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SPORTS The Penguins' Sputtering Start

It's not how they drew it up, the Pittsburgh Penguins. Not how they envisioned their offense exploding onto the scene at the start of the season. Not how they wanted to wash the fizzling taste out of their mouths from their lackluster production down the stretch and early postseason exit last year.

It took more than four periods to find the back of the net and the much anticipated new addition to Sidney Crosby's line, Phil Kessel, was the guy to break the ice in a loss. Another loss came before the first win of the season against the Senators, and despite stringing together a few victories, the expected goal eruption has not even





made a rumble.

At 4-4 through eight games, the potentially potent offense has put up meager numbers. Thirteen goals total. That's 1.63 per game, bad for second worst in the NHL. Head Coach Mike Johnston has said that at times his team gets "too cute with the puck" and passes up shots. If you've ever been to a game at Consol Energy Center or watched it at a sports bar, you know that fans agree. Screaming SHOOT THE PUCK is as involuntary as breathing when watching a hockey game, but when the hyped up, fire powered




offense seems to have the safety locked into place, it's even more frustrating to watch. Especially with the man advantage.

Continuing a trend that started in the second half of last season, the power play has been impotent, cashing in just 7.1 percent of the time. 28 opportunities. Two goals. Common sense might have you believe that with Sidney Crosby, Evgeni Malkin, Phil Kessel and Kris Letang on special teams, goals wouldn't be this hard to come by. This probably goes without saying, but when you convert with the extra skater, it bodes well for your chances of winning the game. Last season, the Penguins were 27-5-1 when scoring on the power play. When you fail, it's a hit to your confidence. All this talent and skill and still unable to score even with one less defender to contest your efforts. Getting to rebounds and winning face offs to get started setting up your attack right away instead of chasing the puck 200 feet and re-establishing the zone will help change the tide. That leads me to . . . Sidney Crosby.

To this point, Captain Crosby has been on the score sheet in exactly one game this season and although it was a three point performance, it took the perennial Art Ross Trophy candidate six games to finally get going. He wins just 50 percent of his power play face offs and when he does possess the puck he is constantly looking to make the pretty pass instead of taking a shot. Could be the self imposed pressure of having to feed Kessel or whomever is lining up with him that particular shift. Not sure, but it would be nice to see Crosby play angry. To go after goals with a vengeance. To play like a man possessed.

With all that said, it's early. Hockey season builds slowly until the halfway point when division races come into focus and teams find identities. As a sport that accepts over half of its teams into the

playoffs, there is opportunity to gel and discover the right combo to create chemistry and set up for a strong run. The Penguins need the time with eight new players that weren't on the roster last season. Johnston has shaken up the lines already, opting to pair Kessel with Evgeni Malkin instead of Crosby and move Patric Hornqvist up to





the first line. When Hornqvist played with Crosby last season, the Pens outscored their opponents 31-17. Sounds like a good idea.

There have been a few bright spots early on as well. While the Pens haven't lit up the scoreboard, they haven't allowed many goals either. At two goals against per game, they are tied for second best in the NHL. Marc Andre Fleury is one of the top five starting goaltenders in the league in goals against average and save percentage on the young season. If they can keep the goals allowed in check and find their offensive mojo, excitement could replace frustration as the overriding feeling when watching the Penguins. Just like they drew it up.

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
Nightwire Salutes and Honors Our "Hometown Hero" - JOE WADLOW

Joe was a Staff Sargent in the Marines having served with the Third Battalion First Marines stationed in Vietnam during the war. For his tour of duty, he and his unit received a record four Presidential Unit Citations for different operations throughout their time in Vietnam plus they also received the Vietnam's Cross of Gallantry, which is the highest honor bestowed upon any unit by the Government of South Vietnam. In 2011, He was inducted into the North Hills Hall of Fame.

Joe lost many of his friends in combat, but has never forgotten them and keeps in touch with their families, showing true compassion with anonymous unselfish acts of kindness and generosity towards them and his fellow veterans and to the families of those who gave their lives for our country. He is truly a hero, by living his life continually giving and never forgetting, putting true meaning to....once a Marine, always a Marine!

Joe proudly told us he wrote a chapter in a book that was published in 2006 called ironically, "Once a Marine Always a Marine," it's a story of fifteen enlisted Marines who were not career Marines, but Marines that attribute their success in life to what they learned in the Marine Corps.

Joe's tireless generosity of time and money by working with and donating his own money to charities like: Walk for Babies, Epilepsy Foundation, Remembering the Brave, Pennies From Heaven Toys for Tots, Wounded Warrior, American Heart Association, MS Summer Camp and the Fallen Marine Memorial Run, which he founded and ran for 4 years – during the last year the bike run got rained out... so he personally donated \$10,000



to the family of Marine Sergeant Sean H. Miles, who was killed in Iraq. He also served as Conduit for 3 years as a member of the Marine Corp League. In addition Joe has unselfishly donated and helped with fund raisers to various schools in the North Hills, including North Allegheny.

At The Movies....

NORTHERN SOUL is a tale set in England circa 1974 concerning the Mod Movement. This was an exceptionally important time in musical history. David Bowie, and many others, credit the Mod Movement for forming the foundation of their musical careers. The Mod scene was a revolution in British music; a purposeful and direct rebellion against the "chart" hits, toward music very similar to the Motown Sound, especially the heavy beat and poignant lyrics of Tamla. Rowdy dancing accompanied the music. It was based on the fighting movements of Bruce Lee mixed with body dance. Naturally, it was sneered upon by the establishment and severe attempts were made to quash the trend.

Amid this musical turbulence, viewers are introduced to John Clark, played by Elliott James Langridge. John is a teen who is experiencing trauma in high school from both teachers and peers. He gazes upon his home life, and realizes he does not want to follow the traditional path of staying in the same town, working at the local factory and then, after a lifetime of mundaneness, dying in that same town.

Circumstance brings him in contact with Matt, played by Josh Whitehouse, who introduces him to the Mod scene, its music and its biggest players. The boys resolve to travel to America to import the music banned in the UK and open their own club where they can share the Mod experience.

Love interest in the film is provided by Antonia Thomas, as Angela. She is a nurse, and seemingly out of John's depth, until he makes a name for himself on the Mod scene. She is black, so the producers are able to establish an interracial theme, so necessary in today's films. In actuality, interracial relations were not a social faux pas in Britain by 1974, so the set up becomes moot.

Director Elaine Constantine labored for 15 years to bring this tale to the Silver Screen. During the interval, something became lost in translation. NORTHERN SOUL shifts from an engaging look into a musical historical event, to a tiny vignette about a couple of lads. There is no resolution to the film. After a spat, the boys make up and the film ends. There is no indication of



the fulfillment of their dreams and aspirations; nor is there any perspective offered for the Mod movement. It makes NORTHERN SOUL akin to the tale your Uncle Charley tells that has no ending and therefore no point.

The film is being jostled for awards consideration. It was released in Britain last year with moderate attainment. It played here in select film festivals, and caught the eye of several aging critics, and more importantly, film distributors, who ranted about its qualities. It received a very limited, select city release, but Pittsburgh was not included. Meantime, the soundtrack for the film rocketed to the top ten on the British charts, giving the movie some street cred. Frankly,

buying the soundtrack is a better bargain than seeing the movie.

THE LAST WITCH HUNTER

THE LAST WITCH HUNTER is an exciting, well-paced supernatural thriller that could provide another successful series for star Vin Diesel. Diesel is currently in a quagmire in Hollywood, with many pundits challenging his box office clout. Outside of the RIDDICK trilogy, which appealed mainly to the sci-fi techno-geek crowd, many in Tinsel Town are claiming Diesel cannot carry a film. They point to the FAST AND FURIOUS franchise and attribute its success more to Paul Walker and Dwayne Johnson than Diesel. Diesel's other endeavors have been less than stellar at the box office. Diesel is considering a return to a character he brought to the screen, Xander Cage in XXX, if this film does not pan out. THE LAST WITCH HUNTER provides Diesel the first role he can carry and claim his own since PITCH BLACK.

Diesel is Kaulder, a medieval warrior tasked with hunting down the coven of witches currently plaguing his village. He encounters and engages the Queen Witch, played by Julie Engelbrecht. As he defeats her, she condemns him to ever-lasting life, cursing him to live through the deaths of all those he loves, or ever will love.

Cursed, or blessed with immortality, Kaulder aligns with a faction of the Roman Catholic Church known as the Cross and Axe, to hunt down and destroy witches who seem rather hell-bent on the destruction of humanity. His current liaison to the church is Father Dolan, played by Michael Caine. When Fr. Dolan is placed under a death spell, Kaulder discovers a nefarious plot to resurrect the Witch Queen by a powerful coven. Together with his new apprentice, the 37th Dolan, played by Elijah Wood, Kaulder sets out to once again stop the Witch Queen from destroying humanity. Along the way, he will team with a dreamwalker, Chloe, played by Rose Leslie and encounter a behemoth warlock, Belial, played by Olafur Darri

Olafsson. Pittsburgh native and former pro wrestler Kurt Angle also pops up in a cameo, playing one of the Queen's guards.

THE LAST WITCH HUNTER was shot in Pittsburgh, and the movie highlights the city well. I guess the city just harmonizes with spooky places and evil witches. Cinematographer Dean Semler captures the 'burgh with rather majestic, if ominous cityscape shots and darkened alleys from the city's heart. Coupled with Steve Jablonsky's apt score, Pittsburgh seems a natural for the planned series. To lure the production here, Lionsgate and Summit Pictures applied for and received, a state sponsored tax



credit to the tune of \$14 million. That's a sizable chunk of the Pittsburgh Film Office's budget of \$65 million, but if it brings in a franchise, it is money well spent. At least one sequel is already in pre-production and Lionsgate is hoping THE LAST WITCH HUNTER will spawn a series of six films.

Breck Eisner directed the film, and it is one of his few Tinsel Town successes. The son of Disney Czar Michael Eisner, it was Breck who was responsible for submarining the proposed and highly anticipated remake of Universal's CREATURE FROM THE BLACK LAGOON; a project with a massive budget and enough top-shelf personnel to hand-hold the young Eisner. He blew it anyway, and many feel without his father's influence, he would be out of the Hollywood game. He has a strong showing in THE LAST WITCH HUNTER.

In order to cater to the high school crowd, THE LAST WITCH HUNTER is obviously tamed to a PG-13 rating. Should this become a series, it deserve a more adult treatment. With a little more edge and jumping to an R rating, this series could be extreme celluloid fun, much in the vein of the HELLRAISER franchise.



THE LAST WITCH HUNTER basically is a set up movie. Screenwriter Cory Goodman gives the viewer the key principles and scenarios of future adventures. It's worth a view, and could be the start of something big.



The 12 Beers of Thanksgiving

Ah, the holidays: A great time to spend with friends and family, and an even better time for enjoying some great beer with the former, sometimes because of the latter. Thanksgiving has become the unofficial kickoff of the holiday season, and while Christmas tries it's best to creep in on Thanksgiving's turf, it's still a day about celebrating the fall, being thankful for what you have, and spending some much needed time with the family.

It seems like pumpkin beers and other seasonals have... well...started coming ahead of their seasons. While we were buying pumpkin beers in August, it's best to not forget that truly the best time to enjoy these amazing seasonal beers, pumpkin brews included, is on a holiday like Thanksgiving. We've collected twelve great beers to help you ring in this holiday season and impress your fellow beer loving friends and family in the process. Fear not, there's far more than just pumpkin beers to have while still staying seasonal this Thanksgiving, but if those gourd-based beers are your thing, we've got you covered just the same.



Anderson Valley Fall Hornin' – Starting this list off is a pretty great entry on the pumpkin beers column of fall seasonals. Anderson Valley Brewing Company brings out their Fall Hornin' Pumpkin Ale each fall to Jack-O-Lantern headed fiends everywhere.

This beer starts out with aromas of caramelized malt and fresh baked bread, giving way to fall spices like cinnamon, nutmeg, and of course pumpkin. The taste is all about the pumpkin and spices, with a slight hint of hops in the finish. Deep copper in color, this 6% ABV beer is perfect with some cranberry scones, roasted root vegetables, and other sweet deserts.

> Buffalo Bill's Pumpkin – The original pumpkin beer, Buffalo Bill's Brewery crafted the first batch of Pumpkin Ale all the way back in 1985. Brewed before there was season creep with beers, and before anyone knew what a "craft beer" even was, this golden amber-colored ale features tastes of pumpkin and spices, and is reminiscent of warm pumpkin pie without being overly sweet or spiced.

If you're a pumpkin beer fanatic, you definitely have to try the originator of the style that seems to rule every fall beer season.

Buffalo Bill's Black Pumpkin – So how do you make the original pumpkin beer even better? Well, you start with an amazing oatmeal stout and add in pumpkin, spices, and chocolate accents to make something that's truly amazing. Buffalo bill's Black Pumpkin Ale comes in at 7.5% ABV and boasts a rich roasted malt flavor, just enough sweetness, and of course that pumpkin pie character that makes their original Pumpkin Ale so good.

Erie Brewing Johnny Rails Pumpkin – A fun fact about Erie Brewing is that each of their beers are named after a local person or story from the Erie, PA area. A great example of this is none other than their Johnny Rails Pumpkin Ale. This seasonal beer is named after one of Erie Brewing's own staff who, not surprisingly, is named John. You'll have to check the bottle out to see how the name fits though.

Johnny Rails Pumpkin Ale comes in at 6.5% ABV, and features an exceptional balance of pumpkin, spice, and the base blond ale the beer starts its life as.

North Country Brewing Late Night Pumpkin – Hailing from the wilds of Slippery Rock, PA, North Country Brewing has made quite a name for themselves over the years, and with their current focus on distribution of their

amazing canned beers, it's never been easier to get your hands on some North Country beer. For the fall season, North Country brews their Late Night Pumpkin with a healthy dose of pumpkin, spice, and of course this is all done late at night, when the pumpkins taste their best. Coming in at 6.1% ABV with a gold color and a nice spiced character, Late Night Pumpkin is a canned beer you definitely need to try.

Otter Creek Brewing Overgrown - Not every seasonal beer for the fall has to have pumpkin and spice in it, and to prove that point Otter Creek Brewing's Overgrown stands in



stark contrast to the pie-flavored beers most often found this time of the year.

Overgrown is a classic American pale ale that comes in at 5.5% ABV, and features some good old dank American hop flavor that's balanced out nicely with a solid malt backbone. Overgrown is brewed to celebrate the annual hop harvest, with the hope that this and every harvest is indeed Overgrown.

Smuttynose Brewing Pumpkin – Smuttynose Brewing wanted to keep things traditional when making their version of a pumpkin beer, so with that idea in mind they artfully crafted their Pumpkin Ale. This 5.8% ABV pumpkin beer harkens back to colonial times when pumpkins were a common addition to beer, mostly as a way to cut back on the use of barley. In the spirit of these classic beers, the geniuses at Smuttynose Brewing add actual pumpkin to the mash as well as standard additions of spices to give this beer a unique body, aroma, and taste that's right on the money with balance and overall pumpkin-ness.

Troegs Master of Pumpkin – Pulling the strings of great beer and smashing some pumpkins in the process is a pretty amazing beer from The Troegs brothers out of Hershey, PA. Master of Pumpkin is brewed with native Pennsylvania neck pumpkins that're harvested just a few miles away from the brewery, and is combined with traditional pie spices that's so good it's almost blinding.

The saison yeast used in this beer give it a unique character that sets it apart from other pumpkin beers, and the spices used mesh seamlessly with the natural fermentation used. More is definitely all you'll need of this beer, with vanilla, cinnamon, clove, nutmeg, and ginger pairing with roasted pumpkin. This 7.5% ABV beer is the perfect beer to pair with your main course, as the flavors combine just right to pair with poultry.

Victory Brewing Harvest Ale – The great thing about the harvest season is definitely fresh hops. Another entry in the list of non-pumpkin seasonal beers is Harvest Ale from Victory Brewing. This wet-hopped American IPA uses whole fresh hops to give the beer a flavor and aroma that's hard to match, let alone beat.

With their essential oils safely intact, the fresh, or "wet" hops are added to the brew and in return they give us notes of tropical fruit, hop resin, and a nice citrus aroma and taste. Coming in at 6.5% ABV, Harvest Ale from Victory Brewing is only around for a short while, so make sure to pick it up while you can and drink it as fresh as possible.

Victory Brewing MoonGlow – It may seem that every seasonal beer in the fall is either a fresh-hopped IPA or some form of pumpkin beer, but if neither of these is a favorite of yours, Victory Brewing has you covered. Their Moonglow Weizenbock returns again for 2015 in a big way with a rich flavor and dark amber color.

Coming in at a whopping 8.7% ABV, Moonglow is brewed in the Bavarian Weizenbock style, using imported 2-row German malts (including wheat) and whole flower German hops. In it, you'll taste a complex assortment of cloves, tart apple, with a hint of banana in the background. The natural esters and phenols in this beer give it a depth of aroma and taste that's both amazing and delicious.

Weyerbacher Imperial Pumpkin – While some breweries try to take a "fair and balanced" approach to their gourdloving beers, Weyerbacher Brewing chose instead to go all-out. With a heavy focus on the caramel body, spiciness, and hearty pumpkin, their 8% ABV Imperial Pumpkin Ale is a truly amazing brew.

This is a beer that's perfect for the heart of your Thanksgiving dinner, as it's best paired with stuffing, root vegetables, harvest-style foods, and of course turkey.

Wolavers Organic Pumpkin – Finishing up this list is a great example of a clean, well-spiced pumpkin beer. Organic Pumpkin Ale from Wolaver's Brewing features a well balanced malt and hop profile to start with, and finishes with organic cinnamon, organic nutmeg, and organic cloves. Like any good pumpkin beer should be, this one is brewed with real organic pumpkins, too. To keep things local Wolaver's uses organic pumpkins from Golden Russet Farm in Shoreham, VT.

Believe it or not, we're surprisingly close to the holidays yet again and while we might not be looking forward to the colder weather and shorter days, one thing that

> definitely makes this time of year great is the emergence of seasonal holiday beers. Unlike the light and hoppy beers that come around when the weather gets warm, these beers tend to be spiced and more often than not lean towards to the dark side of beer, but think less Vader Ale and more stouts, porters, and all around darker ales. This isn't to say there aren't any IPAs to be found in the winter, they're just a little fewer and farther between.

Winter beers that use spices follow an age-old tradition of wassail, which was a hot mulled cider that was traditionally enjoyed as an integral part of wassailing, which was the act of going from door

to door to sing Christmas carols. The tradition of drinking these spiced cups during the winter months goes all the way back to medieval times, making them beers with some history!

Featured Holiday and Winter Beers

21st Amendment Fire-

side Chat – Hailing form somewhere you wouldn't expect holiday beers to be popular is Fireside Chat from 21st Amendment Brewing out of San Francisco. They start this beer off as an English-style dark ale and as 21st Amendment puts it, "improvised with a variety of spices" to create a uniquely spiced winter ale. This beer comes in at 7.9% ABV, making it a uniquely strong spiced beer perfect for chilly weather and just like FDR's Depression-era radio shows, it's a real kick in the

butt, in a very good way.

Anchor Christmas 2015 – Anchor Brewing believes that variety is the spice of life, and with this idea in mind they brew their Christmas offering to be a different beer each year. Along with the beer inside, the bottle is different each year, featuring a different tree for each different version of the beer.

Last year was the 40th anniversary of Anchor's Christmas beer, and the tree was even drawn by the same artist that drew tree #1. As for this year, the style is a secret until it comes out, but overall these beers are average on alcohol content and big on taste.

Breckenridge Christmas – Featuring flavors of caramel and chocolate, Christmas Ale from Breckenridge Brewery in Colorado is a perfect example of what a great Christmas beer should be. With extra flavor and just enough alcohol, coming in at 7.4% ABV, this seasonal beer really hits the spot on a cold night. Breckenridge's Christmas is categorized as an American Strong Ale, and this full-bodied beer features a medium hop character paired with tastes of caramel and chocolate.

Brooklyn Black Chocolate Stout – When you think of a winter beer, you probably think of something dark, not too bitter, and with a little extra alcohol. While not every holiday beer fits this mold, Black Chocolate Stout from Brooklyn Brewery is exactly this.

Black Chocolate Stout features undertones of toasted malt along with a nice alcohol warmness. Up front however you'll get some excellent chocolate character along with a little bitterness. This Russian imperial stout comes in at 10% ABV, and is even better aged than it is fresh. In other words, pick up twice as much and age half of it for at least a year, you'll be surprised on what comes form the process, in a very good way.

Deschutes Brewery Jubelale – Coming back for its second year in the Pittsburgh area is Jubelale from Deschutes Brewing. Just like Anchor's seasonal offering, Deschutes commissions a new label by a different artist for this beer each year. Unlike Anchor however, Deschutes sticks to the same great recipe year after year.

With 5 different malts and 5 different hops, the addition of spices rounds out this winter ale with tastes of chicory, dried fruit, and warm winter spices.

Flying Dog K-9 Winter Ale – Known for beers that are in your face and amazing, Flying Dog's K-9 Winter Ale is a winter warmer at its finest. This 7.4% ABV beer features a deep ruby color with a light khaki head. K-9 has aromas of bread, plums, toasted malt, toffee, and slight earthiness that give way to a taste of toasty toffee, caramel, and a slight toffee brown sugar finish.



Overall, this beer has lots going on and is great if you're looking for the true spicy winter warmer style. Great for enjoying next to a fire or just with your feet up in your house, Flying Dog did a great job on their version of a winter warmer.

Left Hand Fade to Black Vol. 1 – Left Hand Brewing made their winter seasonal a true dark winter beer. This Foreign Stout comes in at a hefty 8.5% ABV and features tastes of licorice, espresso, molasses, and black cardamom.

Fade to Black Vol. 1 is so good it's won gold at the Great American Beer Festival a whopping three times, and still continues to garner industry love. Get this one while you can, and make sure to let it warm just a little bit from fridge temperature to get all the spiciness out of this great beer.

Long Trail Sick Day – Not all beers brewed for the winter months have to be dark and spicy, far from it. Take Long Trail for example with their Sick Day IPA. While many of us have to use real sick days in the winter months to help fend off illness, this beer will make you want to call in a sick just so you can sit back and enjoy a few.

Sick Day IPA is an unfiltered IPA at 6.8% ABV that features



piney, spicy hop flavors and aromas that are balanced nicely with toasty malts. While you may not think an IPA is a great beer for the winter, this one may very well change your mind.

Ommegang Lovely, Dark

& Deep - A new entry into our list this year is Lovely, Dark and Deep by Brewery Ommegang out of Cooperstown, New York. This winter oatmeal stout comes in at 5.3% ABV and features a dark color and the thick body you'd expect from an oatmeal stout.

Rogue Yellow Snow IPA -

Rogue Ales, located in Newport, Oregon is one of the pioneers of the craft beer movement, and for good reason. Their commitment to not only quality, but to local and renewable resources makes them an excellent example of a modern craft brewery.

Another entry in the winter IPA category is this oddly named but outstandingly delicious Yellow Snow IPA. This beer is pale golden in color with a nice hoppy, fruity aroma. Up front this beer is all hop aroma and flavor, but as the beer finishes on your palate you should pick up the medium body and a lingering bitterness that makes this beer truly stand out from the crowd. Coming in at 6.5% ABV, this is a great beer for when you're burnt out on all the big dark beers everywhere during the winter months.

Samuel Smith Winter Welcome – The only British entry in this list is also one of the best winter ales available today.

Samuel Smith Brewing, which is celebrating their 26th annual release brews their Winter Welcome each year to welcome the coming colder months. This UK beer comes in at 6% ABV and features one of the most trueto-style winter warmers available.

Brewed in the British style, Winter Welcome has a more malty sweet taste than its American counterparts, which is a pleasant change from the more hop-heavy varieties available today. Winter Welcome features a sweet caramel malty taste with a slight spice presence. The beer itself is lighter bodied than most US versions, but this makes the beer more drinkable and gives it an overall great feeling.

St. Bernardus Christmas – This is a dark seasonal beer brewed in the classic Quad style of Belgium's best Abbey Ales. This beer comes in at 10% ABV with a unique spicy character that's thanks to the St. Bernardus house yeast. Expect to taste slight hints of molasses, apricots, licorice, and marzipan that are balanced out by a slightly sweet undertone.



As I came out of the supermarket that sunny day, pushing my cart of groceries towards my car, I saw an old man with the hood of his car up and a lady sitting inside the car, with the door open.

The old man was looking at the engine. I put my groceries away in my car, and continued to watch the old gentleman from about twenty five feet away. I saw a young man in his early twenties with a grocery bag in his arm walking towards the old man. The old gentleman saw him coming too, and took a few steps towards him. I saw the old gentleman point to his open hood and say something. The young man put his grocery bag into what looked like a brand new Cadillac Escalade. He then turned back to the old man. I heard him yell at the old gentleman saying: 'You shouldn't even be allowed to drive a car at your age.' And then with a wave of his hand, he got in his car and peeled rubber out of the parking lot. I saw the old gentleman pull out his handkerchief, and mop his brow as he went back to his car and again looked at the engine. He then went to his wife and spoke with her; he appeared to tell her it would be okay. I had seen enough, and I approached the old man. He saw me coming and stood straight, and as I got near him I said, 'Looks like you're having a problem.'He smiled sheepishly, and guietly nodded his head. I looked under the hood myself, and knew that whatever the problem was, it was beyond me. Looking around, I saw a gas station up the road, and I told the old man that I would be right back. I drove to the station and went I inside. I saw three attendants working on cars. I approached one of them, and related the problem the old man had with his car. I offered to pay them if they could follow me back down and help him. The old man had pushed the heavy car under the shade of a tree and appeared to be comforting his wife. They came over to us as the old man reached for his wallet, but was stopped by me. I told him I would just put the bill on my AAA card. He still reached for the wallet and handed me a card that I assumed had his name and address on it and I stuck it in my pocket. We all shook hands all around again, and I said my goodbye's to his wife. I then told the two mechanics that I would follow them back up to the station. Once at the station, I told them that they had interrupted their own jobs to come along with me and help the old man. I said I wanted to pay for the help, but they refused to charge me. One of them pulled out a card from his pocket, looking exactly like the card the old man had given to me. Both of the men told me then that they were Marine Corps Reserves. Once again we shook hands all around and as I was leaving, one of them told me I should look at the card the old man had given to me. I said I would and drove off. For some reason I had gone about two blocks, when I pulled over and took the card out of my pocket and looked at it for a long, long time. The name of the old gentleman was on the card in golden leaf and under his name was written: 'Congressional Medal of Honor Society.' I sat there motionless, looking at the card and reading it over and over. I looked up from the card and smiled to no one but myself and marveled that on this day, four Marines had all come together because one of us needed help.. He was an old man all right, but it felt good to have stood next to greatness and courage, and an honor to have been in his presence. Remember, OLD men like him gave you FREEDOM for America. Giving for Marla - Local Brother's Fundraising Efforts Honor Sister's Memory and Love of Nature

Meet Michael Pivarnik: Born and raised in Western Pennsylvania, he is a graduate of Slippery Rock University and currently works as a loan operations representative. Before 2013, Michael had never coordinated a fundraiser. But in August of 2013, Michael's life changed dramatically when his younger sister, Marla, passed unexpectedly. A 22-year-old recent graduate of Indiana University of Pennsylvania, Marla was on her way to graduate school and known by friends and family for being fearless and creative, with a passion for learning. But above all else, it was Marla's vigorous support for environmental causes and nature that continues to make a lasting impact.

Michael knew that he wanted to do something to honor his sister's memory, and his goal was clear: to raise money to benefit the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy (WPC) in memory of Marla.

"Marla drew me toward the Conservancy. It was something she was interested in," said Michael. "She felt strongly about protecting land. I knew I wanted to raise money to help the environment. It was important to me to know that the funds were going to a reputable charity, and I researched the most trusted charities in the area."

An avid long-distance runner, Michael decided to tie the fundraiser to an upcoming marathon in Canton, Ohio. At the end of the fundraiser, he would run the Pro Football Hall of Fame Marathon.

Michael dove head first into his fundraising efforts for Marla to benefit WPC, starting a campaign on the crowdfunding website CrowdRise. His message was clear: "You have been given a great opportunity to preserve my sister's name, as well as your environment."

Using social media to promote the campaign, Michael also posted flyers and sent formal letters to businesses. He eventually garnered donations from offices at Primary Health

Network, BNY Mellon in Pittsburgh and his own workplace. By the end of the 90 day campaign, he raised \$7,316 from more than 150 people.

"In the first five days, we had 21 donations totaling \$1,055," recalls Michael. "It was unbelievable to see the amount of love and support from Marla's family, friends, neighbors and the community displayed by showing how much they cared about her and this cause."

Michael gave the money raised to WPC's gardens and greenspace program. The money funded the community flower garden at Route 62 and East State Street in Hermitage, Pa. in 2014. This Mercer County garden received flowers, mulch

and other materials thanks to Michael's fundraiser. And, Marla's name will continue to be recognized on the garden sign through 2016.

Today, he continues to find connections to Marla in nature, especially while he runs. "I run with something of hers - ranging from a charm, piece of jewelry, bandana or music on her iPod. I ran in Jackson, Mississippi this past January with a harmonica that I found in her bedside drawer," said Michael.

"I have Marla in mind every step of the way."

New Rules For Employment


Sickness and related leave: We will no longer accept a doctor statement as proof of sickness. If you are able to go to the doctor, you are able to come to work.




