makes his Snow Melt Winter Ale each year, and even though this substantial 7% ABV beer helps, the snow still seems to stick. This mahogany red ale has a unique malt character and a bright hop flavor that has hints of pine. This beer will help keep you warm and while we all can't wait for it to warm up, at least we have this to clear the snow for us.

Erie Brewing Company

While it's typically good advice to steer clear of Johnny Law when drinking, Erie Brewing releases their Ol' Red Cease & Desist each year, going against that advice. Ol' Red is an upfront powerful ale that makes its own set of laws about what a winter beer should be. Coming in at 10.1% ABV, this beer has a balanced mix of oak, spices, dark fruits, and even a little caramel. While the alcohol and flavors are up-front about their intentions, this beer finishes smooth and easy to drink.

Lancaster Brewing Company

Located in...you guessed it...Lancaster, PA, Lancaster Brewing Company loves the winter season as much as might be possible, and they showcase that love with their Winter Warmer Ale. This 8.9% ABV beer skips the spices found in most winter beers to give you a full-bodied beer that features a monster of a malt bill along with British and American hops to give this beer a balance that's not often found in a winter ale. Classified as an Old Ale, Winter Warmer will do as its name implies, and it'll do it with style.

North Country Brewing Company

Originally brewed in 2005, Jack Frost Winter Warmer Ale from North Country Brewing is a great example of what a winter warmer should be. Coming in at 7.7% ABV, this malty beer



focuses on the malt body, allowing only enough spice into the beer to hint at their presence.

You'll find some hop flavor in Jack Frost, but not much of the bitterness you'd expect along with it. In short, this is one great malty beer that uses a touch of spice to give you a beer that's perfect for a cold winter night, and best of all it's available in cans!

Saugatuck Brewing Company

Brown Ales are the perfect balance of toasty malt character, rich roasted malt, and bitter chocolate all wrapped together in one delicious beer. Add to this tastes and aroma of oak aging and what you have is SBC's Snow Wizard Oak Aged Brown Ale. This beer comes in at 7% ABV and 49 IBUs, featuring that toasty malt brown ales are known for while adding in a little extra bitterness and oak character for good measure. Unlike the other beers listed above, Snow Wizard is only available October through December so check this unique brown ale out while it's still here.

Smuttynose Brewing Company


For those of us that love their Belgian-style beers, Smuttynose Brewing has long held their Winter Ale as the perfect beer for winter, and while they still feel this way, this 7.5% Belgian Dubbel has a new name Single Digit Dubbel for the beer we love with a few additional ABV that before, and it's still brewed with a special Trappist ale yeast as it has always been. This beer features fruity aromas and flavors as well as a soft hop background. Mellow yet surprisingly complex. The perfect brew for the winter months when you're looking for something different.

Springhouse Brewing Company

Those pesky Martians are at it again, and this time they've gone after Santa. While we send the National Guard to go rescue him, you can take solace in Spring House's The Martians Kidnap Santa Egg Nog Stout. This 8.3% ABV beer pairs the chocolate darkness you'd expect from a stout and the creamy booziness we all love about egg nog and places them together in a match that's way better than milk and cookies could ever be.

Straub

Straub Brewery has been in the brewing business since 1872 and today they're not only producing quality beers that have been around for much of their history, but new and innovative beers as well. Take for example their Legacy Sampler, a mix pack of





beers that show the history of Straub Brewery better than any history book ever could. The sampler includes their 1872 Lager, a 5.4% ABV pre-prohibition style lager, longtime favorite Helles Lager, a 5.5% ABV lager, Dopplebock, a 7% ABV Winter Bock, and their Dunkel, a 5.2% ABV Munich-style Dunkel Lager.

While we're just getting started with winter, there's nothing wrong with thinking about our favorite seer of seers and prognosticator of prognosticators and what his prediction for the length of winter will be. We may have to wait to see what Groundhog Phil has to say about the coming weather, but one thing we're certain about is Straub's Groundhog Altbier. Coming in at 5.4% ABV, this beer is brewed in the old German style and pours a deep gold with a pronounced malt flavor and a hearty dose of hops to balance everything out. Straub's Groundhog beer will be making you want to repeat Groundhog Day again and again.

Troegs Independent Brewing

It wouldn't be a holiday season without the wild and wonderful Mad Elf from Troegs. Coming in at a surprising 11% ABV, Mad Elf uses pilsner, Munich, and chocolate malts paired with spicy Belgian yeast and cherries to make a rich and flavorful beer that might possibly drive you mad, too. Mad Elf is possibly the perfect beer for the holidays. Falling in line with Troegs' new look, Mad Elf has a new label on a bottle filled with the same holiday beer we've all grown to love.

A beer making its return this year for the winter season from Troegs is their Blizzard of Hops winter IPA. This 6.4% ABV beer has notes of pine and citrus in it as well as a solid malt backbone. Is There A Santa

1. Santa's Workload
