KENNYWOOD HOLIDAY LIGHTS

The eighth season of Kennywood's Holiday Lights spectacular begins on Friday, November 23 and continues every Friday, Saturday and Sunday night through December 23 from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. Holiday Lights will also be open nightly December 26 through 30.

Visitors will experience Thomas Town during the holidays for the first time, with the Number One Blue Engine himself returning to the rails to escort riders through our winter wonderland. And, while builders bustle to get Steelers Country and the record-setting Steel Curtain roller coaster ready for next summer, construction-themed light displays will dot the fences around the work site.

During this year's season of giving, the Kennywood team invites our community to share its love and support through two opportunities when they visit the park: bring a toy to donate to Toys for Tots, or make a donation to the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh's Our Victims of Terror Fund for the victims of the Tree of Life Synagogue attack.

"Our hearts are with the victims and loved ones impacted by last month's awful tragedy," says Kennywood General Manager Jerome Gibas. "Kennywood has been a gathering place for people of all faiths, communities and backgrounds for 120 years. The holidays are a special time to bring our community together to celebrate our traditions and to give back to as many as we can."

It wouldn't be a true Kennywood Holiday Lights without the brilliancy of nearly 2 million bulbs around

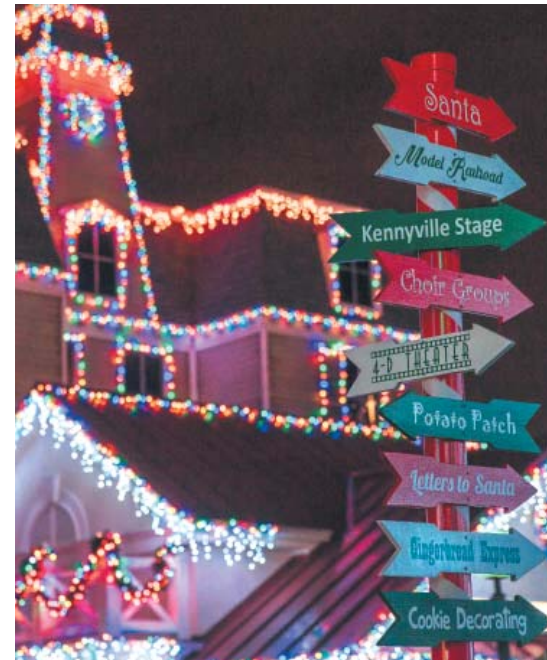
the park, led by Pennsylvania's tallest Christmas tree (90 feet, plus a 10-foot tree-topping ornament). Other holiday highlights, by the numbers:

- \$6 – The discount guests can receive by bringing a new, unwrapped toy to donate to our local Toys for Tots drive. Available on up to 4 tickets per toy from Nov. 23 – Dec. 9.
- 0 – The number of incandescent light bulbs used in park displays. After a multi-year transition, Kennywood now solely uses LED lights for its displays.
- 12 miles – The length in extension cords connecting and powering lights around the park, a distance that could connect Kennywood to Heinz Field.
- 50 – The number of live pine trees donated by the Indiana County Tree Growers Association.
- 2 hours, 15 minutes – The run time of *It's a Wonderful Life*, the Christmas classic playing continuously inside the Penny Arcade as part of a display loaned by the Jimmy Stewart Museum. For a more immersive holiday movie, head to the 4-D Theater to watch *The Polar Express™* 4-D Experience. The 15-minute movie is included with admission to Holiday Lights.
- 55' long, 45" wide – The size of the Pittsburgh Independent Hi-Railers model train display, located in the Penny Arcade.

Pittsburgh Public Theater continues its 45th anniversary season with the Pittsburgh premiere of *School Girls; Or The African Mean Girls Play*. A smash hit Off-Broadway last year, the play was written by **Jocelyn Bioh**, a first generation American whose parents emigrated from Ghana in West Africa. Directed by Kenyan native **Shariffa Ali**, *School Girls* runs November 7 – December 8, 2019 at the O'Reilly Theater, **Pittsburgh Public Theater's** home in the heart of Downtown's Cultural District. School Girls is set in 1986 at a boarding school in Ghana. It's a normal day of chatter and cattiness in the cafeteria for beautiful bully Paulina (Markia Nicole Smith) and Ama (Ezioma Asonye), Gifty (Shakara Wright), Mercy (Candace Boahene), and Nana (Atiauna Grant). Then Headmistress Francis (Shinnerrie Jackson) makes a surprising announcement: A recruiter for the Miss Ghana pageant (Melessie Clark as Eloise) is about to pay a visit and one of them may get a chance to represent their country at Miss Global Universe. All agree it should be Paulina (especially Paulina). But things go sideways for the queen bee when a new student, Erika (Aidaa Peerzada), enrolls. Not only is she pretty, but she has a light complexion. Relevant and relatable, *School Girls* explores the impact that beauty standards have on young women across the globe.

"The way Jocelyn Bioh has taken this form and re-imagined it for a modern audience is a mark of genius," said The Public's Artistic Director Marya Sea Kaminski. "*School Girls* has all the delicious trappings you'd hope for – a popular girl who reigns supreme, a new girl struggling to find her place, beauty tricks out of magazines, and puffy prom dresses. Jocelyn has set this incredible comedy in Africa, proving that teenagers are the same everywhere, but also reminding us how varied the world can be."

HOLIDAY BEERS SHOWCASE

The holidays are a time of giving, and with all the family gatherings, parties, and get-togethers that come along with this feeling of giving comes a time to enjoy some amazing seasonal craft beers. Many breweries save some of their biggest and boldest beers for the cold winter months. Sometimes this is done to match with the seasonal hop harvest at the end of the fall, and more often than not it's done to help get all of us through the coldest of months thanks to big amazing beers.

HISTORY OF HOLIDAY BEERS

Before getting to some of the best holiday beers around, it's worthwhile to take a minute to see just where these beers came from, and why we enjoy these specific styles only in the winter months.

The tradition of brewing very special beers for the holiday season has much deeper roots than what you may think. These types of beers most likely started in the Scandinavian countries with the Vikings. The Viking people traditionally enjoyed strong malty "beer" in the winter months to celebrate their Jul, or as we know it today, Yule.

The Vikings would offer some of their beer up to their gods, and no weak drink would do for



Odin, Thor, and Frey, so big beers were the law of the land, so to speak. Even after converting to Christianity, the Scandinavian countries still kept their love of these drinks, even requiring a certain amount of beer per household for Christmas.

These traditions spread to other countries, most notably England, where modern brewing got its start. The British respected the idea of strong holiday beers before the addition of the Scandinavian beliefs, but both seemed to work together to give a unique twist to both styles of beer.

While the beers of the Vikings and early British were very different than we enjoy today, the tradition of brewing very special beers to celebrate the holidays continues today with some of the best examples of the style. The British don't make as many holiday beers as they used to, leaving the best up to the US and the Belgians, and with a mix of both, your holiday season is bound to be a merry one indeed.

US-BREWED HOLIDAY BEERS

While the tradition of brewing holiday beers may have started overseas, some of the best versions of these beers are definitely brewed right here in the US. American craft beer has exploded with a variety of seasonal beers ranging from bitter and hoppy to sweet and spicy, all of which are more than welcome in the colder months.

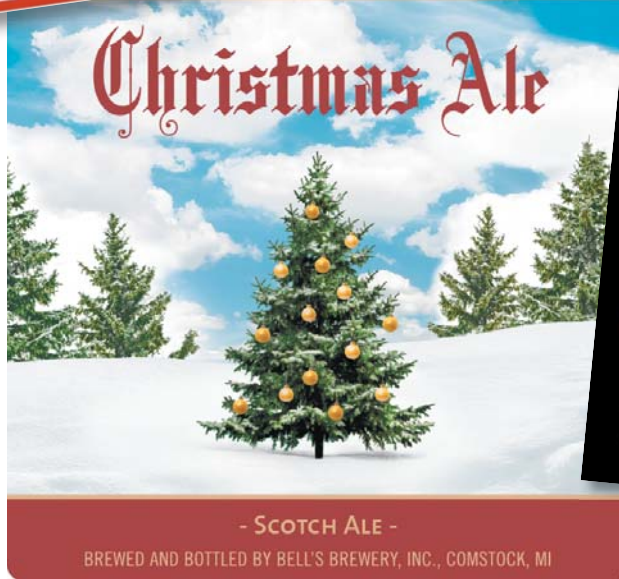
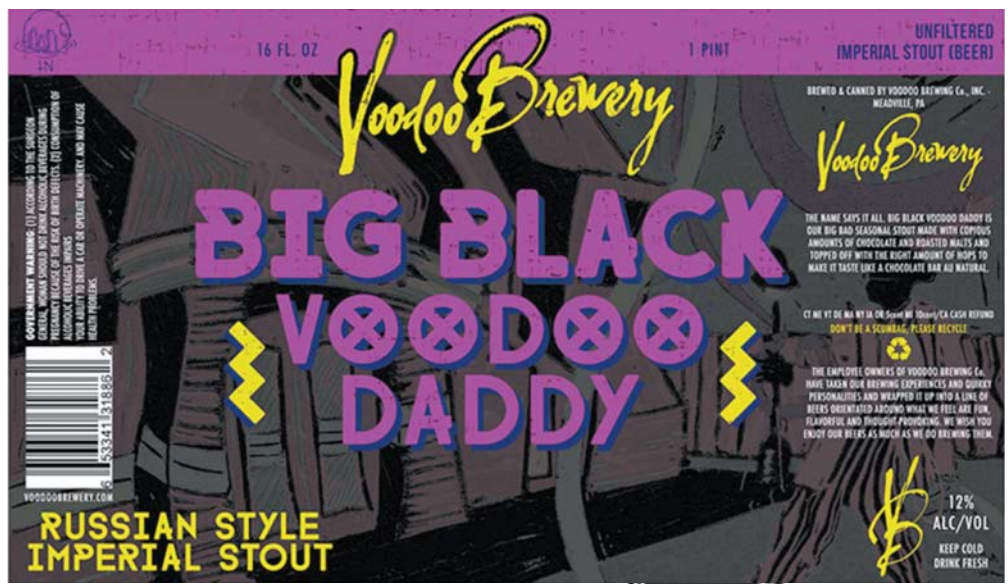
While many of these beers fall into what is known as the Winter Warmer category, there are IPAs, red ales, and even new interpretations of age-old beverages. The variety of US craft holiday beers is a testament to how craft brewing has taken hold of the US and is being driven by it, too.

BELL'S BREWERY

Celebrating the season, Bell's is once again releasing their Christmas Ale, a 5.5% Scottish ale that only uses specialty barley and a unique blend of hops to give this beer it's unique taste, no spices added.

Sure, big, dark beers rule the field in the winter months, but that's not the only game in town. Take Bell's Brewery and their Bright White Wheat Ale. This 5% ABV beer is fermented with a Belgian ale yeast and a special blend of malted wheat to give you fruity aromas and hints of clove...all without adding a single spice to the mix.

Bright White is brewed to allow the beer to maintain its natural cloudy appearance to top the package off. This one is only available in the winter months, so pick it up while you still can.





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DOGFISH HEAD CRAFT BREWERY

If you look halfway between 60 Minute and 90 Minute you can find a very unique beer in the form of 75 Minute IPA. This 7.5% ABV beer blends two of the most popular beers from Dogfish Head and adds in some maple syrup to naturally carbonate it. Dry-hopped with whole-leaf Cascade hops, 75 Minute is crisp and bitter while hanging on to a soft and velvety mouthfeel.

Think back to the last big holiday meal you had. Not the food part, but just after you finished eating and you settled into your favorite chair. That feeling that accompanied the “aahhhh” sound you made is a perfect representation of how Suddenly Comfy from Dogfish Head Brewery tastes.

This 6.3% ABV cream ale is a take on a freshly baked apple pie in a bottle. This imperial cream ale features apple cider, Saigon cinnamon, and Madagascar vanilla beans. Expect an aroma reminiscent of pie crust and tastes that will make you think you snuck in one last bite of pie.

EAST END BREWING COMPANY

In a bid to clear the snow and warm things up for everyone in Pittsburgh, Scott Smith from East End Brewing makes his Snow Melt Winter Ale each year, and even though this substantial 7% ABV beer helps, the snow still seems to stick. This mahogany red ale has a unique malt character and a bright hop flavor that has hints of pine. This beer will definitely help keep you warm and while we all can't wait for it to warm up, at least we have this to clear the snow for us.

ERIE BREWING COMPANY

Most of us usually steer clear of Johnny Law when drinking; Erie Brewing's O' Red Cease & Desist is an up-front powerful ale that makes its own set of laws about what a winter beer should be. Coming in at 10.1% ABV, this beer has a balanced mix of oak, spices, dark fruits, and even a little caramel. While the alcohol and flavors are



up-front about their intentions, this beer finishes smooth and easy to drink.

TRÖEGS INDEPENDENT BREWING

It wouldn't be a holiday season without the wild and wonderful Mad Elf from Tröegs. Coming in at a surprising 11% ABV, Mad Elf uses pilsner, Munich, and chocolate malts paired with spicy Belgian yeast and cherries to make a rich and flavorful beer that might possibly drive you mad, too. Mad Elf is possibly the perfect beer for the holidays.

A new beer for the winter season from Tröegs is their Blizzard of Hops winter IPA. This 6.4% ABV beer has notes of pine and citrus in it as well as a solid malt backbone. If you're tired of spiced and flavored beers this holiday season, Blizzard of Hops is one beer you can't miss.

VICTORY BREWING COMPANY

Victory Brewing out of Downingtown PA has quite the catalog of beers available throughout the year, but they wait until the winter months to release some of their best beers. First up is Winter Cheers. This 6.7% ABV wheat beer uses Tetttnag and Citra hops to

make a hoppy wheat beer that's ready to warm you up and give some winter cheer to spread.

NORTH COUNTRY BREWING COMPANY

Originally brewed in 2005, Jack Frost Winter Warmer Ale from North Country Brewing is a great example of what a winter warmer should be. Coming in at 7.7% ABV, this malty beer focuses on the malt body, allowing only enough spice into the beer to hint at their presence.

You'll find some hop flavor in Jack Frost, but not much of the bitterness you'd expect along with it. In short, this is one great malty beer that uses a touch of spice to give you a beer that's perfect for a cold winter night, and best of all it's available in cans!

ELLICOTTVILLE BREWING CO.

True to its name, Chocolate Cherry Bomb is a big 8.2% ABV American imperial stout featuring English hops, chocolate malt, and Oregon sweet cherries. The result is a beer that is just about perfect for that very special day in February with someone extra special or a cold night under a warm blanket at home.

VOODOO BREWING COMPANY

A beer that has become a standard in the 'burgh for stouts is the one and only Big Black Voodoo Daddy from Voodoo Brewing Co. The roasted malt character is balanced out by the underlying oak notes and hints of vanilla. Coming in at a solid 12.5% ABV, BBVD is all about creamy espresso, caramel, and coffee beans that give this big beer it's full body and flavor.

Who Will Be This Year's Breakout Star?

The ice has been a bit choppy for the Penguins, with injuries and bad puck luck contributing to an uneven start to the season. A five-game win streak propelled the team to a 6-2 record, just to see it drop to 6-5 with a three-game skid. Two of those games were close and easily could have resulted in points for the Pens, with head coach Mike Sullivan saying that as long as the guys keep playing the right way — like they have been — the wins will come. There's one constant force steadying the ship, and of course that's the captain, Sidney Crosby.

At more than a point per game pace, with 4 goals and ten assists, Crosby is tied for 6th in scoring among all NHL skaters. He continues to win in the face-off circle and make those around him better, with Jake Guentzel tickling the twine six times to lead the team in goals. He has 11 points to date, while it seems Dominik Simon has solidified his spot on the other side of Sid. Simon isn't scoring at the same clip but he is opening up space for others to get their shots.

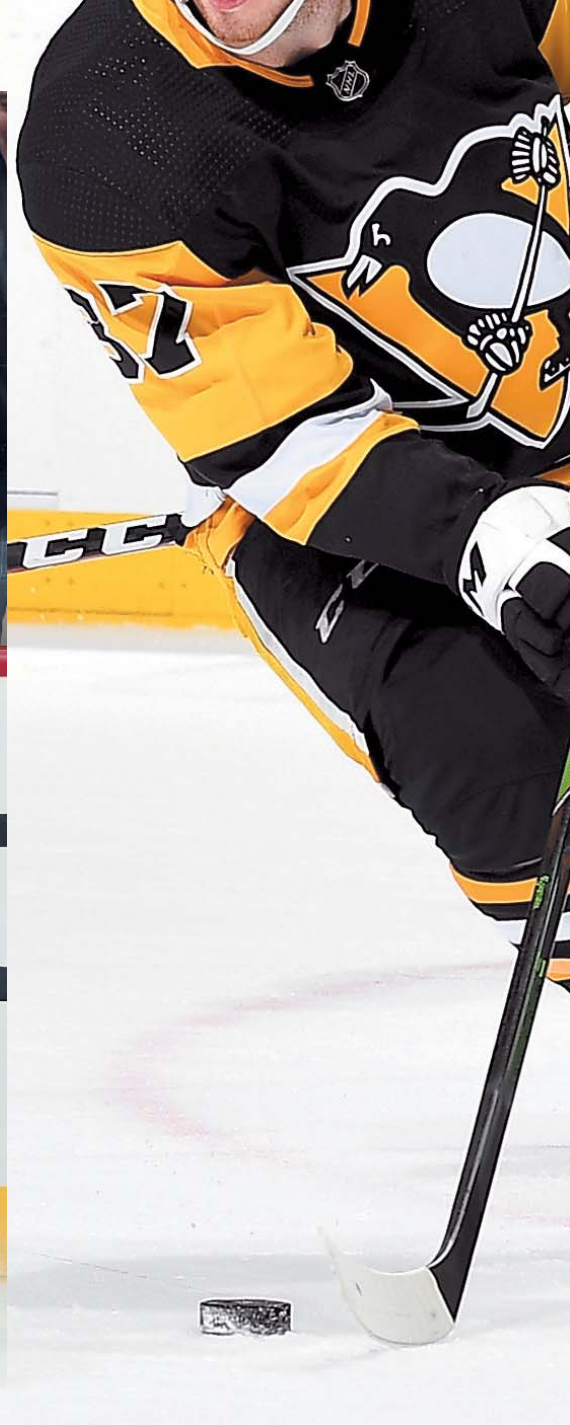
As the top line produces, the team waits to get back several injured veteran players, namely

Evgeni Malkin. Geno injured his knee in the second game of the season and has been out since, with the team calling it "longer term" it's hard to know when he will return. Another center has also missed some time with Nick Bjugstad playing in just two games, although he is expected to return sooner rather than later. Newcomer Alex Galchenyuk has missed eight of the team's first 11 games and Bryan Rust has yet to suit up this season. Most recently, defenseman Brian Dumoulin has been dealing with a lower body injury as well. So what does having so many guys sidelined

mean? Opportunity. Opportunity for young guys to step up and show everyone that they belong.

Good things can happen when rookies get their shot. The Penguins have had their fair share of success stories in this area. During their 2016 Stanley Cup run, first-year players Matt Murray, Bryan Rust, Conor Sheary and Tom Kuhnhackl all contributed to claiming the title. The three forwards each had game-winning goals during the playoff run and Matt Murray sealed the crease up nicely. The following year it was Jake Guentzel who wowed, breaking rookie scoring records in the postseason to help lead the Pens to their second Cup in a row.

So what about this year? Two players are really showing up. One on each side of the puck. Hollidaysburg native, Sam Lafferty has three goals and two assists in his nine games since being called up. The 24-year old forward has shown flashes of offensive power, especially







when he is on the ice with some of the more talented skaters. Blueliner John Marino has found himself in the top defensive pairing with Kris Letang while Dumoulin recovers. Acquired from Edmonton this offseason, the 22-year old

opted to sign with the Penguins instead of finishing his senior year at Harvard. So far, that decision has paid off for the Pens. When Dumoulin returns, Jack Johnson will most likely be headed to the press box.

The season is also young and with plenty of hockey to play, and the Penguins playing the right way, a 14th consecutive postseason appearance looks likely. The question is, who will be this year's breakout star? It'll be fun to find out.

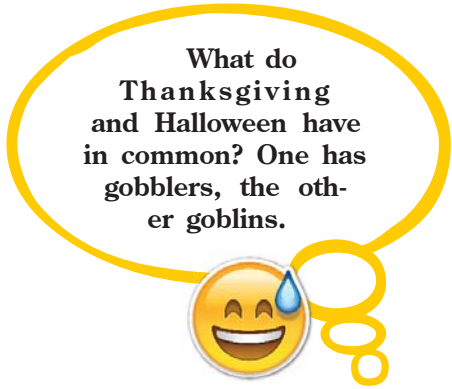

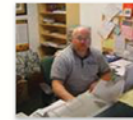

And if you want to go way back to the original Thanksgiving table, you can. Guests can order tickets as early as June (May for members) to attend a Thanksgiving dinner complete with authentic courses like a corn pudding and fish fricassee, tales of colonial life, and centuries-old songs. Don't be too shy to join in the sing-along!

WHILE PRESIDENT, THOMAS JEFFERSON REFUSED TO DECLARE THANKSGIVING AS A HOLIDAY.

Presidents originally had to declare Thanksgiving a holiday every year. History says Jefferson refused to recognize the event, because he strongly believed in the separation of church and state. Since Thanksgiving involved prayer and reflection, the president thought making it a national holiday would violate the First Amendment. He also thought it was better suited as a state holiday, not a federal one. But he never really explained

himself to the public, so he went down in history as an anti-Thanksgiving leader.

THE WOMAN BEHIND "MARY HAD A LITTLE LAMB" IS ALSO RESPONSIBLE FOR THANKSGIVING'S RECOGNITION AS A NATIONAL HOLIDAY.

Writer and editor Sarah Josepha Hale convinced President Abraham Lincoln to officially declare Thanksgiving a national holiday that recurred every year after years of persistent lobbying. The author also founded the American Ladies Magazine, which promoted women's issues long before suffrage. She wrote countless articles and letters to persuade the president to recognize the holiday federally, which she believed could help unify the Northern and Southern states amid gathering tensions and divisions. Hale kept at it, even after the Civil War broke out, and Lincoln actually wrote the proclamation just a week after her last letter in 1863.

THE FIRST MACY'S THANKSGIVING DAY PARADE DIDN'T FEATURE ANY BALLOONS.

If you can't imagine the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade without giant floats featuring your favorite characters, you'd probably barely recognize the first parade in the early 1920s. It did have puppets riding the floats, as well as singers and celebrities and of course, Santa Claus. And when the Thanksgiving parade made its big debut in 1924, it did have something that might be even crazier than balloons: animals from the Central Park Zoo.

German American illustrator Tony Starg, who completed illustrations for Good Housekeeping, also had a passion for puppetry, which he used make the amazing floats come to life in 1927.

IN 1939, THANKSGIVING WAS CELEBRATED ON THE THIRD THURSDAY IN NOVEMBER — NOT THE FOURTH.

You might think President Roosevelt could predict the future, as he channeled a "Black Friday" mindset when he decided when to celebrate Thanksgiving during his presidency. Even though the holiday had been celebrated on the fourth Thursday since Lincoln officially recognized the federal holiday decades before, Roosevelt bumped it up a week. That effectively added seven more shopping days to the holiday season, but it also angered football coaches who had Thanksgiving games scheduled that became regular weekday games and calendar-printers who now had incorrect dates. Americans, to say the least, didn't love the change, so it was officially (and legally) switched back in 1942.

A THANKSGIVING MIX-UP INSPIRED THE FIRST TV DINNERS.

In 1953, a Swanson employee accidentally ordered a colossal shipment of Thanksgiving turkeys (260 tons, to be exact). To get rid of them all, salesman Gerry Thomas took inspiration from the prepared foods served on airplanes. He came up with the idea of filling 5,000 aluminum trays with the turkey — along with cornbread dressing, gravy, peas, and sweet potatoes to round out the meal. The 98-cents meals were a hit, especially with kids and increasingly busy households.

Within one year, over 10 million were sold and a whole industry was born.

ABOUT 46 MILLION TURKEYS ARE COOKED FOR THANKSGIVING EACH YEAR.

Thanksgiving without turkey would be like Christmas without a tree, and most American families consider it equally blasphemous. While not super popular the rest of the year, turkey is a huge hit for holidays, perhaps because it really serves a crowd. On Christmas, 22 million families host an encore with yet another turkey.

Turns out, the bird really is the word.

BUT NOT EVERYONE EATS TURKEY ON THANKSGIVING.

According to the National Turkey Federation, only 88% of Americans chow down on turkey. The rest may be vegetarian or vegan, or just taking a stand against a protein that, let's face it, doesn't show up much the rest of the year.

Every president has upheld the tradition to this day. But what happens to that lucky bird that gets to squawk another day? In 2005 and 2009, the turkeys went to Disneyland and Walt Disney World parks to serve as grand marshal in their annual Thanksgiving parades.

And from 2010 to 2013, they vacationed at Washington's Mount Vernon state.

ONLY MALE TURKEYS ACTUALLY GOBBLE.

If you learned in pre-school that a turkey goes "gobble, gobble," that's only about half true. Only male turkeys — appropriately named gobblers —



actually make the sound. Female turkeys cackle instead. So if you're trying to figure out whether a turkey's a male or a female, just wait until they open their beaks.

MOST AMERICANS LIKE THANKSGIVING LEFTOVERS MORE THAN THE ACTUAL MEAL.

Fans of the almighty turkey, stuffing, and mashed potato leftover sandwich: You're in the majority. Almost eight in 10 Americans agree that the second helpings of stuffing, mashed potatoes, and of course pie beat out the big dinner itself, according to a 2015 Harris Poll.

Similar events take place in other parts of the country to remember that, while European settlers escaped persecution in their own country, their arrival also heralded unspeakable loss for native people which still continues today.



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
