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A Tight Race to the Postseason


Just five points separate the top four teams in the Metropolitan division at the All-Star break, with the Penguins' 58 points good for the second wild card. A far cry from last place in the eastern conference, which they were in back in late November. So as the Penguins make a playoff push, they'll have plenty of opportunity to move up the standings quickly, with their first eight games out of the break against eastern conference foes.

In losing three out of their last four games before their bye week, the Pens didn't look great, allowing 17 goals in those losses. So a good start to the "second half" of the season will do much in the way of righting their ship and setting the course for the postseason. Here are some key factors . . . Goaltending, as always. It seems Matt Murray has healed

whatever ailed him to start the season. He had a 13-game layoff due to injury and his numbers are starkly different beforehand and afterwards. Murray was allowing over four goals per game prior, stopping just 88 percent of the shots he faced and had a losing record. Since his return, he has won 11 of 12 starts with a 1.81 goals against average and a spectacular save percentage of .944. Now, keeping up this pace is probably unrealistic, but if he can come anywhere close, the Penguins will have the brick wall needed to absorb their opponents' best shots.

The Penguins defense has hurt them at times this year, especially when you look beyond the top pairing of Kris

Letang and Brian Dumoulin. Olli Maatta has had a revolving door moving partners in an out since Justin Schultz went



down with a leg injury back in October. General Manager
Jim Rutherford is never afraid to make a move at the trade
deadline, and has already sent Jamie Oleksiak back to Dallas,
but getting back Schultz could be the best addition this
team will have. He has been a positive possession player
and puck mover, something the Pens have sorely needed of
late. Schultz also strengthens the second power play unit,
which was already fourth best in the league, converting 25.7

percent of its chances.

Six of Evgeni Malkin's 14 goals this year have come on the power play, but he has been struggling mightily at even strength. His puck possession is atrocious and he is simply missing the net – connecting on just eleven percent of his shots. Oleksiak was scoring at a higher rate before he was traded. The plus/minus stat is open to a lot of variables and doesn't define individual performance well, but when you







have a -20 in that category, it's hard to ignore. It's the worst on the team with Phil Kessel not far behind. The second line must get going for the Penguins to secure their 13th consecutive postseason appearance.

Movie Reviews

NIGHTWIRE - FILM REVIEWS by FIORE


THE GOLEM, a new release from the folks at Dread Central, is a nifty horror tale, expertly crafted and directed by Doron and Yoav Paz. The Paz brothers are third generation filmmakers. They studied at Tel Aviv University and are mainstays in Israeli television. This is their third film, but first collaboration with Dread Central.

The tale, penned by Ariel Cohen, centers around a 16th century Jewish folktale from the Kabbalah. When oppressed, Jewish religious leaders can bring forth a revenging spirit to enforce justice. Unfortunately, the golem is a brutal demon that cannot differentiate between antagonist and protagonist.

Set in 17th century Lithuania, the story concerns the outbreak of a plague. All villages are affected by the disease, save for the Jewish village. When the daughter of chieftain Vladimir, played by Alex Tritenko, becomes ill, he takes her to the Jewish village for healing, with the threat of burning the village and killing everyone if she dies. Perla, is the town's healer tasked with restoring Vladimir's daughter. She saw the golem once before, when she was a small child, and she is shocked and dismayed at its recurrence. She alone knows of the destructive power of the demon. Who is responsible for its return?

Key to the story are Hanna and her husband Benjamin, played by Hani Furstenberg and Ishai Golan, respectively. The couple tragically lost their son in a drowning accident seven years ago and their marriage is tense and under scrutiny from the other





villagers. They become the object of suspicion when the golem returns in the guise of their dead child.

Director of Photography Rotem Yaron visually captures the gloomy landscapes of cursed land. His use of lighting, especially during the golem's emergence is noteworthy.

The story is intertwined with the musical intonations of Tal Yardenl. His score, based on Jewish folk rhythms, augments the film's tension. THE GOLEM is quick paced and expertly cut by Itamar Goldwasser and Einat Glaser-Zarhin (who, despite the hyphen, is still one of the dreaded three name people).

THE GOLEM is a smart horror tale. It harkens toward Lance Hendriksen's PUMPKINHEAD, in that the golem is physically connected to the one who summoned him. The golem's attacks are brutal, and while some of the plot twists are predictable, the movie is crafted well enough to provide any horror

fan an enjoyable viewing experience. I liked this one, and think you will find it enjoyable on a dark and stormy night.

THE FAVOURITE - Myriad accolades are feigning on THE FAVOURITE, and I can't image why. As plotlines go, it is a series of vindictive vignettes with an ending so unfulfilling one will question why the previous two hours of viewing was necessary. Written by Deborah Davis, THE FAVOURITE is a period piece which serves to accent the petty behavior of three Victorian divas. If not for the depiction of degenerate mores, the film is a story best untold.

Olivia Colman is Queen Anne. In this tale, Anne is a blithering lesbian idiot. She is surrounded by a council of men who want to run the country, while keeping the Queen ignorant of current events, yet extending the pretense she is still in charge.

The country is actually run by Lady Sarah, played by Rachel Weisz. She directs all the Queen's thoughts and actions by playing coquettish sexual games with her. Her power, and place on the court, are threatened upon the arrival of Abigail, played by Emma Stone. Once a lady, Abigail is in disgrace and fallen from high court. Through bitchiness and manipulation, she attempts to regain high favor and power. Therein lies the conflict.

Directed by Yorgos Lanthimos, THE FAVOURITE offers little in terms of technical prowess. Of note is the work of Fiona Crombie and Alice Felton as production designer and set decorator, respectively. The costumes and settings are grandiose, but they alone are not worth the price of a ticket.

Unless you find solace in a world where the women are loath-some creatures using sexual favors as weapons, and the men are either warmongers or homosexuals, then THE FAVOURITE is best left for the hoi ploi who like placing modern day tenants into historical tales.

GLASS- Never expect what is anticipated in a film by M. Night Shyamalan. The filmmaker consistently delivers works divergent from trailer teasers or prerelease publicity. His method



has garnered him praise, and criticism, but his films are always interesting.

Nearly two decades ago, he released UNBREAKABLE. The star power of Bruce Willis and Samuel L. Jackson drew many to the box office lines. What viewers discovered was a movie about comic books. UNBREAKABLE was excellent filmmaking and earned the coveted FIST OF FIORE AWARD as the epitome of excellence in film entertainment. The film was so solid, I utilized it in my university classes for teaching character development and lighting.

Two years ago, Shyamalan released SPLIT. The movie featured James McAvoy as a multi-personality killer. It was enthralling. McAvoy's performance was amazing and earned him a Best Actor nomination on this critic's ballot. A teaser scene at the film's conclusion, tied SPLIT with UNBREAKABLE. It was an







unexpected, but very appreciated twist.

Now, the release of GLASS completes the trilogy. Typically, GLASS does not offer what everyone thinks it will. The script twists frequently, changing both the tone and tenor. GLASS



does offer exceptional cinematography and excellent use of camera movement, including pans and cants. It also offers another amazing performance by McAvoy and stoic enactments by Willis and Jackson.

GLASS looks and views in stellar fashion. It is a fitting conclusion to the film trio and worthy of multiple viewings. It joins its brother endeavors as the epitome of film entertainment and garners the FIST OF FIORE AWARD for 2019.

DRY BLOOD - If you are ready for a horror tale different from most, DRY BLOOD, the latest endeavor from the fine folks at Dread Central, may fit your bill of fare. It has ghosts, but is not a ghost story. It has demons, but is not a supernatural tale. It has slasher elements, but is not in the vein of Jason, Michael or Freddy. Assembled in Tarantino fashion, the story bounces haphazardly around a timeline, and does not reveal the true sequence of events until the very end.

Brian Barnes, an unstable addict seeks refuge in a country cabin, with the noble intentions of transforming to the straight life through cold turkey. He seeks the help of a former mistress, Anna. But, withdrawal may be too much. The cabin is inhabited by ghosts and demons. Are they real, or are they

part of going cold turkey? Conflict is compounded by a deranged, power hungry sheriff who is certain Barnes is guilty of something, but just doesn't know what.

Clint Carney is fine as Barnes, and Kelton Jones is interesting as the sheriff. Jaymie Valentine plays Anna and her performance leaves much to be desired. She appears uncomfortable with her lines and her blocking movement is stiff. Rounding the cast are Robert V. Galluzzo, Graham Sheldon and Macy Johnson.

DRY BLOOD is the brainchild of Carney who not only plays Barnes, but serves as editor and SFX supervisor. He is better at the SFX. Skull and glowing eyed demons, headless ghosts and decomposed bodies are stronger than his editing skills. DRY BLOOD, while attempting to preserve a surprise ending, moves far too slow for this genre of film. Characters and plot can and should be developed quicker than Carney allows.

True horror fans will be disappointed with the film's conclusion, but for those who like their horror movies filled with blood and gore, DRY BLOOD will satisfy.

COLETTE - Films of this ilk flood the market at awards time. They serve as hedonistic homages to Hollywood's lifestyle by celebrating society's degenerates. COLETTE is filled with Tinseltown's current agendas. It details the tribulations of a woman who helps her husband become wealthy and famous at a time when men dominated society and works by a woman would not be entertained. It conveniently omits the







contributions of the man, accenting only those of the woman, presenting the erroneous concept of universal women of strength and men of low decree.

Sidonia Gabrielle Colette (Knightley) is a simple country girl who marries Willy (played by Dominic West) who is a media brand in France during the late 1800's. Willy introduces Colette to the world of high society, which she enjoys immensely. To counter Willy's infidelity, Colette discovers lesbianism. It is the doctrines of her lesbian lovers, treated as cultural piranhas, that eventually cause Colette to abandon the methods of existence in rich society, leading to a fall from grace for both her and Willy. This pas de Deux is heralded in the script by Richard Glatzer as strong feminine independence. In fact, it is stupidity.

As a period piece, COLETTE is filled with baroque settings and costumes, supplied by Michael Carlin and Andrea Flesch, respectively. Cinematographer Giles Nuttgens shoots COLETTE with an amber fog lens, rendering the standard feel for the time, and Lucia Zucchetti edits the film to accent the agendas, and not the historical significance of the characters.

COLETTE does nothing but praise the Bohemian lifestyle of Willy and Colette, in a vain effort to bolster its own degenerate regime. Outside of Keira's onscreen persona, COLETTE offers nothing of value, either as history nor entertainment.

BEYOND THE NIGHT - I always appreciate when an Independent film turns into a pleasant surprise. This is the case with BEYOND THE NIGHT. It's a mystery involving a missing girl,

a backwards town, a tragic car accident, a returning war vet and a little boy with supernatural powers.

Written and directed by Jason Noto, BEYOND THE NIGHT uses the first fifty minutes for set up and character development. It's slow and tedious. The principals behind the camera previously worked on documentary films. this is their first narrative. As such, the beginning builds slowly, like an evidence-laden doc. The second half of the film moves quickly.

The story begins when war veteran Ray Marrow returns home due to the tragic death of his wife. He and his son return her body to her home town for burial, but when they do, strange events begin. Ray's son Lawrence displays supernatural powers with knowledge of the disappearance of a teenage girl. The incident involves most of the townsfolk and is still an open sore for many.

Zane Holtz plays Ray Marrow. He is best known for playing Richie Gecko in Robert Rodriguez's TV version of FROM DUST TO DAWN. He offers the same style of performance here. Chance Kelly, Neal Huff, Tammy Blanchard, Enid Graham and Skip Sudduth round out the cast and all perform well. The true standout, however, is Azhy Robertson as Ray's son, Lawrence. His first turn in the spotlight is a memorable one.


BEYOND THE NIGHT is better than most Indie fare. Its foibles are an incredibly slow start and a rather cliched stereotype for the climax set up. The cinematography of Dan Sharnoff and the musical score of Erik Nickerson are sufficient to scale these hurdles.

Long Trail Brewery

16.2 gallons. That's the amount of beer per 21+ adult that's brewed in the state of Vermont each year. This means to make it in Vermont a brewery has to be extra special, and thankfully Long Trail Brewing Company in Bridgewater Corners; Vermont is up to the challenge. Their lineup of beers has grown quite a bit since the original release of Long Trail Ale in 1989, and just like the number of beers offered, their commitment to green brewing practices and environmental stewardship has grown as well.

So what makes Long Trail Brewing Co. so special? To understand that not so simple question you need to look at where they've come from by learning a little history. Don't worry, there won't be a test later and it's ok to have a beer while you're reading.



The first batch of Long Trail beer to roll off the line was in 1989. This first batch of beer was brewed on a 45-barrel brewing system that's dwarfed by its modern equivalent today, but back then this was the perfect system for the fledgling brewers to work with. Known then as the Mountain Brewers and led by founder Andy Pherson, the original goal of the team was to create an American-made alternative to pricy German and English imports.

If there was an official state beer for Vermont, in the early 90's it would have definitely been Long Trail Ale. The beer became ubiquitous with the state, mostly thanks to their move from the original brewery in the basement of the Old Wooden Mill



in Bridgewater Corners to their current home the banks of the Ottauquechee River.

Why the Long Trail?

So where did the name Long Trail come from? Sure, most breweries feel like they're on a long trail from the time they open, but this isn't the path Pherson was thinking about when he named the company.

The brewery's name comes from the actual Long Trail that weaves through New England as well as New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Washington, DC. This 272-mile hiking trail snakes through the Green Mountains of Vermont and much like the beer, is something the state is known for throughout the





North Fast US.

Green Beer

No, we're not talking about the swill that's served on St. Paddy's day that glows an unnatural shade of green. This type of green beer is something that's helping the industry be a leader in the industry.

Long Trail Brewing believes that good beer should be brewed with a focus on the environment as much as the quality of the beer, and with this in mind Long Trail focuses on what's called ECO Brew. ECO stands for Environmentally Conscious Operations and refers to how the company does business from the sourcing of ingredients to how the spend grain is dealt with.

The spent mash is given to local cattle farmers, the steam is recovered and turned back into water, and even the grease from the brewpub is used as bio diesel for the company tractor!

The Beer

As with any brewery, the beer is really where it's at and Long

Trail Brewing makes some pretty outstanding brews. From year-round favorites to seasonal treats; there's a beer for every season and taste, making Long Trail Brewing Co. a true Vermont tradition.

Core Beers

Long Trail Ale

First brewed in 1989, Long Trail Ale was brewed as a domestic replacement for imported beers from England and Germany. Today, Long Trail Ale is their flagship beer, making it a 25-year old gem that much like the actual Long Trail Itself, is a local tradition that will be around for years to come.

Long Trail Ale is an amber-colored beer that comes in at 5% ABV and 28 IBUs. This means it's easy to drink and not too bitter, making it a great beer for a very wide audience. Expect a



nice caramel malt aroma and taste up front with a roasty finish.

Great beer for BBQ, hamburgers, and anything else involving the outdoors.

Long Trail VT India Pale Ale

Part of the Brewmasters Series, Long Trail's IPA first saw its release in 2005. Since then it's continued to be a great example of a classic style that dates back more than 200 years to England's colonies in India.

At 6% ABV and 48 IBUs, this beer is hoppy enough for hop heads, and approachable enough for those just starting journey into craft beer. Long Trail IPA is crisp, refreshing, and focuses on a citrus hop profile with biscuitly malt undertones.

Long Trail Double Bag Ale

Originally only offered in the Long Trail Brewing tap room, this





double altbier started its life back in 1998, and features two different hop varieties and four different types of malts to give it a complex character that's still surprisingly easy to drink.

Double Bag comes in at 7.2% ABV and 39 IBUs, which give it enough body to stand up to food pairings like grilled meats while still being great all by itself. Big and malty up front with a nice alcoholic warmness in the back, Double Bag makes for an interesting and rewarding beer every time.

Long Trail Limbo Double IPA

Limbo IPA is a pretty special beer. Limbo is the first yearround seasonal to come out of Long Trail's Farmhouse Pilot Brewery, and it's quite the beer at that. This 7.6% ABV India Pale Ale is brewed with a mix of hops from Australia and the Pacific Northwest, giving the beer taste and



aroma of pineapple, mango, citrus, and even some piney undertones.

Limbo carries a hefty 80 IBU rating, making it one of the most bitter beers that Long Trail has to offer, and that's a very good thing. The bitterness plays with the citrus and pineapple character to make a beer that's hard to put down.

Long Trail Blackberry Wheat

Along with their seasonal lineup, Long Trail has a solid selection of seasonal beers to keep things interesting for every season. While it may not seem like it now, spring and summer aren't that far away, which is why we're excited for their Blackberry Wheat ale.

This 4.2% ABV beer puts off a real pie-on-the-windowsill vibe that's bright, refreshing, and all-around perfect for the warmer months to come.

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


