


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
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

After The Bye & Beyond

Despite inexplicable losses to NFL bottom feeders, Tampa Bay and the New York Jets, the Steelers are in the mix for the post season, currently in position for a wild card berth and breathing down the necks of the division leading Cincinnati Bengals. It will be a fascinating stretch run in the AFC North, where no team has a losing record and all four are in the playoff hunt. With five games left, two against the team ahead of them in the standings, crunch time has arrived.


Crunch time coincides with life A.B. for the Steelers. After Blount. The "Killer B's" didn't include the reported malcontent, who produced 266 yards of offense on 65 carries through eleven games. The disenchanted backup saw his carries dwindle over the past month, as Le'Veon Bell proved to be the more effective option out of the backfield. This is nothing new to the punchy tailback, as it seems his attitude has forced himself out of the game plan in the past. After being undrafted in 2010 and waived by the Tennessee Titans, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers took a chance on him. He racked up a thousand yard season in his rookie year, and became only the second undrafted rookie running back to do so in NFL history, but it was all downhill from there. The following season he had less than 200 carries and bottomed out with just 41 in his third and last year with the team. Le'Veon Bell carried the ball 33 times versus the Titans on Monday Night Football alone.



Maybe that was the last straw for Blount, who by numerous accounts had started to be trouble in the locker room the past few weeks. A nationally televised game versus the team that cut him before he could step on the field and the emotionally charged Blount didn't get a single carry. There ended a running back tandem that looked like it was friendly both on and off the field. From bonding over marijuana and Miranda Rights to an animosity fueled tantrum that ultimately sent Blount packing, you have to ask this question . . . did Bell escape the consequences of a career influenced by Blount? Would he have been destined to follow a similar path? A dead end journeyman type of existence in the National Football League? A career that had so much promise but was sidetracked by shenanigans and immaturity? The sophomore runner is lucky to not have had to find out. So is Steeler Nation.

Blount won't be missed, except maybe in the depth department, but offensively, Ben, Bell and Brown will probably do fine without his services for the remainder of the season. In eleven games, Roethlisberger is third in the league in passing yards (3270) and has tossed 24 touchdowns with just six interceptions. Antonio Brown leads all NFL receivers in yards and receptions and Le'Veon Bell is averaging nearly five yards a carry and is second to only DeMarco Murray in yardage, not to





mention his 57 catches to go along with his ground attack. No wonder Blount didn't see the field much.

After Ben Roethlisberger's record breaking two game stretch of 12 touchdowns and zero picks, he has come back down to earth the last two games, throwing more interceptions than touchdowns (3-2) and getting sacked seven times. In the second half of the Titans game, after Roethlisberger was taken down five times, offensive coordinator Todd Haley turned to the ground game to stabilize the offense. The offensive line play agreed with the call, and Bell churned out over two hundred yards en route to winning a game that had to be won after the embarrassing loss to the one win Jets the week before.

Will a rediscovered running game cure the play down to the competition sickness that ails this team? Mike Tomlin insists it's not a mindset problem, but numbers say otherwise. Since 2012, the Steelers have lost seven games against teams with not just losing records, but disturbing records, a winning percentage of .200 or less. No matter how you want to spin it to make it look better – instead of looking at records “at the time they played the game” some may look to final records which softens the blow a bit – losing to teams that stink THAT BAD will shine the spotlight right on preparedness.

Sometimes I wonder . . . if the Steelers knew how poor a team the 2013 NFC South champion Panthers really were back in week three, would the score have been closer than the 18 point smack down they laid on Carolina? That's all conjecture at this point. Regardless of how they got here, they are here. One of four AFC teams currently with seven or more wins. There are five games left in the season, including two versus the division leading Bengals. The putrid NFC South provides two of the remaining opponents (Saints and Falcons) and a Kansas City team is the fifth adversary, an important game versus an AFC competitor.

It's the stretch run for the Steelers and they are in a better position now than they were the past two 8-8 seasons. The playoffs are in sight and Le'Veon Bell is leading the way.

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

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Christmas Beers Showcase

Christmas is a time of giving, and with all the family gatherings, parties, and get-togethers that come along with this feeling of giving comes a time to enjoy some amazing seasonal craft beers. Many breweries save some of their biggest and boldest beers for the cold winter months. Sometimes this is done to match with the seasonal hop harvest at the end of the fall, and more often than not it's done to help get all of us through the coldest of months thanks to big amazing beers.

History of Christmas Beers

Before getting to some of the best Christmas beers around, it's worthwhile to take a minute to see just where these beers came from, and why we enjoy these specific styles only in the winter months.

The tradition of brewing very special beers for the Christmas season has much deeper roots than what you may think. These types of beers most likely started in the Scandinavian countries with the Vikings. The Viking people traditionally enjoyed strong malty "beer" in the winter months to celebrate their Jul, or as we know it today, Yule.

The Vikings would offer some of their beer up to their gods, and no weak drink would do for Odin, Thor, and Frey, so big beers were the law of the land, so to speak. Even after converting to Christianity, the Scandinavian countries still kept their love of these drinks, even requiring a certain amount of beer per household for Christmas.

These traditions spread to other countries, most notably England, where modern brewing got its start. The British respected the idea of strong Christmas beers before the addition of the Scandinavian beliefs, but both seemed to work together to give a unique twist to both styles of beer.

While the beers of the Vikings and early British were very different than we enjoy today, the tradition of brewing very special beers to celebrate the season continues today with some of the best examples of the style. The British don't make as many Christmas beers as they used to, leaving

the best up to the US and the Belgians, and with a mix of both, your Christmas is bound to be a merry one indeed.


US Brewed Christmas Beers

While the tradition of brewing Christmas beers may have started overseas, some of the best versions of these beers are definitely brewed right here in the US. American craft beer has exploded with a variety of Christmas beers ranging from bitter and hoppy to sweet and spicy, all of which are more than welcome in the colder months.

While many of these beers fall into what is known as the Winter Warmer category, there are IPAs, red ales, and even new interpretations of age old beverages like Glogg. The variety of US craft Christmas beers is a testament to how craft brewing has taken hold of the US and is being driven by it, too.

Southern Tier 2XMAS – Inspired by a Swedish drink known as Glogg, 2XMAS is Southern Tier's way of celebrating not only the Christmas beer traditions long past, but also the new ones respected today of strong flavorful beers with a spicy kick. 2XMAS comes in at 8% ABV and features tastes of figs, orange peels, cardamom, cinnamon, clove, and ginger. Even though Glogg was traditionally served warm, this is definitely best served chilled.

Breckenridge Christmas Ale – Featuring flavors of caramel and chocolate, Christmas Ale from Breckenridge Brewery in Colorado is a great example of what a solid Christmas beer should be. With extra flavor and a little extra alcohol, coming in at 7.4% ABV, this seasonal beer really hits the spot on a cold night. Dubbed an American Strong Ale, this full-bodied beer features a medium hop character paired with tastes of caramel and chocolate.



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Abita Christmas – While New Orleans, Louisiana isn't the first place you may imagine when you think about Christmas, Abita Brewing's Christmas Ale will definitely get you into the holiday spirit. Brewed as a special dark ale, the exact recipe changes every year so there's always something different to try. Generally always with a toasty body and a nutty taste, the ABV varies and specific ingredients may change, but the one certainty is that this beer is always great.

Anchor Christmas – Speaking of beers that change from year to year, possibly the original Christmas beer in the US is definitely Christmas ale from Anchor Brewing in San Francisco. This year marks the 40th anniversary of Anchor's Christmas Ale, which means there have been 40 different Christmas beers along with 40 different trees on the label. The tree for 2014 is the Giant Sequoia, and the label is drawn by the same person who drew the first one in 1975. In fact, this label's tree is as big as it would look if it were planted all the way back when the first Christmas Ale rolled off the bottling line.

Rogue Santa's Private Reserve – Brewed as a red ale, Santa's Private Reserve is a double-hopped beer that's reddish in color with a roasty, malty flavor with a well-balanced spruce finish. This beer utilizes malts and hops grown on Rogue's own farm as well as "free range coastal water" and Pacman yeast.


Belgian Christmas Beers

Us Americans don't have the market cornered on Christmas beers, even though we make quite a few amazing ones. To get some truly unique Christmas beers you have to travel across the pond to the beer-laden country of Belgium. Here, beers have been crafted and perfected over hundreds of years until they're just about perfect and once you try these, you'll probably agree.

St. Bernardus Christmas Ale – This is a dark seasonal beer brewed in the classic Quadrupel style of Belgium's best Abbey Ales. This beer comes in at 10% ABV with a unique spicy character that's thanks to the St. Bernardus house yeast. Expect to taste slight hints of molasses, apricots, licorice, and marzipan that are balanced out by a slightly sweet undertone.

N'Ice Chouffe – N'Ice Chouffe is a strong brown ale that is warm, spicy, and overall a perfectly balanced beer. Traditionally left unfiltered, this beer pours a slightly hazy amber with a thick off-white head. Coming in at 10% ABV, this is one beer that will definitely keep you warm all winter.

All of these beers and more can be found on draft as well as in bottles throughout the Pittsburgh area, and are proudly distributed by Frank B. Fuhrer Wholesale.



Winter Warmer: Winter Beers For Cold Snowy Nights


A winter warmer is traditionally a malty sweet beer that's big in both flavor and body. These winter beers can have spices, or they can rely on the basic beer ingredients of malt, hops, yeast, and water to give them their unique tastes.

Winter beers that use spices follow an age-old tradition of wassail, which was a hot mulled cider that was traditionally enjoyed as an integral part of wassailing, which was the act of going from door to door singing Christmas carols. The tradition of drinking spiced beverages during the winter months goes back to medieval times and was the equivalent of today's spiced holiday beers.

There are definitely non-spiced and non traditionally flavored beers meant for the winter months too, and these, paired with their spiced brethren help to give all of us a variety of beers to enjoy during these cold winter months.

Winter Beers to Try

21st Amendment Fireside Chat – Fireside Chat from 21st Amendment Brewing out of Lakewood, New York is a great example of a spiced winter beer. They start this beer off as an English-style dark ale and as 21st Amendment puts it, “improvise with a variety of spices” to create a uniquely spiced winter ale. This spiced beer comes in at 7.9% ABV, making it a uniquely strong spiced beer perfect for chilly weather and just like FDR's Depression-era radio shows, it's a real kick in the butt, in a very good way.



Brooklyn Winter Ale –

Hailing from the Empire State, Brooklyn Brewery makes their Winter Ale in the Scottish ale style using a variety of malt including Scottish Maris Otter, English Crystal, and American oat. Hopped with only Willamette and coming in at 6.1% ABV, this non-spiced beer is surprisingly toasty and malty while staying fairly balanced.

Brooklyn Black Chocolate Stout

– Most people will agree that a good winter

beer is dark and strong, with subtle undertones of toasty character and alcohol hotness. Black Chocolate Stout is a Russian Imperial Stout that comes in at 10% ABV. Sweet chocolate pairs perfectly with hints of hop bitterness and toasty malt character.

Black Chocolate Stout is a beer that is great fresh as well as aged, which means you should pick up a six-pack to drink now, and another to age for a few years. Properly kept in a dark, dry, cool place in your basement this beer will mellow and blend the already expertly melded flavors for years to come. This beer pairs perfectly with desserts like cheesecake, ice cream, fine cheeses, and as Brooklyn's website says, “roaring fireplaces,” too.

Boulder Slope Style Ale – If there's anyone that knows what beer is best for the cold winter months it should be a brewery located in Boulder, Colorado. Boulder Brewery brews their Slope Style Winter IPA to give us a hoppy, bitter beer for the winter months.

For those of us that aren't into the spiced beers and dark stouts, Slope Style gives us a hoppy beer that features a big piney hop beer that's red in color and brewed with five different malts and a healthy dose of Horizon hops.


Slope Style Winter IPA comes in at a respectable 6.4% ABV and gives a full body that's welcome with such a hoppy beer. If you're looking for a great IPA this winter, check out Slope Style.

Flying Dog K-9 Cruiser – Known for beers that are in your face and amazing, Flying Dog's K-9 Winter Ale is a winter warmer at its finest. This 7.4% ABV beer features a deep ruby color with a light khaki head. K-9 has aromas of bread, plums, toasted malt, toffee, and slight earthiness that give way to a taste of toasty toffee, caramel, and a slight toffee brown sugar finish.

Overall, this beer has lots going on and is great if you're looking for the true spicy winter warmer style. Great for enjoying next to a fire or just with your feet up in your house, Flying Dog did a great job on their version of a winter warmer.

Deschutes Jubelale – This marks the first year Deschutes' winter seasonal offering is available to the Pittsburgh area,





and we're definitely lucky that it is. Called a Strong Ale, Jubelale comes in at 6.7% ABV and 60 IBUs, meaning this isn't your average winter warmer.

Spiciness pairs well with the higher bitterness and features intriguing, layered flavors of dried fruits, toffee, and chicory to round out an amazing beer. Each year the label of Jubelale is different while the beer stays the same, so make sure to save a bottle for your collection each year. Originally brewed in 1988, Jubelale has a much longer history than most of the beers in this category and definitely in this list.



Long Trail Sick Day IPA – Long Trail gives us another great entry in the winter IPA category with their Sick Day IPA. While many of us have to use real sick days in the winter months to help fend off illness, this beer will make you want to call in a sick day just so you can sit back and enjoy a few.

Sick Day IPA is an unfiltered IPA at 6.8% ABV that features piney, spicy hop flavors and aromas that are balanced nicely with toasty malts. While you may not think an IPA is a great beer for the winter, this one may very well change your mind.

Southern Tier Old Man Winter – There are winter warmers, then there's Old Man Winter from Southern Tier, out of Lakewood New York. Southern Tier starts with a traditional winter ale and ups the ante with a solid hop presence and a hearty malt backbone. While this is an unspiced beer, Old Man Winter



has tastes of bittersweet cocoa, nutty, sweet malts and earthy hops.

A medium bodied beer, 7% ABV Old Man Winter pairs well with rich cheeses, winter squash, hearty stews, and roasted meats. The three varieties of hops and two different malts used in this beer give it a depth of taste and aroma that's hard to beat and could easily be used as the standard for winter

Samuel Smith Winter Welcome – The only British entry in this list is also one of the best winter ales available today. Samuel Smith Brewing, which is celebrating their 25th anniversary this year brews their Winter Welcome each year to welcome the coming colder months. This UK beer comes in at 6% ABV and features one of the most true-to-style winter warmers available.

Brewed in the British style, Winter Welcome has a more malty sweet taste than its American counterparts, which is a pleasant change from the more hop-heavy varieties available today. Winter Welcome features a sweet caramel malty taste with a slight spice presence. The beer itself is lighter bodied than most US versions, but this makes the beer more drinkable and gives it an overall great feeling.

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A Bounty of Brews For the Winter Season



It's that time of year again, when families get together and the winter beers make their appearance. From dark and malty beers like Bell's Expedition Stout to the spiced Christmas and winter beers like Troegs Mad Elf, to fresh, hoppy beers like Stone Enjoy By, there's a winter beer for everyone.

What better way to celebrate the change in seasons than to take a look at the best beers around for the colder months. Tony from Vecenie's Distributing rounded up his favorite winter beers as well as a few brand new ones that are just available now. You may not have made a Christmas list since you were young, but this list might make you start back up again, no Hills catalog required.

Anderson Valley

Starting at the top of our alphabetical list is Anderson Valley Brewing Company. Anderson Valley was founded in 1987 and since then has grown into a varied and respected brewery that produces everything from the tried and true styles to the wild and interesting Highway 128 series. As with every winter season AVBC is once again releasing their Winter Solstice, their take on the classic winter warmer style. At 6.9% ABV, this beer pours a translucent copper with a thick and creamy head. Expect to taste sweet malt and caramel as well as some nutty tastes in the background.



A new release this year, Anderson Valley's Blood Orange Gose is a unique style that's perfectly crafted. This beer comes in at 4.2% ABV and is one of the most interesting beers in our list. Gose (pronounced gōz-uh) beers are traditionally salty, slightly sour, and usually have a dry finish. While these are highly sought-after beers for those experienced in weird beers, to make the beer more palatable to a larger audience Anderson Valley added the crisp tang of blood oranges to give this beer a tart taste that pairs perfectly with the slight sourness of the Gose style.

Bell's

Bell's Brewery is no stranger to seasonal beers, and their ever-popular Winter White Ale is making a comeback once again this year. An odd entry into our list, this beer is a wheat ale fermented with Belgian yeast to give it subtle banana and clove flavors with absolutely no spices added, and at 5% ABV it's very easy to drink and very refreshing.

Celebrating the season, Bell's is once again releasing their Christmas Ale, a 5.5% Scottish ale that only uses specialty barley and a unique blend of hops to give this beer its unique taste, no spices added.

Bell's also releases a team of four stouts in the winter months with the nickname of The Stouts of Winter. These beers run the gamut from creamy and strong, to hints of cherry, to strong and dark. First, there's the American stouts like Cherry Stout at 7% ABV, their Special Double Cream Stout at 6.1% ABV, Java Stout at 7.5% ABV, and finally Expedition Stout, a Russian Imperial Stout at a warming 10.5% ABV.

Dogfish Head

Dogfish Head is known for their variety of beers and unique styles, and the winter months are no exception. Returning for a second year is their Piercing Pils, a Czech style pilsner that's brewed with white pear tea and pear juice. Paired with the spicy Saaz hops, this 6% ABV beer is a unique take on a classic style.

Making its debut this year is a brand new beer from Dogfish Head named BEER Thousand. This imperial lager was made to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the classic Guided By Voices album Bee Thousand. Brewed with 10 different grains and 10 varieties of hops at 10% ABV, BEER Thousand is closer to an amped-up barleywine than a lager.

Next on Dogfish Head's seasonal release calendar is the longtime favorite Olde School. This 15% ABV barleywine is an amazing beer that's great both fresh as well as aged. This big beer is fermented with figs and dates, and has an wonderfully complex taste and aroma. This only comes around once a year, so pick up a 4-pack to drink now and one to age for a few years, too.

If you look halfway between 60 Minute and 90 Minute you can find a very unique beer in the form of 75 Minute IPA. This 7.5% ABV beer blends two of the most popular beers from Dogfish Head and adds in some maple syrup to naturally carbonate it. Dry-hopped with whole-leaf Cascade hops, 75 Minute is crisp and bitter while hanging on to a soft and velvety mouthfeel.

Making a triumphant comeback this year for the winter season is a beer that's talked about often and wished for by those in the know. Raison D'Extra is a beefed-up version of their popular Raison D'Etre that needs to be tried to be believed. A Belgian-style brown ale that comes in at a jaw-dropping 18% ABV, Raison D'Extra definitely has something extra, and you need to try it to see for yourself.

East End Brewing

In a bid to clear the snow and warm things up for everyone in Pittsburgh, Scott Smith from East End Brewing makes his Snow Melt

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
Winter Ale each year, and even though this substantial 7% ABV beer helps, the snow still seems to stick. This mahogany red ale has a unique malt character and a bright hop flavor that has hints of pine. This beer will definitely help keep you warm and while we all can't wait for it to warm up, at least we have this to clear the snow for us.

Erie Brewing

Most of us usually steer clear of Johnny Law when drinking; Erie Brewing's Ol' Red Cease & Desist is an up-front powerful ale that makes its own set of laws about what a winter beer should be. Coming in at 10.1% ABV, this beer has a balanced mix of oak, spices, dark fruits, and even a little caramel. While the alcohol and flavors are up-front about their intentions, this beer finishes smooth and easy to drink.

Smuttynose Brewing

For those of us that love their Belgian-style beers, Smuttynose Brewing has their Winter Ale, a 5.8% Belgian Dubbel that's brewed with a special Trappist ale yeast. This beer features fruity aromas and flavors as well as a soft hop background. Mellow yet surprisingly complex, Smuttynose's Winter Ale is perfect for the winter months when you're not looking for a high alcohol kick.



Stone Brewing

A crowd favorite amongst craft beer fans, Stone Brewing makes a variety of amazing beers year round, but saves a few of them specifically for the winter months. For example, take their Double Bastard and Lucky Basartd ales. These two beers, at 11.2% and 8.5% respectively, fall into the Arrogant Bastard lineup and hold their own against that master of hops. Double Bastard ups the ABV and adds even more bitterness to give you a masterpiece of hop usage and utilization. As for Lucky Basartd (yep, that's how they spell it) is a slightly different take on Arrogant Bastard that's a definite must for any hophead, or anyone daring enough to try the bitter beast.

If more balanced IPAs are your thing, then Enjoy By 12-26-14 is the perfect beer for you. The Enjoy By series of beers are meant to be enjoyed as soon as possible and never aged. This 9.4% ABV beer is described by Stone as "devastatingly fresh" as well as floral, citrusy, and amazing. While you won't melt if you drink this beer past it's Enjoy By date, Stone feels so strongly that this is the best date for the beer to be drank by, they made it part of the name of the beer.

Part of Stone's Stochasticity Project, Master of Disguise is an Imperial Golden Stout (yep, you read that right, a golden stout) that comes in at 9.7% ABV. Stone took the spirit of a dark beer and applied it to a golden ale. What you're left with is a light-colored beer that has cocoa and coffee notes as well as a toasty character that's so surprising out of a light colored beer that you need to see and taste it to believe it.

Straub

Straub Brewery has been in the brewing business since 1872 and today they're not only producing quality beers that have been around for much of their history, but new and innovative beers as well. Take for example their Legacy Sampler, a mix pack of beers that show the history of Straub Brewery better than any history book ever could. The sampler includes their 1872 Lager, a 5.4% ABV pre-prohibition style lager, longtime favorite Helles Lager, a 5.5% ABV lager, Doppelbock, a 7% ABV Winter Bock, and their 5.6% ABV IPL, Straub's take on an India Pale Ale, but in the lager style.

Troegs

It wouldn't be a holiday season without the wild and wonderful Mad Elf from Troegs. 

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Don't Let Your Christmas Holiday Weekend Road Trip be a Turkey

10-Minute Vehicle Check Can Ensure Stress-Free Driving

One way to ensure you will get to dinner in time for turkey on Thanksgiving weekend is by making sure that the vehicle you will be driving is running well. A 10-minute pre-trip check is small potatoes compared to a big helping of inconvenience if you break down many miles away from home, according to the Car Care Council.

"A Thanksgiving pre-trip inspection helps reduce the chance of costly and possibly dangerous on the road trouble. It also provides an opportunity to have repairs done by one's own technician locally who knows the vehicle," said Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council. "Especially important, it provides peace of mind. While no inspection can guarantee a car's performance, it's comforting to know proper precautions were taken to avoid a 'turkey' of a weekend."

The Car Care Council suggests the following 10-minute checkup to help ensure vehicle safety and reliability on Thanksgiving, when millions of Americans take to the roads to visit family and friends:

- Check all fluids, including engine oil, power steering and brake and transmission, as well as windshield washer solvent and antifreeze/coolant.
- Check the hoses and belts that can become cracked, brittle, frayed, loose or show signs of excessive wear. These are critical to the proper functioning of the electrical system, air conditioning, power steering and the cooling system.
- Check the tires, including tire pressure and tread. Uneven wear indicates a need for wheel alignment. Tires should also be checked for bulges and bald spots.
- Check lighting to identify any problems with exterior and interior lighting as the chance of an accident increases if you can't see or be seen.
- Check wipers. Wiper blades should be replaced every six months. Make sure the windshield wipers are working properly and keep the reservoir filled with solvent.

The Car Care Council also recommends that motorists restock their emergency kit. To save on fuel costs during the trip, the council suggests that motorists avoid aggressive driving, observe the speed limit and avoid excessive idling. Gas caps that are damaged, loose or missing should be replaced to prevent gas from spilling or evaporating.

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Go on a Wine Adventure this Holiday Season Stuck on the Same Old Starter Wines? Aficionado Shares Advice for a Maturing Palate

There's nothing wrong with liking what you like, but you can't discover new favorites unless you try new things, says wine enthusiast Howard Kleinfeld.

While recovering from throat cancer, Kleinfeld, an award-winning commercial music producer, lost his sense of taste for a few years. When it came back, he decided to embrace some of the finest tastes life had to offer and has since traveled the world to satisfy his obsession with wine.


"I became someone who decided to say 'yes' to many of the things I used to say 'no' to, which has enriched my life tremendously with adventure," says Kleinfeld, author (as Howard K) of "Dial M for Merlot," www.DialMForMerlot.com, a lighthearted novel imbued with its character's passion for wine.

"But you don't have to book a trip to Napa or the Bordeaux region of France. You just have to be willing to try a new type of wine."

Wine has grown increasingly popular in America in recent decades. The preference of just one in four in 1992, it's now the alcoholic beverage of choice for 35 percent of us, which is just one percent less than beer, according to a 2013 Gallup poll.

"With all the holiday parties and family gatherings, it's a great time of year to expand one's 'Wine-Q,'" says Kleinfeld, who offers the following suggestions.

- If you like white zinfandel, consider a Riesling. White zin is the "Kool-Aid of wine." It can be a good introduction to the wonderful world of wine because it's sweet, and everybody likes sugar. But there are a number of wines at many price points that are also sweet and carry a much more interesting profile -- a fuller body, honey and pear or apple notes and much more. Riesling and Gewürztraminer wines are a great place to start. Fun fact: red zinfandel hails from the same grape as white zinfandel, except the red variety includes the grape's skin -- white does not. The skin gives the wine a more robust flavor and color than its popular cousin, deep, rich and full of zest. It's quite different from white zin, but worth investigating with a curious palate.
- If your go-to white wine is strictly Chardonnay, try a bottle of white from the Côtes du Rhône or a sauvignon blanc from just about anywhere. Wine can be confusing because varieties may refer to a grape, a region or both.



Chardonnay refers to a specific green-skinned grape and is grown all over the world, most notably in Burgundy, France. Côtes du Rhône is from the region of France of the same name and is usually made from a blend of grapes, none of which, by the way, are chardonnay. Chardonnay is very popular and, it is said, a rite-of-passage grape for wineries. While Chardonnay is a relatively straightforward selection, Côtes du Rhône offers white and red varieties that will be fun crowd-pleasers at parties, and it's inexpensive. An export grape from the region is Syrah, remarkable for its now-global prevalence, from Washington state to South America to South Africa to Australia, where it's called Shiraz. For something completely different and light, try sauvignon blanc, which can be herbal and tart, with good acidity and complexity. "Sauvignon blanc can be like drinking passion fruit -- not quite orange, cherry or lemon -- just passion fruit," he says. "I'll never forget one time I had it with tuna sashimi. It was such a perfect pairing...These are the things that make life great

- If you like Moscato before dinner, try Sauternes or port wine with dessert. Again, sweet wines are popular, but Sauternes from the region of Bordeaux with the same name, has a distinct flavor because of a unique geographical attribute. Sauternes is made from Sémillon, Sauvignon blanc, and Muscadelle grapes that have been affected by a fungus that usually causes souring. But, thanks to the weather in the Sauternes region, the fungus instead adds sweetness and complexity to wine. Varieties range from very sweet to dry as a bone. Port, Portuguese fortified wine, and Sauternes are amazing with nuts, blue cheese and foie gras, or goose liver pâté, slathered on baguette, Kleinfeld says.
- If you think it's time to outgrow merlot ... try another merlot. Ever since the movie "Sideways," merlot has gotten a bad rap. Yes, some varieties can be fruit bombs (and there's nothing wrong with that!), but others are deep, rich and structured. On a wide range of levels, merlot can provide a nuanced and rewarding experience. "Don't be afraid to drink merlot just because you may have heard it's not hip," says Kleinfeld. "It can stand on its own and is also a big-time blending grape in some of the world's most famous wines. It's the king of the 'right bank' region of Bordeaux."




Lou Christie's chart topping, multi-million selling career as a singer, songwriter, recording artist and performer started in a two week track studio in Glenwillard Pennsylvania, his rural hometown near Pittsburgh. Lou's first million selling song, "The Gypsy Cried," transformed a local choir boy into a national teen idol. Over the decade of the sixties, Lou followed success with greater success. "Two Faces Have I," was his next big hit featuring his stratospheric falsetto. His #1 multi-million selling song, "Lightnin' Strikes," forever embedded hi unique voice into America's consciousness. Lou's chart topping success continued with two additional million-selling hits, "Rhapsody in the Rain" and "I'm Gonna Make You Mine."

Jimmy Beaumont and the Skyliners

Back in 1958, a young Pittsburgh singer by the name of Jimmy Beaumont began singing with a group called the Crescents that soon combined with a South Hills group by the name of The Elrios. Under the management of the young Pittsburgh native promoter, Joe Rock, they became The Skyliners. Joe Rock and Skyliner's lead singer Jimmy Beaumont soon began to write songs. Their first song, "Since I Don't Have You" went to the top of the chart and is known today as the quintessential fifties ballad. The song has been covered by scores of artists including Ronnie Millsap, Art Garfunkel, Trini Lopez, Chuck Jackson, Don McClean and Guns n' Roses. Other top 40 hits and classics by the group include "This I Swear," "Pennies from Heaven," "It Happened Today," "Close Your



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Donnie Iris

Donnie Iris is an American rock musician known for his work with the Jaggerz and Wild Cherry during the 1970s, and for his solo career beginning in the 1980s with his band, the Cruisers. He wrote the #2 Billboard hit "The Rapper," with Jaggerz in 1970 and was a member of WILD Cherry after the group had a #1 hit with "Play That Funky Music." Iris also achieved fame as a solo artist in the early 1980s with the #29 hit "Ah! Leah!" and "Love is Like a Rock."

Chuck Blasko's Vogues

The Vogues began as a four man vocal group in Turtle Creek originally known as The Val-Aires, while at Turtle Creek High School. In the late fifties, they quickly gained popularity and soon landed a contract with the local Co and Ce Record Label. The Val-Aires changed their name to the Vogues and became a national sensation in September of 1965 with a #4 hit, "You Are the One." Nine weeks later, the group followed up with another hit, "Five O'clock World" followed by "Magic Town," "Land of Milk and Honey," "Turn Around Look at Me" and "My Special Angel." The Vogues made several appearances on television programs including the The Tonight Show, The Ed Sullivan Show, Shindig, American Bandstand, Hullabaloo and the Mike Douglas Show.

The Marcells

In 1959, five racially mixed guys from Oliver Allegheny High School began singing on the North Side. They soon took the name of a popular wavy hair style and The Marcells were born. After a year's worth of practicing, they found themselves at Copix Records, a record subsidy of Columbia Pictures in New York. At their first recording session, they recorded a remake of an old Rogers and Hart song, "Blue Moon." The song went straight to #1 on the Billboard charts and remained there for three weeks, selling a million copies and earning them a gold record. Later that Fall, they scored again with "Heartaches," which reached #7. The group appeared with Chubby Checker in the film Twist Around the Clock and their rendition of "Blue Moon" has been used in four major motion picture and various television shows. Today, The Marcells include Jules Hopson, Richard Harris, Ted (Reno) Smith and Kenny Mitchell.

Jimmie Ross and the Jaggerz

Around 1964, six talented guys from Beaver Valley joined together and began playing local night clubs and regional venues as far as the Sunken Bar at Geneva on the Lake, Ohio. Managed by the Skyliner's manager, Joe Rock, the Jaggerz signed with Gable Records, where the legendary Philadelphia Soul music team of Gamble and Huff produced their first album. The album included "(That's Why) Baby I Love You," "Together" and "Gotta Find My Way Back Home." In 1970, the Jaggerz switched labels and their second album produced the groups' chart-topping hit "The Rapper," which hit #2 on the Billboard hot 100 and remained there for 13 weeks. The record was certified gold by the RIAA, selling over 2.5 million copies. Original members, Jimmie Ross and Benny Faiella, along with current members Hermie Granati, Dennis McAbee, Paul Martello and Chris Patarni continue to perform the soulful sounds of the Jaggerz.




86 Year Old Checkup

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
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
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My friend, Rick

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
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
