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The Playoff Push

Amazing isn't it? You put your head down in anger over giving away a win in the opener to Cleveland and when you look up, it's suddenly Week 13 and the Steelers are in full playoff push mode. Time flies when you're having fun. Okay, that loss in Denver was not fun, but the six-game win streak certainly was. And that put the team atop the AFC North as December looms.

Five games remain and the Steelers have the sixth toughest schedule, including matchups against three teams likely headed to the playoffs – Chargers, Saints and of course, the Patriots. They have a combined 26 wins. Seems daunting, doesn't it? Maybe for a less battle tested team, but the black and gold have thrived in the final month of the season. Over the past five years, the Steelers have lost just three games


in the month of December. Their 20 wins over that span is most in the NFL.

They'll most likely need at least four wins to be in the hunt for a bye in the playoffs as the three other AFC division leaders have at least eight wins already. Wild card teams have won the Super Bowl just four times this century, so securing that extra week of rest makes a difference. They'll need to shore up some things to get back to their winning ways.

The running game has taken a back seat the last two games, with a combined 27 attempts for just 101 yards.

When the temperature drops, the ground game has to be reliable. That goes for fumbles too. James Conner has lost two this year and they have both been costly. But he hasn't been the only turnover perpetrator. Ben Roethlisberger has





lost two fumbles himself. Plus, his dozen interceptions are most among contending quarterbacks. Giving opponents extra possessions is a recipe for losing. And their negative seven turnover ratio is 26th in the league.

While ball security has been an issue, protecting the

quarterback has not. The offensive line has allowed just

16 sacks, only New Orleans and Indianapolis have allowed

fewer. The defense has been doing their job, taking down opposing quarterbacks 39 times through 11 games to lead the

NFL. And after a rocky start to the season, Keith Butler's unit






is sixth in the league in overall defense, allowing 22.6 points a game.

If the defense continues its stalwart ways, the running game gets going again and the Steelers can stop turning it over,

there's a great shot to secure that bye week and a divisional home playoff game. Don't blink, the postseason will be here before you know it.

Movie Reviews

NIGHTWIRE - FILM REVIEWS by FIORE

TROUBLE IS MY BUSINESS

If you occasionally like to curl up in a cozy chair with a pulp fiction novel that begins something like this: "I was about to drown myself in a bottle of bourbon when she walked into the office. She was legs and curves and I knew by the way she swayed toward my desk that she was trouble." Then I have a movie for you. It's called TROUBLE IS MY BUSINESS and it attempts, at time successfully, to bring back the Boggie and Cagney film noir epics.

Private Detective Roland Drake is in a hard way, blamed for a young girl's murder. Facing a ruined reputation, and eviction, he sees a ray of hope when Katherine Montemar sashays into his office seeking his help. Members of her family are disappearing, and she needs to know why. Drake seizes the opportunity to redeem his name and get back in the game.


Sounds like a solid foundation for a film noir, but TROUBLE IS MY BUSINESS often tries too hard. As an Independent film, it is the brainchild of Thomas Konkle. He wrote, directed, edited, produced and stars in the movie. His efforts are most noble, yet overblown.

The script is too complicated, even for this genre which specializes in plot twists. Every pulp fiction tale has twists, but TROUBLE IS MY BUSINESS takes the mandate too far. The dialogue is choppy and static. It tries too hard to sound like a Dashiell Hammett read. Konkle could have fixed this in editing, but didn't, resulting in a film that endures a solid half hour past its most ideal point. Flashbacks are used to fill in missing sections of plot, but the ploy is used too many times and becomes a gimmick.

The acting is mundane. Most notable is Vernon Wells as Detective Barry Tate. Wells is best remembered as The Arnold's foil in COMMANDO ("Let off some steam, Bennett"). Konkle is a much better director and writer than actor. The rest of the cast including: Brittney Powell; David Beeler; Steve Tom: Jordana Capra; and Ben Pace carry the plot, but little else.

Directors of Photography Jesse Arnold and P.J. Gaynard are in fine form, capturing the cant and off-angle camera shots for which the genre is noted. Combined with the Lighting techniques of Joey Rasscol, TROUBLE IS MY BUSINESS captures the noir look with aplomb.

While the first read of this review may seem harsh, I must say I enjoyed the effort Konkle and crew emit. This type of tale, and its visualization in glorious black and white are iconic filmmaking. Indie films always have budget restrictions which cause talented folk like Konkle to wear too many hats during the production. Some judicious editing of both film and script and a stronger cast would turn TROUBLE IS



MY BUSINESS into a major presentation.

For those who enjoy film noir, TROUBLE IS MY BUSINESS is worth a view. We have so few films made in this fashion today, and the industry could certainly use more of them. TROUBLE IS MY BUSINESS is available through video steaming and on home video. The film comes in two versions, glorious black and white and in color. Watch the black and white to appreciate the camerawork and lighting.

THE FRONT RUNNER

As political thrillers go, this one misses the mark by accenting current themes and ignoring political ones. Due to the recent Brett Kavanaugh hearings, THE FRONT RUNNER opts not to highlight the political conspiracies that led to Senator Gary Hart's political abandonment. The decision is a mistake.

It is the acting that makes this film worth viewing. Hugh Jackman delivers a powerful performance, intended to garner him gold considerations. While it is strong, it is not that strong. Sara Paxton is a surprise as Donna Rice, and Vera Farmiga and J.K. Simmons offer yeoman style performances. The acting is well done, as are behind the camera duties. There is a stretch to insert modern viewpoints into the tale, that don't fit nor belong.

The script attempts valiantly to create tension between the ability to hold public office and one's private life. While Jackman is given a few lines of pithy dialogue, the argument made is muddled.

The script only skims over the political theory of the conspiracy to derail Hart by the Bush organization. It gives no mention to the theory that Hart's own party set him up; and that is the most likely scenario.

THE FRONT RUNNER misses the mark. It accents the public vs private life of political candidates, most likely due to recent headlines.



But the real story of the Hart affair was the maneuvering of the two political parties to oust and disgrace a person who did not tow the complete party line for either team. That would have made for a better story, and been more truthful.

SPEED KILLS

John Travolta has a thing for gangsters lately. His work on GOTTI went nowhere, literally. The movie opened to one of the worst box office weekends in recorded history and was quickly pulled. But that didn't stop Travolta from attempting another gangster film. This one is SPEED KILLS, and concerns the shenanigans of Ben Aronoff, a co-conspirator of Meyer Lansky. This time, Travolta and crew have it right, as SPEED KILLS is a well told tale.

Aronoff (Travolta) is a housing developer in New Jersey, who has ties with Meyer Lansky (James Remar). Together, they build a nice empire, but when the tables turn, and the housing market fails, Aronoff relocates to Miami. There he starts and establishes a speed boat building business, becomes a speed boat racing champion, and launches yet another multi-million-dollar business.

His new-found fame makes him a cause celebre, and his ensuing affairs break up his marriage (Jennifer Esposito plays his wife Katherine). He meets Katherine Winnick (Emily Gowen), who is the girlfriend of King Hussein of Jordan, and steals her as his second wife. Soon after, Lansky reappears, looking to cash in on a piece of Aronoff's pie. His demands augment, pushing Aronoff deep into criminal activity which threatens his new family and the business he built. Also starring in the film are Kellan Lutz as Rob Reemer, Lansky's nephew; Matthew Modine as George Bush; Mike Weston as Shell Watz, Aronoff's lawyer; and Tom Sizemore as a Lansky henchman.

SPEED KILLS moves at a brisk pace, thanks to the editing of Randy Briche. Director of Photography Andrzej Sekula utilizes panoramic set up shots, vividly splashed with vibrant



color. There is one sequence, the storm race, which is rather cheesy with poor matting and SFX that proves to be a bit of distraction in the narrative.

Gangster tales, based on true events, can either be fun or laborious. Thankfully, SPEED KILLS is the former. With a great ensemble cast and a lively chronicle, it provides a bit of history and entertainment. With SPEED KILLS, Travolta has the gangster film right.

SNOWMANCE

I must have been in a sappy mood when I watched SNOWMANCE because I made it to the end credits and though there was nothing of note in the movie, it was a comfortable tale. It was tremendous watching a movie with no hidden agendas or pushing of cultural change as Tinseltown is wont to do.

This is a cute, harmless holiday movie. Sarah (Ashley Newbrough) is a true romantic, looking for a man to set off fireworks and sweep her off her feet. Her favorite Christmas tradition is building her annual "Snow Beau" snowman with her best friend, Nick (Adam Hartig). After nearly two decades of building her perfect man out of snow, a Christmas miracle occurs and suddenly Sarah meets Cole (Jesse Hutch), who surprisingly has all the characteristics of her snowman.

SNOWMANCE is a film for gathering around the tree with the family, having popcorn and hot chocolate. You can enjoy the story, without having to explain agendas to the kids afterwards. This is especially made for little girls. It's a template story. No surprises nor exhilarating plot twists. Still, the story sticks to a tried and true formula that fits in nice at Christmas time.

SNOWMANCE is avoiding theatres, going directly to streaming services and home video. This movie makes an excellent family movie night for the holidays, especially if the kids haven't hit high school yet.

A great way to not only survive winter but learn to love it is to check out all the seasonal offerings from your favorite breweries. From stouts to IPAs, to the titular winter warmers...there's a lot to love in the world of craft beer when the temperature drops.

Check out our list of winter seasonal beers to get you in the winter spirit and get on board with giving winter the credit it deserves.


Anderson Valley

Kicking off our list is Anderson Valley Brewing Company. Founded in 1987, Anderson Valley has grown into a varied and respected brewery that produces everything from the tried and true styles to the wild and interesting Gose series. Continuing their annual tradition, this winter AVBC is again releasing Winter Solstice, their take on the classic winter warmer style. At 6.9% ABV, this beer pours a translucent copper with a thick and creamy head. Expect to taste sweet malt and caramel as well as some nutty tastes in the background.

Bell's Brewery

Bell's Brewery is no stranger to seasonal beers, and their everpopular Winter White Ale is making a comeback once again this year. An odd entry into our list, this beer is a wheat ale fermented with Belgian yeast to give it subtle banana and clove flavors with absolutely no spices added, and at 5% ABV it's very easy to drink and very refreshing.

When it comes to big winter beers, it's hard to beat the Russian Imperial Stout. These big, intense beers were once favorited by the Russian Tsars, but today you don't have to be Russian to fall in love with the big kids on the stout block. Bell's brews their Expedition Stout to have a huge malt body that features complex




East End Brewing Company

In a bid to clear the snow and warm things up for everyone in Pittsburgh, Scott Smith from East End Brewing makes his Snow Melt Winter Ale each year, and even though this substantial 7% ABV beer helps, the snow still seems to stick. This mahogany red ale has a unique malt character and a bright hop flavor that has hints of pine. This beer will help keep you warm and while we all can't wait for it to warm up, at least we have this to clear the snow for us.

Erie Brewing Company

While it's typically good advice to steer clear of Johnny Law when drinking, Erie Brewing releases their Ol' Red Cease & Desist each year, going against that advice. Ol' Red is an up-front powerful ale that makes its own set of laws about what a winter beer should be. Coming in at 10.1% ABV, this beer has a balanced mix of oak, spices, dark fruits, and even a little caramel. While the





alcohol and flavors are up-front about their intentions, this beer finishes smooth and easy to drink.

Lancaster Brewing Company

Located in...you guessed it...Lancaster, PA, Lancaster Brewing Company loves the winter season as much as might be possible, and they showcase that love with their Winter Warmer Ale. This 8.9% ABV beer skips the spices found in most winter beers to give you a full-bodied beer that features a monster of a malt bill along with British and American hops to give this beer a balance that's not often found in a winter ale. Classified as an Old Ale, Winter Warmer will do as its name implies, and it'll do it with style.

North Country Brewing Company

Originally brewed in 2005, Jack Frost Winter Warmer Ale from North Country Brewing is a great example of what a winter warmer should be. Coming in at 7.7% ABV, this malty beer focuses on the malt body, allowing only enough spice into the beer to hint at their presence.

You'll find some hop flavor in Jack Frost, but not much of the bitterness you'd expect along with it. In short, this is one great malty beer that uses a touch of spice to give you a beer that's perfect for a cold winter night, and best of all it's available in cans!

Saugatuck Brewing Company

Brown Ales are the perfect balance of toasty malt character, rich roasted malt, and bitter chocolate all wrapped together in one delicious beer. Add to this tastes and aroma of oak aging and what you have is SBC's Snow Wizard Oak Aged Brown Ale. This beer comes in at 7% ABV and 49 IBUs, featuring that toasty malt brown ales are known for while adding in a little extra bitterness and oak character for good measure. Unlike the other beers listed above, Snow Wizard is only available October through December so check this unique brown ale out while it's still here.

Smuttynose Brewing Company

For those of us that love their Belgian-style beers, Smuttynose Brewing has long held their Winter Ale as the perfect beer for winter, and while they still feel this way, this 7.5% Belgian Dubbel has a new name Single Digit Dubbel for the beer we love with a few additional ABV that before, and it's still brewed with a special Trappist ale yeast as it has always been. This beer features fruity aromas and flavors as well as a soft hop background. Mellow yet surprisingly complex. The perfect brew for the winter months when you're looking for something different.



Troegs Independent Brewing



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

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'Twas The Night Before Christmas





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
