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
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THE 2016 EQT PITTSBURGH THREE RIVERS REGATTA

Hundreds of Flower Baskets Brighten Downtown Pittsburgh

Featuring bright red, white and blue flowers, the City of Pittsburgh is home to more than 500 hanging flower baskets hung each year by the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy (WPC), an environmental conservation nonprofit based in Pittsburgh, Pa. In total, more than 10,000 flowers line downtown Pittsburgh's streets, sidewalks, and the Rachel Carson, Andy Warhol and Roberto Clemente bridges.

Our funders are important partners in our work."

In addition to hanging baskets, Laurel Foundation, Colcom Foundation, WPC, and other partners work together to beautify and green downtown Pittsburgh through several community flower gardens, nearly 500 flower planters, tree plantings and other greening projects.

Movie Reviews

NIGHTWIRE - FILM REVIEWS by FIORE

X-MEN: APOCALYPSE

X-MEN: APOCALYPSE, under the guidance and tutelage of Bryan Singer, is a fine endeavor for the conclusion of the series. It is filled with all the spectacle, fantasy and action one would expect from a franchise wrap. It does, however, have a been-there-seen-that mien which detracts from the manifestation.

Part of the problem is the same phenomenon that plagued the second STAR WARS trilogy – it's all basically a story that doesn't need to be told, or in the vernacular, movies that do not need to be seen. I always stated my fondness for the original X-Men trilogy. Never a fan of the comics, I thought the first three stories were bold and unpredictable as key characters were often killed or altered. The original trilogy established storylines between various X-Men members and more importantly, the relationship between Stryker and the mutants and Magneto's complicated connection with Professor X. This latest tale in the prequel trilogy simply augments those storylines.

Just like the original STAR WARS trilogy, the background story presented is sufficient, with no further explanation necessary. In THE EMPIRE STRIKES BACK, when Vadar reveals he is Luke's father, it is one of cinema's most acute moments. There is really no need to see how it happened; in fact, filling in the story detracts from one of film's famed frames.

The same singularity occurs with X-MEN: APOCALYPSE. Viewers are treated to another interpretation of Wolverine's escape from Colonel Stryker's military experimentation; the origins of Cyclops; the shifting alliances of Storm and Mystique; how Professor X loses his hair; and the continuing philosophical differences between old friends Erik and Charles. While these elements will cause shivers to fanboy geeks, they are totally unnecessary in plot or character development in the X-Men franchise.

X-MEN: APOCALYPSE begins with the awakening of Apocalypse who is supposedly the first of Earth's mutants. He gains powers by absorbing other mutants' abilities until he reaches a god-like status. Seen as a danger, and too powerful for the benefit of all, he is betrayed and placed in stasis until he is reawakened in time to meet the X-Men before the start of the timeline of the original film trilogy.

Reprising their roles are: James McAvoy as Charles Xavier; Michael Fassbender as Erik Lehnsherr; Jennifer Lawrence as Raven; Nicholas Hoult as Hank McCoy; and Hugh Jackman as Logan. New to this episode are: Oscar Isaac as En Sabah Nur; Rose Byrne as Moira Mactaggert; Evan Peters as Peter Maximoff; Sophie Turner as Jean Grey; Tye Sheridan as Scott Summers; Lucas Till as Alex Summers; and Kodi Smit-McPhee as Kurt Wagner.

- 1. The rising of the Phoenix
- 2. The Wolverine cameo
- 3. Magneto's magnetic destruction

Jennifer Lawrence returns as Mystique, my personal favorite of the X-Men. She is not as effective in the role as her predecessor, Rebecca Rojmin. Largely due to her contract, Lawrence plays Mystique more as a reluctant hero than a mutant supremist, and spends more time out of character than as the blue scaly chameleon. Fassbender's Magneto is solid, as always, until the script by Simon Kinberg requires a sudden, but all too expected, change of heart in the climatic reel. The switch is presented as a given, and no rational or logical reason is given for the shift.

The battle with god-like entities is also wearing thin. Damien Darhk became one on this season of ARROW; Vandal Savage was similar in LEGENDS OF TOMORROW; Ichabod Crane battled one on SLEEPY HOLLOW; and THE AVENGERS had to deal with Loki. Makes one wonder what producers in Hollywood fear when the reoccurring theme is one of a returning, vengeful god.

The X-Men franchise is always better with Singer in charge, but the entire prequel trilogy was unnecessary, except for box office bleeding. It only provides manifestation for an already known story.

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WARCRAFT

WARCRAFT is an enjoyable, fun movie. It's filled with action, fantasy, interesting characters and a decent story. The special effects (SFX) are first rate, it has a rousing score and is exceptionally well paced. It is well worth the price of admission, and will provide a quite enjoyable evening's entertainment.

In the mien of full disclosure, I must admit I have never played the game. I've never even seen the game, know nothing of its characters, storylines nor parameters. I consider this a major advantage, and not a distraction. When DOOM was released, with Dwayne Johnson and Carl Urban, I also knew nothing about the game. As such, I thought the movie was a fairly respectable action sci-fi flick. Afterwards, when I discovered the movie erased all the religious components of the game, I saw the film in a different light, and had to admit the story of the game was considerably better.

So far, I've not talked to anyone about the World of Warcraft game, save to have one person tell me the movie is a bit of a prequel to the game's action. As such, I thoroughly enjoyed this film, even though, given the track record of video games



transformed into movies, I had major reservations going into the theatre.

Technically, WARCRAFT boasts the finest CGI FX of any film I've seen in the past five years. Usually keen on my radar, I spotted no poor matting, proportional distortions, or inappropriate features or movements. This places WARCRAFT higher than the rash of superhero movies of late. Credit Cinematographer and Production Designer Simon Duggan and Gavin Bocquet, respectively, for the film's look and Special Effects Coordinator Jason Smith for making the storyboards succeed. Toss in a rousing orchestral score from Ramin Djawadi and WARCRAFT is a feast for the eyes and ears.

The script for WARCRAFT borrows, like most video games do, from various other sources. There is an interplanetary portal, much like STARGATE; it has interspecies love, as happened so often on STAR TREK; and it borrows, literally, the baby in the basket tale of Moses from the Bible, to name a few.

The story, as adapted by Screenwriter and Director Duncan Jones, tells of the peaceful, civilized world of Azeroth. Their world is suddenly thrown into major conflict when the Orcs, whose own world of Draenor, dies. The Orcs decide Azeroth would be an easy place to dominate and establish as a new home. Lead by an evil wizard, Gul'dan, played by Daniel Wu, the Orcs invade Azeroth only to find the humans, too, have a powerful wizard to help them in Medivh, played by Ben Foster and his apprentice Khadgar, played by Ben Schnetzer. Led by King Llane Wrynn, played by Dominic Cooper, who is doing a fine job on the AMC series PREACHER in the title role of Jessie Cutler, and Anduin Lothar, played by Travis Fimmel, the war council warrior from Stormwind, the Orcs soon discover the humans are not quite the push-overs originally thought. This causes Gul'dan to show his true colors and the possible evil behind his magic. In turn, dissention grows in the Orc ranks, especially among the members of the Frostwolf clan and its chieftain Durotan, played by Toby Kebbell, and his wife Draka, played by Anna Galvin. While Jones crafts a fine story, it does have a few gaffes.

There is no real ending to the movie. It has a conclusion, but leaves so much more to tell. The set up for further adventures is all too obvious, and with the massive box office draw in China

alone, which was upwards of \$150 million, it appears more of the world of WARCRAFT is most definitely on the way. The ending is also a bit abrupt, with a few transitions that occur without the proper set up. Most glaring is the alteration from Lothar's attempt to rescue the king's body to the altercation with Blackhand, played by Clancy Brown.

If I learn more about the game, it's possible my opinion of WARCRAFT could change. For now, though, I enjoyed the movie and found it quite entertaining. It is exceptionally difficult to create entire new worlds, with new creatures and cultures. This is why most sci-fi novels run 400-500 pages. To convert new worlds and cultures into a 120-page script is not only difficult, but often controversial. WARCRAFT gamers might take a contrary view, but I found the celluloid version to be a lot of fun.

CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE

As I have stated numerous previous times, I'm not a fan of Kevin Hart's stand-up comedy. I find it provides a few laughs, but not enough for me to consider buying a ticket. His appearance in comedy movies, however, is quite another issue. He is very funny on celluloid, and in his latest escapade, CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE, he is teamed with Dwayne "the Rock" Johnson creating one of the best comedy teams since Simon Pegg and Nick Frost.

To be certain, CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE follows a comedic template and offers nothing new in the formula established for a three act screenplay. In fact, CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE follows closely the pattern established in Hart's RIDE ALONG. In that movie, he was the foil, while Ice Cube played the serious straight man. In CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE, the roles are reversed; Hart plays it straight and serves as the set up agent, while Johnson is in this solely for laughs. He is exceptionally good. Johnson is proving to be a tour de force in Tinseltown. He can play the protagonist, and antagonist and do comedy with aplomb. Personally, I like when he's the heavy, but in this movie he is funnier than his character Elliot Wilhelm in Gary Gray's BE COOL.

Robert Weirdicht (Johnson) is the high school target. A fat, chubby boy who likes unicorns and dancing, he is bullied by nearly everyone, save the most popular kid in the school, Calvin Joyner (Hart) the Golden Jet, who captains every sports team and is voted most likely to succeed.

After a rather embarrassing moment at the high school senior assembly, Weirdicht disappears for twenty years. He reunites with Joyner years later as Bob Stone, revealing himself as a CIA operative, trying to save the civilized world. Together, the two former school mates are placed on a knife edge of deception



and delirium.

Starring with Johnson and Hart are Amy Ryan, as Agent Pamela Harris, who is convinced Stone is a rogue agent; Danielle Nicolet as Maggie Joyner, Calvin's wife, who thinks Calvin's sudden strange behavior has to do with their failing marriage; and Melissa McCarthy, who makes an uncredited cameo appearance at the film's end.

KEY SCENES TO LOOK FOR:

- 1. The office scene.
- 2. The escape from the safe house.
- 3. The marriage counselor scene.

Ironically, I was engaged in a discussion just the other day regarding the sad state of comedy films. My argument was that not many comedy films today have enduring qualities, like the Peter Sellers PINK PANTHER series. Those films still illicit guffaws, decades after they were made. Nothing by today's comedy stars, Sandler, Ferrell, Rogen and others of their ilk, can compare. CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE may be the exception to the maxim. Ike Barinholtz has penned a script devoid of juvenile bathroom humor and political commentary, enabling the laughs to last for years.

Hart and Johnson have great timing and work well together. It's a partnership we should see again. If you're looking for an evening of laughs, you can't miss with CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE.

PURPLESTRIDE PITTSBURGH 2016

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Ken, his wife Becky and the Parme family are very active with the Pittsburgh Affiliate. Though Ken Parme and his wife Becky have had a bumpy journey, they managed to come together to tell their tale of hope and inspiration in their book *In the Gaze of the Divine: Life With Pancreatic Cancer.*

Pancreatic cancer surpassed breast cancer this year to become the third leading cause of cancer-related death in the United States. The five-year survival is just 8 percent.

Ken Parme, a 4.5 year pancreatic cancer survivor and Affiliate Chair of the Pittsburgh Affiliate of the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network, knows how blindsided a pancreatic cancer diagnosis can be.

"I ate right and I exercised, I was healthy," explained Parme. "Then I started to feel fatigued during casual walks with my wife. It was then, I knew something wasn't quite right."

Parme sought counsel from his doctor, who diagnosed him with diabetes. But the diagnosis didn't feel right to Parme's wife, Becky. Becky immediately got him in to see a endocrinologist for a second opinion.

"It's a good thing my wife convinced me to do this," said Parme. "My wife saved my life."

Parme was diagnosed with inoperable locally advanced pancreatic adencarcinoma in January of 2012. This tumor was blocking his bile duct and causing jaundice. Shortly after his diagnosis, he underwent a surgical procedure called the Cyberknife, in which gold rods were implanted in his pancreas enabling his radiation treatments to target his tumor without damaging surrounding tissue. Thanks to treatments like this one, Parme has survived and is approaching the five-year survival rate with hopes to beat the odds.

Ken's daughter Amanda was looking up pancreatic cancer information online, when she came across the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network. The organization is a nationwide network of people dedicated to working together to advance research, support patients and create hope for those affected by pancreatic cancer. After seeing too little progress in pancreatic cancer survival in over half a century, the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network put a stake in the ground to double pancreatic cancer survival by 2020.

Now as an avid supporter and the newly appointed Advocacy Chair of the Pittsburgh Affiliate, Parme encourages patients and their loved ones to contact Patient Central, a free program that provides free resources and hope. Patient Central Associates can provide information on treatment

options, including clinical trials, personalized medicine services, diet and nutrition, and more. "When you're diagnosed with pancreatic cancer, time is of the essence and you have to be to be your own advocate," said Parme. "You need to get as much information as possible and you need to know what options are available to you. Patient Central takes the burden of individual research off of you, and tells you exactly what is available."

The organization's PurpleStride event contribute funds to the Patient Central program, ensuring that patients and their loved ones have access to these important resources. As the Affiliate Chair for the Pittsburgh Affiliate of the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network, Parme supports the core role volunteer leaders that work together to plan PurpleStride Pittsburgh.

PurpleStride Pittsburgh 2016, presented by HM Insurance, and will take place on August 13, at the North Shore Riverfront Park.

The 5k run/walk will be one of over 50 PurpleStride events that will take place across the country. These events range in size from brief walks to longer timed-runs, but they all share one common goal - to end pancreatic cancer. PurpleStride events raise awareness about the critical mission of the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network, and gives local residents the opportunity to help make strides toward a better future. The events also contribute millions of dollars towards the organization's mission to advance research, support patients and create hope.

For participants, it is a journey toward hope that is filled with inspiration. It is a time to honor loved ones fighting pancreatic cancer. It is a day when all of the family and friends of pancreatic cancer patients can come together in solidarity and gain both comfort and encouragement.

Parme said, "If I were to say what is important about PurpleStride it would be 2 things: Purple Stride helps to raise awareness of this disease. So much of the population is uneducated on pancreatic cancer, because no one much hears about it unless you've lost someone you love to it. Raising awareness is important, because of the dire need for funding to eradicate this disease. The more people know, the more they are willing to help." Stoudts Brewing Company

This hoppy session ale features a crisp, medium body with a light amber color. The hop kick comes to us thanks to Warrior and Cascade hops, giving the beer enough bitterness to be refreshing while hanging on to a vibrant citrus aroma.

Victory Brewing Company

Founded in Downingtown, Pennsylvania in 1996, Victory Brewing is a welcome constant in a world of constant change in the craft beer world. Both HopDevil and Festbier were part of the initial lineup of beers offered by Victory, are still available today. Summer Love, a 5.2% ABV golden ale that features whole flower hops paired with imported 2-row German malt. Another great summertime offering from Victory is their Cage Radler. Radlers are beers that mix fruit juice and lager beer to give you something that's refreshing without being overly sweet. Cage Radler comes in at 3% ABV and features the light, dry taste you expect from a lager while adding in the tartness and refreshing nature of fresh lemon.

Straub Brewery

What's more American than being the best at something? Recently the World Beer Cup was held and Pennsylvania's very own Straub Brewery walked away from the worldwide event with a bronze medal for their Kolsch.

What better time to celebrate their win than during July when we're celebrating the independence that helped them be in business since 1872.

Their award-winning Kolsch is available starting in the spring and typicall hangs around through some of the summer months, too. This 5% ABV beer is crisp, malty, and has just a hint of fruitiness on the finish.

Their Kolsch shouldn't cast a shadow on their always available Lager and Amber. These beers, both available in summer-friendly cans, are quite possibly the perfect beer for a hot day of yardwork or cooking out. It doesn't get much more independent than this.

Bell's Brewery

Much like most other breweries, there's a great story behind the start of Bell's Brewery. Started 30 years ago in Kalamazoo, Michigan by Larry Bell, the brewery began as a passion project that quickly became a great example of the American dream. Fast-forward from the early 80's back to today and Bell's Brewery makes some of the best craft beer around.

Take for example their Oberon American Wheat Ale. The brewers at Bell's took a beer style that was popular for generations in Europe and gave it an American kick that helps solidify the American Wheat Ale as our very own. This 5.8% ABV beer features spicy hop character with mild fruity aromas. The addition of wheat malt to the brew givers this beer a smooth mouthfeel while staying refreshing. While there's a lot of spicy tastes in this beer, it's all from the brewing process and the four basic ingredients that make beer great: water, malt, hops, and yeast.

Bell's Brewery was the first craft brewery east of the Rockies, and 30 years after opening their doors, is a staple of the craft beer world, helping to keep craft beer Independent and strong.

Smuttynose Brewing Company


It's hard to find a better example of our independence than New England during the Revolutionary War. It was from this collection of states that the revolution truly began and our independence was fought for and ultimately won.

Smuttynose Brewing calls New England and specifically Hampton New Hampshire home. As with the other breweries in our list Smuttynose Brewing is fiercely independent and makes some pretty amazing beers.

While Smuttynose Brewing produces great beer both seasonally and year round, it's their most popular beers that keep us coming back from more. Take for example their Finestkind IPA. This 6.9% ABV beer comes in at just over 73 IBUs, giving it enough bitterness to make it stand out as a quality bitter IPA while staying surprisingly refreshing.

Dogfish Head Brewery

1995 was a special year for craft beer. It was this year that Sam Calagione opened the doors to Dogfish Head Brewery, originally located in Rehoboth Beach, Delaware. From the single storefront in the small beach town Sam was able to grow Dogfish Head into one of the largest craft breweries in the United States today.



Without our veterans we wouldn't have very much independence to speak of at all. This may be why the craft beer world is filled with veterans both owning breweries and working for them. This is just as true locally as it is nationally, and one of the best examples of this is the fine folks at Voodoo Brewery. Originally founded by Matthew Allyn, a USAF veteran, and run by an Army vet, the company actually recently became one of the smallest employee-owned businesses in the country.

Voodoo Brewery touts an extremely impressive lineup of beers ranging from their outstanding barrel-aged beers to their impressive year-round lineup. Hoodoo IPA is one of Voodoo Brewery's most impressive beers, and for good reason. This 7.3% IPA features seven different varieties of hops and while the beer is impressively bitter, it still features notes of maltiness and even a slight fruity candy finish.

Tröegs Independent Brewing

Finishing out our list is a brewery that believes so much in being independent that they included it in the brewery's name.

Tröegs Independent Brewing is based out of Hershey, Pennsylvania and makes a lineup of beers that stands out in an industry that can be tough to impress.

The warmer months are the perfect time to enjoy a Tröegs beer, as their nearly perfect Sunshine Pils makes its appearance. This 4.5% ABV beer is light in body but big on flavor and character.

Whether you're porchsitting, grass cutting, or just kicking back and relaxing, Tröegs Sunshine Pils is exactly what this summer needs.

One for the thumb. An iconic cry that took 25 years to be assuaged by the Steelers. Now it belongs to the Penguins. After increasing the major professional sport championship tally in Pittsburgh to 15 with the franchise's fourth Stanley Cup victory, the city's hockey team faces the question every title winner does. Can they repeat?



The entry draft doesn't have any bearing on the Penguins chance of delivering back-to-back championships, but the action – or inaction – on the floor between front offices can have a major impact. This year, Penguins General Manager Jim Rutherford did move the oft-injured winger, 24-year-old Beau Bennett, who couldn't stay on the ice long enough to live up to the expectations of a first round draft choice. The man who selected him back in 2010, Ray Shero, believes his upside is worth the third round pick he gave up to make him a New Jersey Devil, although the Penguins won't miss him. In 33 games this past season, Beau had just 12 points. Rutherford said the team has "guys ahead of him and guys that can skate, puck pressure guys." When asked what went into the decision to move Bennett, he said "after we looked at our team and talked to the coaching staff about who fits, it became more apparent that Beau wasn't going to fit with us going forward."

The move that wasn't made at the draft in Buffalo might shape the chances of a repeat, however. Despite the buzz surrounding a possible trade, Marc Andre Fleury remains in black and Pittsburgh gold. Rutherford said that they'd rather

start the season with both Fleury and Matt Murray between the pipes. "That's been our preference since the end of the season. Unless something really strange happens, that's what we're going to stick to." How will the dynamic of having a Stanley Cup winning goalie duo play out? It's been well-documented how well Fleury adapted to his role of support staff in the playoffs and being awarded the Players' Player Award for two years in a row tells you all you need to know about his dedication to the team. But can a net minder by committee approach work for a full season? We'll just have to wait and see.

We won't have to wait long to see how free agency plays out – the signing period begins July 1 - While Rutherford said the team probably has around \$1 million to play with before bumping up against the slightly increased \$73 million salary cap, they won't be doing much. Unlike many Stanley

Cup winners, the Penguins have the majority of their players signed next year and beyond. Arguably the biggest difference maker last season, Carl Hagelin is inked through 2018-19. Having defenseman Trevor Daley under team control for at least one more year is huge because the Penguins are likely to lose both veteran blueliner Ben Lovejoy and the offensive minded defensive play of Justin Schultz in free agency. Teams will overpay championship players and the Pens aren't in a position to compete with those deals.

The gritty Patric Hornqvist and Eric Fehr are signed for two more years as are the trio of Wilkes-Barre call ups turned everyday NHL players – Scott Wilson, Bryan Rust and Tom Kuhnhackl. Connor Sheary has another year on the books and a couple of exciting, young, up and coming forwards, Oskar Sundqvist and Daniel Sprong are primed to make their mark. While we haven't seen what former first








round pick, defenseman Derrick Pouliot is fully capable of, underestimating the blue line of the Penguins is dangerous business. Just ask the Rangers, Capitals, Lightning and Sharks. A key re-signing that will continue to improve the defense, and is probably flying under the radar, will be that of assistant coach Jacques Martin. Rutherford has offered a contract extension to the defensive specialist and keeping him on staff will help with continuity as some of the players will change on the backend. With a strong sense of identity to start the season under their stalwart head coach Mike Sullivan, the chances of deep playoff run next year are high.

The Penguins are the early favorites to win the Stanley Cup but repeating will be tough. A bullseye will be firmly on their backs as reigning champs. It's been nearly 20 years since the last time a team won back-to-back titles. The Detroit Red Wings did it in 1997-98 and of course, Mario Lemieux led the Penguins to repeat Cups in 1991-92. If Sidney Crosby and gang can accomplish it, the "one for the thumb" wait won't be long.



A streetwalker was visiting her doctor for a regular check-up.



A teacher was giving a lesson on the circulation of the blood. Trying to make the matter clearer, she said, "Now, class, if I stood





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
