

Bucco fever is heating up. It's colder than the North Pole outside in the Steel City, literally, but baseball lovers everywhere are feeling their hearts and souls warming with the sounds of spring training. Pictures and videos are flowing in from Bradenton on the information highway so quickly it can feel like you are right there, group hugging it out with Andrew McCutchen and A.J. Burnett (and if you haven't seen that picture, get to Google). Baseball circles are including your Pittsburgh Pirates in the "best of baseball" conversation. Heck, one popular pundit thinks they are better than the hated Cardinals! After back-to-back postseason appearances, the black and gold are firmly entrenched in contention. Will they win the division this year? If they secure a wild card berth for the third season in a row, can they get to the National League Championship Series for the first time since 1992? Or the World Series for the first time since 1979? Anything can happen. That's the beauty of the start of

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the season. Everyone's in first place. Technically, everyone is also in last place. Much will happen between now and October, so here's how I see it . . .

IT IS WHAT IT IS WITH PEDRO. Everyone and their mother is talking about how Pedro Alvarez is primed for a bounce back performance this season, so I'm not going to rehash his craptacular 2014 statistics or bemoan the fact he didn't volunteer for voluntary team workouts over the winter. We all know the only place to go from here is up for El Toro – possibly also to the barber shop to get that gosh forsaken beard trimmed - but regardless of what he does at first base, there's good news. The Pirates have shown that they can win without him feasting in the regular season. If he is more of a famine kinda guy for the second year in a row, so be it. He'll still be better than what they had last year at first base, plus I'm banking on a few other guys taking their games to the next level anyway. Namely Starling Marte and Gregory Polanco.

WILL IT BE THE BEST OUTFIELD IN BASEBALL? It depends. Maybe the guestion should be, do the Pirates potentially have the best outfield in baseball? Then the answer would be an emphatic YES. For the past two seasons we've been waiting for Marte to develop into a star. The physical capabilities are all there, but the mental game was questionable at times. Until August of last year, that is. In the final two months of the season Marte batted .354, got on base over 40 percent of the time and wreaked havoc on the base paths. He put it all together and showed us what he could do. If Gregory Polanco can do the same after getting 89 games under his belt at the major league level and filling out his frame in the offseason, Andrew McCutchen will be centering quite the talented group of outfielders.

J-HAY THE MAN...AGAIN? The baseball world is watching to see if Josh Harrison can duplicate his breakout season. If I was his coach I would remind him of that. The fact that people don't believe he can sustain that type of production. That he was a fluke. That the game will catch up to him. J Hay has gotten a lot of hype and deservedly so, however I think he skyrocketed up the depth chart because he had a chip on his shoulder. He had something to prove. Harrison has even said himself that he played hurt last year because he was fearful of coming out of the lineup, thinking he would be back on the bench. Energy will never be an issue. Sparkplug is Harrison's middle name

INFIELD DEPTH IS OFF THE CHARTS: A possible 30 plus dinger guy and a scrappy batting champion runner up at the corners are just the tip of the dirtberg. Neil Walker is coming off his first silver slugger season where he hit more homeruns than any other second baseman in the National League. He will be playing for a big payday the next two seasons and if he can stay on the field, he has missed 25 or more games the last three seasons, Walker will have a huge











impact on the lineup. His fellow middle man, Jordy Mercer hit .199 the first two months of the season, but over the final four months was able to raise his average 60 points. Mercer was steady in the field with just one throwing error all year and should be pushed to build off that second half by newcomer Jung Ho Kang. The first ever winning bid by the Pirates in the international posting system brought them the opportunity to sign the power hitting infielder from the Korean Baseball Organization. And at four years and \$11 million, if Kang even sniffs his level of offensive production in the KBO, it will be a great deal for Pittsburgh. But how much playing time will he get? Will irregular reps allow him to adapt to the major league game? He is an enigma, but one that will be fun to watch.

A few under the radar additions include utility man Sean Rodriguez, who hit homers at a better rate per at bat than Pedro Alvarez last season, and Corey Hart, who will be looking to prove both the Brewers and the Mariners wrong for letting him walk. Once Travis Snider was traded to Baltimore, the off the bench power bat onus was put squarely on these guys. Hart always did damage at PNC Park when he was with Milwaukee and if he can rediscover some of that power, he will be the left handed hitter the Pirates need.


I haven't even mentioned pitching yet and I'm already JACKED for Opening Day.

BUILT ON PITCHING: This has been the drum beat by the Bucs since Neal Huntington arrived in town. It's still the case despite the recent offensive surge in the lineup. One cannot mention pitching when talking about the Pirates without mentioning catcher Russell Martin. He will not simply be replaced, although offensively his production can be made up for by other hitters kicking their own games up a notch, but his work with the pitching staff and his leadership will be hard to duplicate. I mean, who will be the clubhouse DJ? Trading lefty flame thrower Justin Wilson to the Yankees for Francisco Cervelli was a shrewd move that could pay off big. Wilson was replaced by Antonio Bastardo who strikes out over 11 batters per nine innings, not bad. It's Cervelli that holds the key to battery success. He'll give you the fire you're looking for from a leader, rates very good defensively and when healthy, can do some good work with the bat. It's the injury bug he needs to squash to become what the Pirates believe he can.

I have a feeling Gerrit Cole will take the next step in his career, finding consistency in his second full season in the big leagues and Francisco Liriano is back to strike out the world. A.J. Burnett brings the energy and will eat innings. Jeff Locke will also benefit from having his best bud back. Last season Locke pitched his best games against the Phillies with Batman looking on in approval. The back end of the rotation is quite the question mark. Will Charlie Morton ever be healthy enough to pitch to his "electric stuff" potential? Is Vance Worley a viable starter? What about Nick Kingham? As is always the case, staying on the field will be the number one factor in the success of the starting pitching. All-stars Tony Watson and Mark Melancon return and lock down the bullpen. SO there's no question marks there.

General Manager Neal Huntington has been quoted as saying this is the deepest and most talented roster he's put together in his time in Pittsburgh. And Russell Martin is a Blue Jay. But I can see why. While writing I kept thinking of players I wanted to mention because THERE ARE SO MANY that could have an impact. How will it all play out? It'll be fun to watch. And I for one will be in attendance.

Mr Small's Is Bigtime by Eric Saferstein

ack in 2007, a group of us made the trek to Mr. Small's Funhouse for a Dark Star Orchestra concert. For those unfamiliar with DSO, they're a premiere touring Grateful Dead cover band. The crowd was energetic. The show was inspired. But the venue seemed a bit hollow and dank, kind of like Mo's bar on the Simpsons.

Eight years later on February 7, 2015, a different crew of us returned to the scene of the crime in Millvale, PA. When I say crime, I'm talking about a transformation. "Utterly blown away" is the only way to describe our experience. Let's try a hometown sports analogy. If a Pirates game at Three Rivers Stadium was the old Mr. Small's, then PNC Park, is by definition the new and improved

version. As a matter of fact, the venue is a microcosm for the surrounding community. Millvale seems to be experiencing a reawakening. Some would call it an urban renaissance of sorts. Meet your new neighbor. It's Mr. Mill from Smallvale. Say that 10x fast.

A coarsely seasoned crowd of about 500 filtered inside for the Chris Robinson Brotherhood. You might

be familiar with the lead vocalist. He's the front man of The Black Crowes, a renowned southern hard rock band. Robinson's alternate band takes a less abrasive approach. However, never confuse volume with musicianship (one crucial exception... Spinal Tap, of course). Thoughtful jams and bluesy riffs elicited shrieks of joy as the crowd swayed their way through two lengthy sets. The Brotherhood doesn't rely on the same set list every night. Originality and spontaneity are the norm, not the exception. The band plays with an ethereally calming precision. Methodically drifting from one song to the next. They encored that night with a heartfelt Sugaree, a staple from the early Dead catalog. It seemed to trigger fond memories throughout the crowd.

As fine as the show was, the venue itself is the true gem. Pittsburgh boasts some impressive sub-1000 seat venues. There's old school theaters like The Byham in the arts district and the rustic Carnegie Library in Homestead. These seem better suited for high profile comedians and acoustic acts. There's the straightforward, all-purpose Rex Theater on the Southside and the metallic-leaning Altar Bar in the Strip. And then there's Mr. Small's which bridges the gap for all musical genres. As a refurbished church, they're even set up to host private parties and weddings. Nothing is off limits or out of bounds. Perhaps that's what makes it so inviting. In today's "pay to park, herd 'em in and get 'em out" mentality, Mr. Small's is assuredly a diamond in the





rough. If you asked anyone from the band, "Were there any memorable concert halls that stood apart from the rest?" I'm sure they'd reply, "Yeah dude, there was this pimped out church in Pittsburgh. Never seen anything like it."

When I use the term "oasis" to describe Mr. Small's, you might think I'm joking. After all, it's right on the cusp of the Burgh just outta dahntahn. But the place literally cries out escapism. One can venture deep into the catacombs and hang out in the reclusive, aptly named War Room. You can ascend the stairs to the open-air rooftops where the views rival those of San Francisco and Paris. Or so I'm told. It was dark outside. An adjacent dining area, The Funhouse Restaurant serves traditional, upscale bar food. Craft beers and mixed drinks are readily available at reasonable prices. They even have VIP rooms and are putting the finishing touches on a

spacious balcony. The staff is friendly without being obtrusive, competent and professional but not overbearing.

But what really struck me as memorable was the sense of community. The crowd descended from all over East Ohio, Northern West Virginia and Southwestern PA. Everyone came together that night, converging upon a refurbished house of worship for a rock'n'roll revival. The atmosphere had a little bit of everything... from a hippie picnic to a biker reunion to a classic rocker (whatever that is).

Last summer, my girlfriend and I ventured to Millvale Community Days, a weekend festival in the heart of the town square. A disheveled man approached us wielding some kind of oversized granola bar. In a gruff voice, he brazenly inquired, "Sir! Ma'am! Would you like to try a supplemental nutritional replacement meal?" He barked on, "They taste really good! You see, we're trying to establish a foothold in the community." He seemed a little out there, kind of quasi-carnie-inspired. We were a little taken aback and politely declined the rectangular protein snack. A year has passed and we often reflect back on our instinctive dismissal. And it makes us sad. Ya wanna know why? Because Millvale is worthy of taking that chance. So here's my advice. Throw your inhibitions to the wind and sample the amalgamation of wheat, oats and honey. Taste the rhombus bar. Eat the wholesome parallelogram. Take in a show at Mr. Small's. You won't regret it. Remember, you can always think back in time, but you can never go back in time. And it is those moments in time that are waiting to be had... at Mr. Small's.

How I Learned What I Learned runs March 5 – April 5, 2015 at the O'Reilly Theater, Pittsburgh Public Theater's home in the heart of Downtown's Cultural District. Mr. Wilson performed his one-man show at Seattle Repertory Theatre in 2003. The New York premiere was produced by Signature Theatre in New York City in 2013. Starring in The Public's production will be Eugene Lee, a stage, film and television actor, writer, and artist in residence at Texas State University. Last year he performed the role at Kenny Leon's True Colors Theatre in Atlanta, GA.

How I Learned begins in Pittsburgh's Hill District in 1965 when Mr. Wilson was 20 years old. He tells of dropping out of school at age 15 to write poetry, and how he supported himself by cutting grass and working at Klein's and Kroger's. He talks about the neighborhood and its people, and how he was inspired by what they saw in him. He dishes about his girlfriend, Snookie, and how he almost fought a duel in her honor at Downtown's Oyster House. From the Christmas pageant in Sister Mary Eldephonse's seventh grade class to hearing John Coltrane at the Crawford Grill in 1966, Mr. Wilson reveals his outrage and passion. Sometimes shockingly provocative and often hilariously funny, How I Learned is an amazingly generous portrait of this uncompromising artist as a young man.

The designers for How I Learned What I Learned are David Gallo (Scenery and Projections), Constanza Romero (Costumes), Thom Weaver (Lighting), and Zach Moore (Sound). Fred Noel is the Production Stage Manager.

About the Playwright

August Wilson was born on April 27, 1945 in Pittsburgh's Hill District and was raised there. He went on to become one of the world's most acclaimed playwrights. His most visionary work, known as the American Century Cycle, comprises 10 plays about

the African-American experience in each decade of the 20th century. Since all but one of the plays are set in his hometown, they are also known as the Pittsburgh Cycle. The play are: Gem of the Ocean, Joe Turner's Come and Gone, Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, The Piano Lesson, Seven Guitars, Fences, Two Trains Running, Jitney, King Hedley II, and Radio Golf. He received numerous awards, including two Pulitzer Prizes and a Tony. He was also given the only high school diploma ever issued by the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh. At the time of his death in 2005, Mr. Wilson lived in Seattle, WA. Later that year the Broadway venue located at 245 West 52nd Street was renamed The August Wilson Theatre.



The Making of a Playwright: August Wilson and Black Horizon Theatre.

Panel Discussion: Monday, March 16. 7 pm. O'Reilly Theater. Free.

Moderated by Larry Glasco and Chris Rawson. Black Horizon Theatre, which operated in the Hill District from 1968 to 1972, was a training ground for August Wilson and others. These early years will be discussed along with a first-ever reunion of Black Horizon company members.





UNLOADED, a multimedia group show that explores historical and social issues surrounding the availability, use, and impact of guns in our culture, will be on exhibit at SPACE, 812 Liberty Avenue, in the Cultural District, through April 26, 2015. This exhibit is presented by the Pittsburgh Cultural Trust.


The works in UNLOADED consider age, gender, race, mental health, political affiliations, and philosophical stances as factors surrounding our attitudes and uses of guns. They reflect a number of perspectives, though none endorse the gun as a means to an end. UNLOADED is organized by Susanne Slavick, who is the Andrew W. Mellon Professor of Art at Carnegie Mellon University. "For over a decade, my work as an artist, and more recently as a curator, has dealt with violence, primarily the violence of war and its aftermath," Slavick says. "UNLOADED shifts the focus to violence on the home front where guns play an enormous role in wounding the well-being of society, whether through the tragedies of domestic violence, suicide, or homicide."


UNLOADED includes the sculpture Cross for the Unforgiven by Mel Chin that configures eight AK-47s as a Maltese cross. Frozen in perpetual opposition, they are rendered dysfunctional, unable to exact a drop of blood. With ironic sentimentality, the assemblage Baby's First Gun by Renee Stout commemorates a developmental milestone, while James Duesing's Dog—a

projected video of a hot dog holding a gun—offers a wry rendition of machismo. For the Homeland series, Nina Berman travelled the country photographing military weapons displays, SWAT team training, and drills designed to prepare for hypothetical terrorist attacks, in order to portray the evolution of the "American security state." Resistance to the power of guns is embodied in Vanessa German's sculptures, signs, and spoken word performances and in Jessica Fenlon's ungun, a video composed of degrading glitched images of instruments of violence.



Spring is a time for lighter colored and bodied beers that run the gamut in tastes from big and bitter IPAs to Mai Bocks and golden ales.

These beers tend to be a departure from the big dark beers that we all love in the winter, and while a good stout is never a bad thing, the thought of drinking a springtime beer on the porch is far too tempting, at least until we get all of this snow out of sight for another year.

A good springtime beer should awaken the taste buds and remind you that the sun is still out there...hopefully. As cold dark nights give way to bright crisp days, let the beers you drink reflect this, Check out our list of beers to try this spring and while these aren't all seasonal beers by nature, they're all perfect for this time of year.

Anderson Valley Spring Hornin' IPA

As the flowers start to come out, a great floral IPA is exactly what you want, and Anderson Valley's Spring Hornin' IPA is just that. Light in color and big on taste, you should notice aromas of lilacs, white pepper, and Bartlett pears followed up with a taste that has a strong, clean malt body and herbal hop flavors. The finish is nice and dry, with just enough bitterness to be refreshing.

Spring Hornin' comes in at 6.8% ABV and is brewed using Columbus, Golding, Nugget, and Northern Brewer hops. Spring Hornin' is a great beer for the season, and should be at the top of your list. Spring Hornin' pairs well with Fish and chips,

roasted lamb, peppery Korean beef, and even oatmeal raisin cookies.

Bell's Smitten Golden Rye

Rye is a very unique ingredient for beer. It imparts a spiciness and body that's unique to the grain, and when used correctly it can make a truly amazing beer. Bell's Brewery made their Smitten Ale featuring rye to bring out these exact characteristics. On the nose you'll notice peppery rye spiciness along with a noticeable bready aroma. The taste has rye up front with a nice citrusy hop character following it up. All of this sits nicely on a malt backbone that's all about bready malt. The rye imparts a creamy mouthfeel that finishes the beer up perfectly.

Bell's Smitten Golden Rye Ale comes in at 6% ABV and is available only during the spring and early summer. Smitten is a great example of an interesting take on the traditional American Pale Ale with a nice rye malt twist. Smitten Golden Rye Ale pairs very well with strong cheeses, salty snacks, and savory meats.

Dogfish Head Aprihop

Did you know there's a fruit beer made specifically for hop lovers? Dogfish Head Brewing out of Milton, DE merged two opposite ideas together to make a truly remarkable beer. Aprihop is brewed like the other IPAs at Dogfish Head, and is hopped continuously for a solid hop flavor, but the big difference here is the addition of apricot juice.

Don't expect this beer to be sweet though, the apricot juice is in place to accent the hop flavors and to help balance the beer out. You get a hint of the apricot flavor along with a healthy dose of hop flavor and aroma, partially due to the dry hopping this beer receives with Amarillo hops.

This 7% ABV beer is rich with hop flavors, with the bitterness tempered perfectly with the malt body and sweet apricot juice. Like most other IPAs, Aprihop is thirst-quenching while being fruity and crisp. Aprihop, like most solid IPAs, pairs well with Salads, swordfish, Mexican dishes, barbeque, and hummus.

North Country Bucco Blonde

North Country Brewing out of Slippery Rock, PA specifically for Pittsburgh's very own Pirates. More specifically, for the Bucco's pitching coach Ray Searage, also known as Uncle Ray.

This 4.9% ABV American Blonde Ale has a great malt body with a hint of bitterness to balance things out. While there is a nice malty sweetness to the beer, it finishes clean and dry, making for a truly refreshing beer, especially for watching the Pirates raise the Jolly Roger. Bucco Blonde Ale, much like other blondes, pairs well with cheeses like Brick, Edam, Monterey Jack, Pepper Jack, and food dishes like Italian, salads, chicken dishes, grilled foods, fish, shellfish and spicy foods

Otter Creek Citra Mantra

A newer style that's been gaining popularity in recent years is the India Pale Lager, or IPL. Similar to the IPA, just made to be a lager instead of an ale. You still get the fresh bitterness of an IPA, but with the crispness and light body of a lager.

Otter Creek Brewing's Citra Mantra is their take on the IPL style, featuring Citra hops. This gives the beer a fresh citrus flavor along with a crisp bitterness. Along with the tropical fruit character, the choice of German malts gives the beer a unique body that makes it easy to drink. The 5.75% ABV helps you to have more than one in a sitting, too. Make sure you get this one quickly though, because just like spring, this beer won't be around long. Citra Mantra pairs well with spicy dishes like Mexican and Thai, as well as savory Italian dishes like chicken parmesan.

Smuttynose Durty

Sure, springtime is all about flowers growing, birds chirping, and life coming back to the world, but it's also about all that snow thawing and melting away. Melting snow means mud, and Smuttynose Brewing would rather embrace the mud and get Durty (yep, that's how they spell it).













Durty is a hoppy brown ale that they're calling their "mud season" ale. You should taste caramal notes common to brown ales as well as the hop aroma and taste you'd expect form an IPA, all in one beer. Don't let the darker color fool you, this is a seriously fresh and crisp beer that helps to bridge the gap between the cold winter nights and the warm spring days, and at 8% ABV, it'll keep you warm if there's a rogue cold night out there still, too. Durty is a pretty unique beer, but should pair well with spicier dishes as well as fried and salty foods.

Straub Maibock

Straub Brewing out of St. Mary's, PA has been making some pretty amazing beers lately, which shouldn't surprise anyone familiar with the brewery. One of their newer offerings is a 6.9% ABV all-malt Maibock.

Straub's Maibock is literally a bock beer released in May, and this version is brewed using a combination of German and American ingredients. The nose is full of caramel and malty aromas with a little hop character to balance things out. Taste follows the taste, but adds a little more hop to back up the big malt taste. Maibocks pair very well with a variety of foods including cheeses like Gruyere, meats like ham, seafood, and even deserts like carrot cake.

Tröeg's Cultivator

With the ground thawing, it's time to start cultivating the ground and get those crops planted. Not into the whole farming business? That's fine, you can still join in with Tröeg's Cultivator Helles Bock.

This 6.9% ABV lager is a fresh and crisp beer with just enough hop bitterness to be refreshing. Brewed with floor malted Bohemian Pilsner malt and Hersbrucker and Magnum hops, Cultivator is possibly the perfect spring beer. The malt body gives the beer a little more meat than a typical lager while still staying light enough to be delicious.

Cultivator pairs very well with a variety of cheeses including



Asiago, Colby, Gruyère and Swiss. The malty sweetness and clean, dry finish of the beer also complements spicy dishes like Thai or Korean BBQ, shellfish, and a variety of fried foods.

Victory Anniversary 19

Victory Brewing turned 19 years old this month, and while the brewery itself still isn't old enough for a beer, the brew created to celebrate the occasion is simply great. Instead of brewing a massively high ABV beer to celebrate, Victory chose instead to brew a session IPA that comes in at 4.5% ABV. Why, you ask? Well, Victory wanted the party to keep going and the best way to do that is to pace yourself with a great tasting beer.

Anniversary 19 features hoppy aromas of citrus and pine along with flavors of orange peel and citrus that pair perfectly with the herbal hop notes. All of this sits nicely on a light malt body to give you a beer that's perfectly balanced and finishes dry. Anniversary 19 goes to show you that you don't need high alcohol to have a beer with huge flavor, and that sometimes less is definitely more. Anniversary 19 pairs very well with spicy foods as well as salty dishes.

While Left Hand Brewing Co., out of Longmont, Colorado can't control the seasons...yet...they can help you on the beer front. Left Hand offers a variety of beers but what you'll definitely want for this holiday is their famous Milk Stout Nitro. Left Hand Milk Stout Nitro is the only beer brewed in the United States that puts beer and nitrogen in a bottle.

Nitrogen does something magical to a beer. First, when poured correctly, nitro beers form creamy heads that resemble whipped cream. They have a rich and creamy taste, and best of all, are lighter in your stomach than a traditional beer, since nitrogen is lighter than CO2. Left Hand Brewing Co. choose their amazing Milk Stout and Sawtooth Ale to receive the nitro treatment. So what exactly is a nitro beer all about? Here's the lowdown before taking a look at what Left Hand Brewing Co. has to offer. Got Nitro?

Today nitro beers are far more popular and widespread, even covering

beers that aren't of the stout variety.

Nitrogen is not very soluble in
liquid, which is why nitro taps in
bars have a special tap handle.

This handle has a restrictor plate in it which forces the beer through small holes, making the nitrogen mix with the beer. This is why a freshly poured nitro beer has the waterfall effect while the beer settles.

While you're seeing tiny bubbles falling to the bottom of the glass, larger bubbles of nitrogen are rising to the top in the center;

creating that thick creamy
head that nitro beers are
known for. Nitro beers actually mimic the wonderful
taste of cask beer without

the need to find a

bar with the exact firkin you want.
Milk Stout Nitro out of the bottle gives you a thick, creamy head and a creamy taste while staying relatively low in carbonation, or fizziness.



Now that you have a little background on nitro beers, check out what Left Hand Brewing has to offer this St. Paddy's Day in both nitro and standard CO2 varieties.

Milk Stout Nitro

Dark, delicious, and amazingly creamy, Milk Stout Nitro is a beer to behold. The combination of a sweet stout and nitrogen make for a beer experience unlike any other you've had. They say first impressions are everything, and pouring a Milk Stout Nitro from the bottle is amazing enough to remember. To make the beer nitrogenate properly, Left Hand tells you to "Pour Hard" by literally up-ending the bottle and allowing it to escape the bottle haphazardly into your pint glass. While you might think an overflow is imminent, think again. Just when it seems like you'll have a mess to clean up, the bottle empties and the creamy head starts to form. Let the beer sit for a minute or two, and you're left with a beauty of a beer. It starts out wild and finishes up smooth and sweet for a first impression that you'll remember.

On the nose you'll pick up brown sugar and vanilla cream with just a hint of roasted coffee. The taste follows through with the aroma, but adds roasty mocha flavors that pair perfectly with the semi-sweetness of a milk stout. There is a slight hop profile, but the small amount of bitterness in this beer comes on the finish, which is surprisingly dry and slightly roasty. The creaminess of Milk Stout Nitro gives you an amazing mouth feel that carries the complex flavors through from start to finish.

Milk Stout

If you love milk stouts but want a little less nitrogen in your beer, then the standard Milk Stout from Left hand Brewing is perfect. Don't expect this to taste like milk, but instead milk sugars help this beer to gain some additional creaminess and sweetness without affecting the 6% ABV it sits at.

Expect this beer to have an aroma featuring vanilla with tons of roasted malt and some sweetness. On first taste you'll find coffee, sweetness, and some roasted malt. There's just a little hop bitterness, but it's hard to find, as the roasted malt gives the

beer it's small amount of bitterness that you actually taste.

The standard Milk Stout has a great carbonation and still stays smooth and easy to drink, even though it's missing the nitrogen from it's sibling.

Sawtooth Ale Nitro

Nitro beers don't always have to be dark, and a great example of this is Sawtooth Nitro from Left Hand Brewing. With Sawtooth Nitro,

the brewers took their Extra Special
Bitter (ESB) at 5.3% ABV and put it in a

bottle with nitrogen to give it a creamy texture and amazingly thick and creamy head.

The appearance of this beer is amazing. The golden-orange color of the beer topped with a nice thick head of pure white makes for one of the most picturesque beers you'll ever have. The aroma is light on Sawtooth Nitro, but you should pick up some caramel and just a hint of sweetness. The taste is light with malty sweetness up front and toasted caramel finishing it up. The mouthfeel is where Sawtooth Nitro really shines, as it's creamy, crisp, and medium bodied. The nitrogen in this beer kicks it up a notch and makes for a truly enjoyable experience.

Sawtooth Ale

Just like Milk Stout, you can get the amazing Sawtooth Ale with the standard CO2 carbonation, too. Sawtooth was Left Hand Brewing's original flagship beer, and for good reason. This medium-bodied beer comes in at 5.35 ABV and features



all the things we love about ESBs with a little bit more extra.

The appearance is similar to that of its nitro sibling, but without the creamy white head. This complex beer starts out with a malty sweetness that's well balanced as to not be cloying. Upon first taste, this transitions over to an herbal, earthy flavor thanks to the Magnum, US Goldings, Wilamette, and Cascade hops. Sawtooth finishes dry without being overly bitter; a truly well balanced beer.

400 Pound Monkey IPA

So far we've looked at two beers that are easy to drink and easy on the bitterness. While these are great, there comes a time for big hop flavor and the kick that only an IPA can offer. Left Hand has you covered here too with their 400 Pound Monkey.

400 Pound Monkey is an English-style IPA that has loads of herbal hop notes and a bready malt body. English-style IPAs are traditionally better balanced than their US counterparts, making for a beer that's both bitter and malty with a great color and medium body. This 6.8% ABV beer isn't too hoppy, but is still bitter enough for every IPA fan to love. All of this hop flavor comes from the choice of Magnum, Boadicea, and Sovereign hops, which give the beer it's earthy and herbal aroma and taste.

Mountain Mixer 12 Pack

Are you one of those people that just can't decide? Find it hard to commit to only one of these beers? Well, you're not alone. Left Hand Brewing created their Mountain Mixer for people just like you. This 12-pack features 4 different beers that rotate regularly based on the season and what beers the packaging guys are loving that week.

You get three each of the four beers featured, so there's no commitment. You get to have the beers you love, and maybe even try one you haven't had before. Seems like a real winwin scenario for sure.

Coming Soon: No Good Juju Summer Seasonal

A light ale brewed with organic ginger to create a spicy aroma and unique flavor. A little Juju voodoo – fresh ginger kisses the lithe malty body, copulating with the hop in this pale ale ancestor. Emancipate yourself from the dead of winter, none but the vernal equinox can free the light

Whether you choose a variety or stick with Sawtooth, there's a pack of Left Hand beers that's just what you're looking for. This St. Paddy's Day, make the beer you drink an American craft beer, and choose Left Hand.
