September always meant two things growing up. Back-to-school and football. It still means two things. Pumpkin spice overkill and football. While football is experiencing some evolving pains around player safety, it is still going to be there, every Sunday. It will outlast childhoods and seasonal flavor obsessions. It will stoke the competitive fires inside and warm your mom's chili for dinner. Throughout Steelers fandom, the beginning of the season is Christmas in September. Although it's been awhile since getting the gift they wanted. Will this year be any different?

Many a fan got their wish granted early this year as Todd Haley's contract was not renewed as offensive coordinator. They weren't the only ones. Ben Roethlisberger now has his man, Randy Fichtner as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach and he expects a seamless transition. "We'll be able to keep

the ball rolling," said Ben. "I don't think it was any secret that we have a great relationship and I think that's what they wanted to propel moving forward. I think we're going to be working together which I think is the key. That's very important."

All the major players on offense will be back – including the late arriving Le'Veon Bell. After missing all of training camp and preseason last year, the big money contract hunter didn't rack up a one hundred-yard ground game until week four. Yet still, the production powerhouse ended the season with 1,946 yards from scrimmage, second most in the league. And with the offensive lingo remaining the same with Fichtner taking over, it's not as if Bell will have to learn a new offense. On his walk year, expect big things out of number 26. Antonio Brown will do Antonio Brown things, sophomore seasons for running back James Conner and wideout Julu





Smith-Schuster will be fun to watch, and seeing what big play rookie receiver James Washington has up his sleeve could be exciting.

The questions about the 2018 Pittsburgh Steelers land squarely on the shoulders of fourth-year coordinator Keith Butler and his defense. Will the decision to retain most of the defensive coaching staff pay off? How will hiring Tom Bradley as secondary coach impact the weakest unit from a year ago? What will the defense look like after an offseason knowing dynamic linebacker Ryan Shazier will not play football this year?

"We'll have to be versatile," Butler said. "Sometimes they'll have more wide receivers on the field. Well, we have to get more defensive backs on the field. That's just the way the NFL is going at this point. There

are going to be different things we have to defend, especially if you look around our division. We have to be versatile enough to handle it."

Versatile being the theme of this group, there may be times when seven defensive backs will be on the field while several linebackers watch from the sideline. It's the "dollar" defensive subpackage that will feature the speed and athleticism of the bigger bodied safeties, like 6-foot-1, 217 pound rookie, Terrell Edmunds. "He's super athletic," said veteran cornerback, Joe Haden. "He's really strong. He's fast, he's quick, he's smart and he can tackle well. When you have guys that can cover and tackle, they can cover tight ends. They can cover backs. The matchup favors us in those situations."

A lot of moving parts will have to come together





with key players missing time with nagging injuries this preseason, including second-year linebacker T.J. Watt and free agent acquisition Morgan Burnett. Fans did get a chance to watch the impact defensive linemen Cameron Heyward and Stephon Tuitt have on the game as the pair combined for two sacks against the Titans in the third preseason game. They are a force and the straw that stirs the defensive drink. And to make it deep into the playoffs, that drink has to be strong.

Just like last year, the season starts in Cleveland. Hopefully the way it ends will be different. The standard is the standard as Mike Tomlin likes to say. And the standard is measured in Lombardi trophies.

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Movie Reviews

NIGHTWIRE - FILM REVIEWS by FIORE

THE MEG

THE MEG may be the last great summer popcorn flick of 2018. It contains all the elements of a summer blockbuster, including: a tragic hero seeking redemption; an erotic love interest; children in turmoil; friends and skeptics; spectacular special effects; campy dialogue; a rousing soundtrack; and one very large prehistoric shark with plenty of unsuspecting beach goers. Makes the Mesosaurus in the waves at the end of JURASSIC WORLD: FORBIDDEN KINGDOM look like child's play.

I saw this film in IMAX. It was impressive. The SFX are decent. There are, however at least six scenes obviously shot with 3D in mind. I suspect seeing THE MEG in 3D and IMAX is probably the best venue. It would be worth the extra price of the ticket for the full effect.

The book the film is based on was published decades ago. This screenplay, penned by Dean Georgaris, Jon and Erich Hoeber, improves on the original story, making it more palatable for the viewer. They also incorporate respectful nods to the original, and still the best shark film, JAWS, by Stephen Spielberg. The homage scenes are readily detectable and provide relaxing chuckles amid rather intense action.

Beside top-notch SFX, provided by Production Designer Grant Major and Cinematographer Tom Stern, THE MEG offers a strong cast. Jason Statham plays Jonas. He is a disgraced hero, held in ridicule because he claims he saw a Megalodon during a rescue operation. Five years after he is ostracized, he is proven right and now is the only man capable of stopping the prehistoric beast from devouring half of Southeast Asia.

With Statham is BingBing Li. She plays Suyin, a deep sea researcher and daughter of the manager of the Manus One research vessel. Earlier in the year, I reported Li was in trouble in China. As one of China's largest and most powerful movie stars, Li kept two sets of ledgers, to avoid paying massive Chinese government income taxes. She, and her representatives, hope she makes a big splash in THE MEG to stay in Hollywood and become a star here, too. She looks good in THE MEG and if the box office returns back the gamble, her wish will come true.

Robert Taylor plays Doc Heller, the skeptic leading the charge against Jonas' resurrection. Good to see him on the big screen after his excellent performance as LONGMIRE for the past six TV seasons. Ruby Rose, Rainn Wilson, Cliff Curtis, Page Kennedy and Winston Chao, and Shuya Sophia Cai also make appearances. They all perform well, but Rose is displaced. Normally, she plays a very butch female, with a large chip on her shoulder. This role does not call for that, and her black



finger nail polish, tattoos and sculpted goth hairstyle play against her role. You may think I'm playing an old-fashioned mien, but it is doubtful someone with this appearance would be hired by a deep sea Japanese research firm. Reality; it cost Samantha Fox a number of parts, and it will cost Rose some also.

I enjoyed THE MEG. It was solid entertainment for a warm summer night. It's the kind of film you see, and then spend several rounds in the neighborhood pub discussing the scenes, the effects, the stuff that wouldn't work, and of course the possibility of strange life under the sea. Not a bad way to close out the summer.

THE CAPTAIN

As one of Pittsburgh's, and the nation's, premiere critics, I find it pleasantly enjoyable when studios provide foreign films throughout the year. Normally, films that could contend for Best Foreign Film consideration are dumped on critics weeks before nomination ballots, causing a logjam of movies requiring a more intense viewing experience. Having received THE CAPTAIN this early in the year, gave me the opportunity to watch, and enjoy this film in a leisurely manner; and that, after all, is how films should be viewed.

For some years, filmmaker Robert Schwentke played the Hollywood game with marked success, but his return to Germany with the release of THE CAPTAIN could be his tour de force. This film is engrossing and serves as a chilling treatise on some disturbing commonalities of mankind.

It is mere weeks before the end of WWII. The German army, on the brink of collapse, is plagued by deserters and looters, seeking survival before the country's cataclysmic end. One such deserter is private Willi Herold, played exceptionally well by Max Hubacher. Chased through the forest by the Nazis,



he manages to elude his pursuers and begin a trek towards a new life. Along the way, he stumbles upon an abandoned car. Inside is a suitcase with a Nazi Captain's uniform. Willi steals the uniform and is amazed at how the people he meets quickly accept him as an authority figure. Willi uses his guile to continue the ruse while slowly transforming into the very persona he ran away from at the film's beginning. Ironically, Willi's troupe of followers is comprised of deserters like him, but to whom he gives a perceived second chance.

Starring with Hubacher are: Milan Peschel; Frederick Lau; Waldemar Kobus; and Alexander Fehling. Most notable in the cast, outside of Hubacher is Peschel, who plays Freytag, Willi's right hand man.

THE CAPTAIN is too long. Though an engrossing tale, several key sequences, like the exploits in Camp II are repetitious. This is a common trait in foreign films. American filmmakers, at one time, could pride themselves on brevity. For the sake of diversity, Hollywood became enamored with European, Asian and Mexican directors, who brought with them their own editors, and American films, as I decry on numerous occasions, also became too long. Editor Michal Czarnecki could easily trim twenty-five minutes from THE CAPTAIN, which would serve to make the film even more powerful.

Florian Ballhaus is remarkable behind the camera. Combined with the efforts of Production Designer Harald Turzer and Set Decorator Alwara Thaler, they present THE CAPTAIN in glorious black and white, giving the film an authentic mien. The use of lighting is exceptional.

Save from the little peccadillo of length, THE CAPTAIN is an amazing film from both the technical and thespian perspectives. I quite enjoyed it, and think you will, too. It will make my short list for Best Foreign Film, even though it's only July.

MILE 22

You could subtitle this movie Peter Berg does Bourne. He takes a decent action script, and one of Hollywood's brightest up and coming marital arts stars, and sabotages both with slipshod cinematography, terrible editing and progressive political views.

Berg and Mark Wahlberg are no strangers. They have teamed up for a few good films, like DEEPWATER HORIZON and LONE SURVIVOR. Why he opted to sabotage MILE 22 is beyond my comprehension. He could easily have one of the finer action films of the year; I guess he just lost his mind.

The first thing Berg did wrong was hire Lea Carpenter as screenwriter. It is her first endeavor. She is normally an editor for Esquire Magazine. If you've ever read Esquire, it is a magazine which caters to the metrosexual male and is rife with progressive liberal ideology. This is why you can get a year's subscription for six bucks. No self-respecting American male wants to read that dribble, but Carpenter fills her script with it, detracting from the story and the action.

The political overtones are visual, too. When the black ops team sets up, one of the operatives decorates his workstation with bobble heads of the Presidents. In the first sequence, the camera ends on an Obama bobble head. In the next, it ends on a two shot of Trump and Obama bobble heads. This is an obvious ploy to elicit cheers, or raspberries from the audience. Cheesy shot selection.

And, on that subject, for some unknown reason, Berg teamed with cinematographer Jacques Jouffret to shoot the action sequences in the Jason Bourne style. This is the worse type of cinematography for action films. Its main purpose is to hide the fact the star of the film, like Matt Damon in the instance of Bourne, can't fight. But this film features Iko Uwais, arguably the best martial arts star today. He is best known for his starring roles in THE RAID, and its sequel, THE RAID 2. He is truly a master. But his scenes, which he choreographs himself, are chopped and cut so severely, it is impossible to see what's happening. A total waste of talent and the viewer's time.



Mark Wahlberg is James Silva, head of an elite black ops team. He is portrayed as a psychopath, manic depressive. Anyone who knows anything about the training to become a member of a special ops outfit knows this type of individual would never make the final cut. It's just another subtle political dig, fostering the myth that everyone in this service is mentally deranged. Other members of his team include Alice Kerr (Lauren Cohan), who is merely present to show a woman can be a black ops operative and a caring mother simultaneously; Bishop (John Malkovich) who runs the technical operation and never once suggests he should 'get the pig'; and Sam Snow (Rhonda Rousey) who is almost as annoying on screen as she is on Monday Night Raw. Thankfully, she doesn't make it past the film's mid-point. Finally, Iko Uwais plays Li Noor, the double agent with vital information on a weapon of mass destruction which he will provide for sanctuary. Notice again, the working of WMDs into the script; that ruse hasn't been poignant since the Bush Administration.

Editing by Melissa Lawson and Colby Parker is frantic; mainly to mask the poor cinematography and to allow the actors to spew progressive propaganda quickly, hoping to slide it past the viewer before comprehension sets.

This movie had the makings of a classic action spy adventure. Using an unproven scriptwriter, just to satisfy Hollywood's Woman Warrior agenda, and opting to incorporate cinematography not worthy of its stars, drag this endeavor to the bowels of the genre. I truly want to see Iko Uwais become a huge star in Hollywood. He is extremely talented. MILE 22 does him no justice at all.

CHRISTOPHER ROBIN

Years ago, yea I sadly say it was decades ago, Kenny Loggins penned a now classic tune dubbed "House at Pooh Corner". Though it dealt with the childhood characters created by A.A. Milne, the song was intended for adults and not children. The same can be said of Disney's latest film, CHRISTOPHER ROBIN. Certainly, the movie features Pooh, Eeyore, Tigger, Piglet and the rest of the crew from the Thousand Acres Woods, and they are cute and lovable, though honestly less so than their cartoon counterparts, but they do not dominate the screenplay. There are long segments where they do not appear, causing the yungins' in the press screening to become restless. So, like Loggins' tune of a time when songs were actually worth listening to, CHRISTOPHER ROBIN will sit much better with the adults than the kids.

Ewan McGregor plays CHRISTOPHER ROBIN. He is now an adult, and as such, has forgotten his playful side. He feels the pressures of trying to earn a substantial living to provide for his family and in the process is away from them for too long. This is the same tome Disney used with Robin Williams in HOOK. It was necessary for Peter Pan to discover the innocence and fun of youth to once again become the person everyone loves.



This is a good theme for Disney, and really the only one they can cultivate without alienating a large portion of the audience. Disney, for the past decade and a half, is nothing more than a propaganda machine for the progressive, liberal, socialist left. They are firmly entrenched in the Woman Warrior Agenda, support fully the failed tenets of multiculturalism and celebrate the single parent family as a cultural cornerstone. But, this one theme of rediscovering youth once grown, is an ideology not based on political propaganda, and is one of Disney's strongest assets.

The script, written by Alex Ross Perry and Tom McCarthy is standard Disney template, and there is never a doubt how the movie will end. Scenes establishing character and plot often drag, so that even though the movie is under two hours, it often feels as if it is wearisome, especially to the kids. The final reels are filled with the animals and slapstick comedy. If the kids make it that far, they'll love the climax.

It will probably be impossible to see the movie on your own. More than likely some little tot or two will follow along. And that might be a shame, for CHRISTOPHER ROBIN is best appreciated by adults, especially those who have lost their ability to play, and just have fun.

A RECKONING

As Westerns go, A RECKONING holds more promise than it delivers. A simple tale about a woman who seeks revenge after her husband is brutally murdered, it often struggles to reach its 80 minute length. There are extensive scenery shots, which are spectacular, by Director of Photography Justin Janovitz. When teamed with the haunting score of Jared Forman, they make for the equivalent of audio-visual New Age meditation rooms. There are many of them, simply because Editor Mike Tang had about 62 minutes of plot footage.

It's not that the script by Justin Lee, who also directed the film, is weak. It's a fairly standard revenge script that encompasses the treasured Woman Warrior Agenda, the latest sacrament in Tinseltown. The lead character is not a 90 pound woman who has viewed a few of Billy Blanks Tai-Bo tapes, and can now toss



around grown men with ease. No, Mary O'Malley, played by June Dietrich, is a woman devasted by the brutal murder of her husband and is tired of the platitudes handed out by village leader Lance Henriksen. Spurred by the village matriarch played by Meg Foster, Mary packs traveling essentials, a rifle and pistol in search of the murderer with her own brand of justice.

It's easy to see why the killer has escaped capture. The bounty hunters hired by the townsfolk fight amongst themselves while on the trail, each wanting the bounty. The hunt becomes so competitive, even the sheriffs are in danger from the greedy men. Into this foray comes Mary. Most of the men are chivalrous enough not to kill her. So, it's not too surprising when she finally manages to find the killer in his lair.

Normally, the killer's motives, always explained in the final reel, are done through dialogue. Lee, however, has his killer, played by Kevin Mahely, who played the hero in last month's BIG LEGEND, screaming a tribal rant outside of his cave. He is apparently the original environmentalist, convinced that only he can bring balance back to Mother Earth. It's an odd choice, not fitting the norm, and giving a surreal aspect to the scene.

There are other holes in the tale. For example: when Mary catches up with the bounty hunter who stole her horse and bests him, why doesn't she get her horse back, rather than continuing on foot?

A RECKONING isn't a bad film, it's just poorly paced. Papa Octopus is the epitome of an Independent film studio. It has a cache of stars who double behind the camera as well and they manage to snag a top name actor or two for their productions to provide a bit of gravitas. While this outing isn't as strong as BIG LEGEND, it's nice to see the studio taking its best shot.

Once again, Papa Octopus will distribute through Vegas Baby, releasing A RECKONING on this weekend on both VOD and home video.

DR. BRINKS AND DR. BRINKS

It is exceptionally difficult to produce and then distribute successfully, an Independent movie. That's why I must give kudos

to any one individual, or studio who tries. DR. BRINKS AND DR. BRINKS is the brainchild of Josh Crockett. He directed the film, produced it, co-wrote it with Jon Pappas and served as editor. Valiant effort, but in this endeavor, Crockett wore too many hats.

As an editor, Crockett commits moral sin. I can hear thousands of my former students yelling "jump cuts!" And, they would be right. A jump cut is never to be used, period. It's lazy, sloppy editing, and there are always far better alternatives that do not disrupt the narrative. Crockett uses jump cuts and should ensure a solid editor is in his next film budget.

The pace of DR. BRINKS AND DR. BRINKS is monotonous. The film is slow and boring. While part of the problem is the editing, the rest lies in the script. Crockett and Pappas are trying desperately to make this a comedy folks can relate to; but they cannot capture the dark comedy the story calls for, creating a few scenes eliciting mere smirks.

Hindering the film is its subject matter. Death and grieving are seldom humorous, unless it's the funeral scene in SCARY MOVIE 3. The Brinks are a dysfunctional family. Mom and dad largely ignore their kids, and the siblings ignore their parents and each other. That all changes when the parents die in a plane crash. Now Marcus (Scott Rodgers) and Michelle (Kristin Slaysman, who also produced) are forced to confront each other, and their own grief.

To complicate issues, the parents were both doctors, working in third world countries to "help mankind". They have a global reputation of being "saints". Michelle and Marcus are far from sainthood, and further chagrined when they discover their parents pilfered millions of dollars under the guise of charities. Now the FBI and IRS threaten to bankrupt both kids, while they attempt to deal with the lose of their parents and preserve their saintly reputation.

Heady stuff here, and admittedly it would take an amazing comedy writer to turn these morbid plot twists into a laugh out loud comedy. Rather, DR. BRINKS AND DR. BRINKS plays to the minority crowd who see laughter in tragedy and revel at others' misfortune. While Marcus is established as the protagonist, he suffers and loses the most. Hard to cultivate audience empathy with that scenario.

DR. BRINKS AND DR. BRINKS also stars Ashley Spillers as Alex, Marcus' wife. She uses a moment of indiscretion on Michelle's part to turn her back on a pretty solid relationship with Marcus. Robert Longstreet plays Alex's dad who turns the awkward situation topsy-turvy when he is seduced by Michelle.

Comedy is a funny thing – pun intended. What one finds funny, another may not. I thought DR. BRINKS AND DR. BRINKS fell short repeatedly on presenting a script with the proper elements of dark comedy. And, then there are the jump cuts. It plods more than it puns.

Dogfish Head Craft Brewery Punkin' Ale – A full-bodied 7% ABV brown ale with smooth hints of pumpkin and brown sugar. Dogfish Head brews Punkin Ale with pumpkin meat, brown sugar and spices. As the season cools, this is the perfect beer to warm up with. A real classic in the pumpkin beer world, this is one gourd-based beer that's worth your time and taste.

Heavy Seas Beer Greater Pumpkin - In the worthiest of pumpkin patches and during the silence of the midnight hour, the Greater Pumpkin rises up and pours a rich deep and orange color. Heady aromas of bourbon, cinnamon,

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ginger, allspice and clove linger over the thick white head of this giant brew. Its love at first sip with this 10% ABV beer as the full malt body, dominated by British crystal malt, brown sugar and pumpkin all vying for a front row seat and all winning out. Bourbon barrel aging rounds out the flavors with notes of oak, vanilla, and bourbon.

Lancaster Brewing Company Baked Pumpkin - Have your pie and drink it too! Bold flavor with a deep amber color, our big Baked Pumpkin Ale is sure to remind you of Grandma's homemade pumpkin pie. Coming in at 7.3% ABV, it'll pack a little more punch than Grandma could hope to bake into her pie, that's for sure.

Lancaster Brewing Company Oktoberfest - This impressive take on the classic fall lager uses seven different malts and three varieties of imported and domestic hops, as well as authentic Bavarian lager yeast. Light in copper color, this 5.5% ABV beer is full-bodied with a nice malt sweetness.

North Country Brewing Company Late Night Pumpkin -

For the fall season, North Country brews their Late Night Pumpkin with a healthy dose of pumpkin, spice, and of course this is all done late at night, when the pumpkins taste their best. Coming in at 6.1% ABV with a gold color and a nice spiced character, Late Night Pumpkin is a canned beer you definitely need to try, and at 6.1% ABV, it's just about as perfect of a pumpkin beer as you could hope for.





Travel: Bigger'n Dallas



When you arrive in the sprawling 'Big D', it's hard not to think of the award-winning 1970s television show "Dallas'. Today, this major city is fast-paced, and still somewhat reflective of the old saying, 'Everything's Bigger in Texas'!! Its population exemplifies that, as the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex is the fourth-most populous metropolitan area in America! (Fun Fact: "Bigger'n Dallas" is a local expression people use to point out someone or something that should be noticed because of the way they look, act, etc.).

Be aware that you've entered Dallas Cowboy territory, where seemingly everyone who lives here is proudly a cheerleader (or at least a fervent fan) of one of the National Football League's most popular franchises. It's also the city where the iconic Texas State Fair is held every year. The Texas State Fair is one of the most beloved American events, one which celebrates everything Texan! This is where, according to the FBI, President John F. Kennedy was assassinated by Lee Harvey Oswald. This intriguing museum not only depicts in depth the events of that ill-fated day (November 22nd, 1963) which shocked America, but gives an intimate look into the life, times, and legacy of President Kennedy.

Speaking of history, young and old are mesmerized at the Perot Museum of Nature and Science where you can literally stand next to a full scale T Rex. While the museum has nearly a dozen fascinating permanent exhibits-- including the T. Boone Pickens Life Then and Now Hall-- you don't want to miss the Ultimate Dinosaurs Traveling Exhibition. This experience, focusing on the massive prehistoric creatures that roamed the Earth, will leave you awestruck, and is also home of the first mounted skeletal dinosaur in the state of Texas.



This museum offers much more than one can write about including an intriguing Sports Hall, an Expanding Universe Hall and interactive technology and hands-on discovery that will bring you from the depths of the ocean to fascinating DNA discoveries. While here, don't miss The Hoglund Foundation Theater, a National Geographic Experience which is the Museum's cutting-edge theater. This state-of-the-art theater has 4K digital projection, RealD 3D capabilities, and immersive surround sound.

Kids five and under won't want to miss the opportunity to use scoops, shovels, and rakes to discover replica fossils in the shaded outdoor dig area! Take the elevator down to the ground level into the Moody Family Children's Museum, and get digging! Admission Tip: While general admission is free for permanent exhibits, the best and most cost saving deal is to purchase the Total Experience Package. This offer includes the museum's special exhibit, Ultimate Dinosaurs, and a 3-D film in The Hoglund Foundation Theater. Prices for this ultimate bundle vary (depending on whether the package is purchased for a child or adult) with prices ranging from \$26 \$38 for non-members). (Food Tip: The Café, which serves an American Fare and more, is operated by Wolfgang Puck and has daily scrumptious spe-

cials).

Now, remember: You are in the heart of the Dallas Arts District, so there's much more to see and do in-and-around this amazing museum like the extraordinary Dallas Museum of Art and the adjacent Nasher Sculpture Center. The Nasher has both modern and contemporary sculptures, and is located on a 2.4-acre site. There are literally hundreds of sculptures primarily created by some of the 20th-century's greatest artists.

Want more great places to explore? Visit Klyde Warren Park, the 5.2-acre downtown public park that rests over the Woodall Rodgers Freeway. With five daily activities (and more), there's always something to do in this beautiful green space; and if you are hungry there are food trucks on Friday that serve a wide variety of unique and artisan foods. Another fascinating find is the George W. Bush Presidential Library and Museum; this center has state-of-the-art interactive exhibits and uncovers issues and events of the former president's administration. In addition, there are also 43,000 gifts given to the President and First Lady housed here plus a full-size replica of White House Oval Office. (Big Tip: By purchasing a Dallas CityPASS, you can save money if you plan on visiting a handful of these attractions and much more).



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

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

Hamill starts with Jane Austen's story about the Bennet sisters and their search for love in 19th century England,







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


