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Staying sharp is based on good discipline, which is doing what you should do, even though you don't feel like doing it, but doing it anyway.

Eat and Drink Wisely:

Drink as much water as you can comfortably consumer. Soft drinks that are not sugar-free should be avoided. Skim milk and non-fat cottage cheese are your best bets for dairy products.

Sugar, alcohol and salt are triggering foods. The more you have, the more you want. They trigger the appetite and play havoc with the pancreas and insulin which can cause diabetes and fat storage.

Exercise Regularly:

Do aerobic (oxygen burning exercise such as walking, jogging and so on) plus anaerobic (weight bearing type exercises.) Aerobic exercise will help your overall conditioning, while weight training is excellent for muscle improvement or maintenance. Exercising with weights will also help your bone density and prevent osteoporosis.

Cultivate Stimulating Pastimes and interests:

Learning or experiencing new things will help sharpen a healthy mind.

Be Flexible:

When you are rigid or unbending you are more likely to snap. Learn to roll with the punches; it will hurt a lot less. Don't worry or fret over things over which you have no control. Keep stress to a minimum. It's not

what happens to you, but what happens within you that gives your control.

Be Organized:

Eliminate the unnecessary and organize the essential. Setting up daily routines and habits lightens the load on your memory and frees it up for tasks that are more important. "First, we make our habits and then they make us."

Visualize What You Want, Not What You Are Trying To Avoid:

Don't say, "I don't want to get sick," say, "I want to stay well." "Whatever you vividly imagine, ardently desire, sincerely believe possible and enthusiastically act upon will eventually and inevitably come to pass."

Write it Down:

The shortest pen or pencil is better than the longest memory. Use a checklist and a daily planner.

Adapt and Adjust:

If you want long time survival, realize that nothing stays the same. "Change is neither good nor bad, it just is."

Live With this Principle:

"What is, is." It doesn't matter if it is fair or not, it is how we deal with a problem that turns it into a positive or stressful situation.

Count Your Blessings and Also Learn From Your Mistakes:

Take pleasure in your religion, your family, your friends and your job.

If you follow these disciplines, you will be healthier, have more energy and look more youthful; in addition, you will act and stay sharp.

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The Pieces of the Penguins' Playoff Push

s the regular season winds down, the Pittsburgh Penguins have continued to heat up. With just two games left before the opening round of the playoffs, the Pens have put together a 22-3 record in the months of March and April. Sandwiched in the midst of that stellar 25 game span was the ever thrilling, and sometimes anxiety inducing, trade deadline drama fest. Who's on the block? Will the team go all in? Do you go after big name rental players for a Stanley Cup run or resign-able pieces for the long term?

This season was no exception. But that's nothing new for General Manager, Ray Shero. The trade deadline has traditionally been a very busy time for the man who has held the G.M. office since 2006. This is especially true when he can sniff a championship. Like in the 2007-08 campaign, when in addition to picking up the massive Hal Gill, he dealt for superstar Marian Hossa, who abruptly signed with the Detroit Red Wings after the Penguins lost to them in the Stanley Cup finals that year. Why? Because Hossa, in his own words, "wanted to win a championship," which



Pittsburgh proceeded to do the following year, beating Hossa's Red Wings with the key deadline acquisitions of Chris Kunitz and Bill Guerin. Hal Gill was happy to stick around and hoist Lord Stanley's Cup, I'm sure.

And although the deadline deal bringing James Neal and Matt Niskanen to the Burgh from Dallas didn't provide the same result, it's still paying dividends as both players continue to contribute. But after a couple of disappointing postseason performances, there may have been a sense of urgency this year. The work Shero has put in this time around might possibly go down as the most impactful in his career with Mario's men. It will certainly be remembered as the most exciting, unless you are a Bruins fan of course. Then maybe you'd categorize it as the most heart breaking. Watching future Hall of Fame forward and longtime Calgary Flame captain, Jarome Iginla, hand pick the Penguins after it was widely reported he was already on a plane to Beantown, had to crush the B's fan base. Pittsburgh of course, was pleasantly surprised.

Prior to the addition of Iginla, affectionately known as "Iggy", Shero added more veteran experience and depth when he went back to the Stars' well to grab their captain, Brandon Morrow and double dipped into the Western Conference to acquire defenseman Douglas Murray from the San Jose Sharks. All together, those three players bring with them 189 games of NHL playoff experience.

The euphoria created by all of those moves just inflated the fandom's growing confidence in a group that was already on a history making tear as the Pens ultimately became the only team to ever record an undefeated month when playing 10 or more games when they went 15-0 in March. Even though the team was riding high, there were questions too. How would all the pieces fit together? Would the new guys gel? Is there enough ice time to go around?

And then it happened. What nobody wanted to happen happened. Sidney Crosby went down. When Brooks Orpik's slapshot deflected up into Crosby's face, breaking his jaw and scattering some teeth across the ice, the entire hockey world seemed to stop on its axis, collectively holding its breath as visions of an aggravated head injury haunted fans. Thankfully, that was not the case and as the team awaits their captain's return to the ice, the depth gained through the new acquisitions




to that point has maintained the level of success the Pens have had throughout this truncated season. Just in the nick of time as well, because when Crosby went down, he joined Evgeni Malkin, who has since made it back to the lineup, Kris Letang, who was suffering from a broken toe but is also back, and resurgent defenseman, Paul Martin, who has yet to make his return from a broken hand.

Whew! So many additions yet so many key players dropping like flies. And just when you thought he had hung up his trading pants, as the deadline to swap loomed the afternoon of April 3rd, Mr. Ray constructed yet another deal. Shero brought in the waiver-clearing Jussi Jokinen, a versatile forward from the Carolina Hurricanes, for a late round conditional draft pick, which fortified a suddenly thinning forward corps. He couldn't have joined the team at a better time, either. Against the New York Rangers, as Jokinen made a splash scoring the only regulation goal and then the shootout game winner during his Consol Energy Center debut, James Neal went down with a concussion and is out indefinitely.

Is there a silver lining to all of these injuries to impact players? There just might be. Even without their big dogs, the Penguins have continued to play well, losing just once since that game against the Rangers. They could potentially round out March and April with a 24-3 record to finish the regular season. Brenden Morrow, Jarome Iginla and Jussi Jokinen have become a big part of the game plan, contributing all around the ice, while Douglas "Crankshaft" Murray has definitely added another level of toughness. They've gotten a chance to get acclimated to their new teammates. To get a feel for their new surroundings. To familiarize themselves with a new system. If there were to be injuries, this was the best time to have them.

What is the key to the success of Ray Shero's deals? Hunger. All of the new additions had spent their careers with one franchise, except Jokinen who had been on three previous teams, without raising Lord Stanley's cup. None of them have kissed the cool silver plates or had their names engraved on the rings, cementing their championship legacies. Nearly 35 pounds of hockey history are waiting to be hoisted over players' heads and they want it to finally be theirs.

As Crosby, Neal and Martin get incorporated back into the lineup for the second season, it's safe to say the Penguins will be the favorites to come out of the Eastern Conference and play for the Stanley Cup, because even without them, you could say the same. Thanks, Ray.



ORN embrace the future on THE PATH OF TOTALITY, their tenth full-length studio allbum and second for Roadrunner Records.

Infusing dubstep anarchy into their signature sound, the legendary quartet stand on the cusp of a musical revolution for both hard rock and electronica. KORN are no strangers to revolution or innovation though. In fact, they've been purveyors of heavy music's progression since forming in Bakersfield, CA in 1993 and becoming one of the most influential entities that the genre has ever seen.

Their legendary self-titled debut took the world by storm with its schizophrenic metallic catharsis. No one had ever played heavy music with such personal lyrics and funked-out grooves. Immediately, they earned a place in the hearts of fans across the globe. However, their third offering, 1998's Follow the Leader, bridged the gap between hip hop and heavy metal seamlessly. It also solidified them as inspirational innovators.

Numerous acts "followed the leader," and heavy metal underwent a renaissance in the early 2000's with KORN at the forefront. Slipknot, Staind, Disturbed and countless others nodded to the group as an inspiration. In addition, they've garnered two Grammy Awards-one for Best Short Form Video for "Freak on a Leash" from Follow the Leader and one for Best Metal Performance for "Here to Stay" from 2002's Untouchables-and sold 35 million albums worldwide.

However, they're ushering in a new horizon for heavy music with THE PATH OF TOTALITY. Collaborating with dubstep heavyweights Skrillex, Excision, Downlink, Noisia, Feed Me, 12th Planet and Flinch, KORN have constructed a hypnotic hybrid of dubstep and metal. Bouncing from polyrhythmic guitar pummeling into drastic electro drops, the music is dark, dangerous and definitive KORN.

"It's future metal," declares vocalist Jonathan Davis. "We're mixing metal and electro music, and you're not supposed to do that. Since day one, KORN has always been all about going against the grain,

experimenting, and trying to take music different places."

Guitarist James "Munky" Shaffer affirms, "You need to be pushed out of your comfort zone to take chances. We were able to do that by collaborating with all of these brilliant writers and challenging ourselves. We're still pushing ourselves to grow."

In 2009, Davis began to envision the place where KORN would venture next. A lifelong electronic music fan and DJ, he'd cruise Beatport and fervently download the latest tracks from various underground dubstep artists

Last year, his obsession intensified. Speaking to his band mates, the aforementioned Shaffer [Guitar], Reggie "Fieldy" Arvizu [Bass], and Ray Luzier [Drums], the four agreed to tread new ground and incorporate dubstep into a couple of tracks. Davis called longtime KORN fan and rising electronic music star Skrillex to join the band at his studio for collaboration.

After merely three hours, "Get Up!" was born. A staggering deluge of wobbling synths, bludgeoning riffs, and propulsive hooks, the song instantly became a 21st century arena-ready anthem in the vein of "Blind." KORN released "Get Up!" in April 2011 and it rapidly caught fire online. After the song's impromptu debut with Skrillex at Coachella, it went on to sell over 200,000 digital downloads.

"You can't help but get excited when you hear that song," smiles Fieldy. "That's how

we knew we were on to something."

There was no question. KORN knew they needed to do an entire album following this muse. The band would record with dubstep DJs back in Davis's home studio in Bakersfield during inspired sessions. Vocals were actually tracked in the singer's home theater or in closets and hotels everywhere from Korea to Japan. The record came together at light speed. Before they knew it, the eleven songs comprising THE PATH OF TOTALITY were complete.

"It was a very different recording process," Fieldy adds. "In fact, it was the most easy and organized album that we've ever done. We got a bunch of different flavors from the DJs. Instead of picking up a guitar or bass and jamming out, we'd get inspired by these weird sounds and work around them. It's a new approach to an old formula."

Lyrically, Davis also broke ground. Known for his heart-wrenching introspective verbal exorcism, the singer turned to both the world around him and inside his own head for inspiration. "I came at the lyrics from a different direction," he goes on. "I wasn't writing about me on this record. I was writing about things I've witnessed and things I'm into. I'm looking at what goes on in my mind."

The album's second official single, "Narcissistic Cannibal" featuring Skrillex and Kill the Noise, is the perfect example. Davis delivers a haunting and theatrical refrain over synth swells as a glitch hop death march commences. Everything blossoms



into one of the catchiest hooks of the band's career. "The key changes make it so unpredictable," Shaffer exclaims. "It's not how we would traditionally write, but it's still extremely heavy. That song is a good representation of this record as a whole."

Davis reveals, "It's about me watching people who are so narcissistic destroy themselves. They basically eat themselves alive because of their narcissism. That's the gist of the story."

He tells another poignant and powerful story on "Bleeding Out." After an elegantly evil piano intro, the song traverses a warped soundscape from producer Feed Me. The singer engages a philosophical discussion over more eerie seven-string alchemy from Shaffer.

Then there's "Chaos Lives in Everything," another salvo featuring Skrillex. The tune boasts a hushed bridge with Davis at a near whisper before a dubstep metal freakout that'll ignite mosh pits everywhere. "It gets sadistic and my inner demons are speaking here. A lot of people get in a fight just to watch their significant other in pain. Then they fuck and makeup," Davis laughs. "Chaos does live in everything. Anything can be chaotic."

KORN harness that chaos better than ever before during the album's finale, "Way Too Far" featuring 12th Planet. "Way Too Far" spirals from a grinding visceral crunch into ethereal production that blasts off into space in one final sonic haze.

"It's the one song that's about me," Davis reveals. "Sometimes, I just take things way too far. The little death metal growl is like the voice in my head. If it's a small drama,

I'll get upset and do things that make it worse. I think a lot of people relate to that."

Takin on a project of this magnitude that encompasses two genres is a monumental moment for the band. That's why the title proves so apropos. Davis actually asked Shaffer to come up with ideas for an album name. While on a flight to Asia, the guitarist watched a documentary about solar eclipses, and he came upon the phrase THE PATH OF TOTALITY. As soon as the plane landed, he shared it with Davis.

"I anted to come up with a name that felt otherworldly," Shaffer explains. "A shadow is cast on the earth when a solar eclipse occurs. The moon has to be perfectly aligned with the sun to create this flawless shadow that completely covers the sun from the earth. Similarly, all of the producers and writers had to come together at the perfect time to cast these songs onto tape."

Davis ontinues, "Everything simply fit with this record, and we were able to achieve our goal. It's a rebirth.

Ultiately, KORN's rebirth starts at THE PATH OF TOTALITY. "I want people to experience something sonically that they never have when they listen to this record," Shaffer states.

Davis echoes that sentiment, "I want to trail-blaze. I want to change things. I want to do things we're not supposed to do. I want to create art that's different and not conform to what's going on. We didn't make a dubstep album. We made a KORN album."





Il India is a great find for those who are looking to take an exotic trip without leaving the Pittsburgh area. The best part, other than it being way closer and easier to do than an actual trip, is that your taste buds will thank you! The food is made fresh from scratch every time it is ordered which allows for the highest quality possible and always guarantees the freshest of ingredients. The owners, Didar and his wife, have been in the business for over two decades, which allows them to have the expertise to give you the best experience possible which goes way beyond just the food. As soon as you walk in the front door you can tell you've made a good decision. The first thing that greets you at the door is the aroma of curry coupled with other recognizable spices that are known characteristics of Indian food. The other thing that greets you almost as fast as the aroma is the extremely friendly staff. They greet you with a smile and menus as soon as you walk in the door. The staff is very attentive and is always willing to help you choose from the numerous amounts of options on the menu. They are extremely knowledgeable about all of the dishes and can explain what every one of the dishes are, how they are prepared and which spices are used. At All India you can have anything prepared to your particular taste, from extremely mild to hot and spicy.

When you are seated and begin to look

around, you will quickly notice the décor is very authentic, from the music and lighting right down to the water goblet. This authenticity continues with the food that is on the menu. There are so many options on the menu that you can literally find something for anyone. They have so many different styles of dishes with a wide array of ingredients. These range from your normal options such as chicken, beef, lamb, and seafood to their more traditional Indian ingredients that are harder to find, like goat, for example. All of these meats are served in numerous amounts of dishes such as curries and tandoori sauces. All of the presentations are beautiful and

make the dishes look almost too beautiful to eat, but as soon as you do take a bite you won't be able to stop, and it'll keep you wanting more. All India is a BYOB restaurant, which is nice if you want to drink what you want rather than have to choose from sometimes limited bar options. What makes it even better is that there is no cork charge to bring your own alcohol, which is common in many BYOB places. If you bring beer, they even offer to refrigerate your extra bottles so that its stays cold and will bring new bottles back to your table when desired.

All of the food that we tasted was served with enormous portions and was amazing.









Many of the dishes are unique to the restaurant, and some of them were the chef's special recipes. The first thing that we tried was the chips and three dipping sauces. The first sauce was a mint cilantro dip and was very refreshing and flavorful. The second sauce was an onion sauce that had tomatoes and herbs in it and was extremely refreshing; it was almost like their version of a salsa, just in an Indian style. The third sauce was a tamarind sauce, which was

sweet and very intensely flavored but extremely good. Actually, this sauce would be good on anything. One of the drinks that I tried was a Mango Milkshake. It was fantastically refreshing and very tasty; it would pair well with anything on the menu.

For the first course of food we were served the All India Platter, (\$10) which was a platter of a little bit of each of the most popular appetizers in a sampler platter. It included: Chicken Tikka, Lamb Kabab, Salmon Kabab, Samosa, and Vegetable Pakaora. The Chicken Tikka was one of the most tender chicken I've ever had ever, and the seasoning was to die for. The Lamb was the most flavorful and tender meat that I've ever had; it melted in your mouth. I could eat that as an entrée all day and be completely happy. The Samosa is just curried goodness in a pocket of dough. The flavors of this were intense. It made your taste buds go all over the place, but overall it is fantastic. All this goodness, and that was just the appetizer. After this I couldn't wait for the main courses.

The four main courses we tried were all unbelievable and all very unique in their own way. Some of them are exclusive and only available at All India because they are Didar's own special original recipes. The first dish that I reached for was two things that I absolutely love that I had never seen put together before: Lobster Tandoori (\$19). The Lobster Tandoori was sweet and savory from the sauce; the two are almost made to be put together, it was phenomenal. The next thing I tried was called Chicken Sangrilla Biriyani (\$12) (which is only described as the "Chef's secret recipe)," in which he doesn't disappoint. This is pulled chicken with a fried egg on top and some sort of sauce. It was served over jasmine rice that pairs perfectly with the bold flavors in the chef's secret sauce. We also sampled Chicken Hut-K Chicken (\$10,) which was a flavorful spicy chicken that was excellent and a little on the hot side, and I enjoyed every bite. Our final entree of the evening was the Lamb Mango Curry (\$11), which was, hands down, the best curry I've ever had. The sweetness of the sauce and the combination of mangos mixed with the richness of the sauce made for the perfect pairing. The lamb was fork tender and melted in your mouth, which made it meld so well with the creamy curry tomato gravy sauce. This dish was perfect over jasmine rice.

The dessert options all sounded amazing. After considerable contemplating, I finally decided to try the Tuti Fruity Salad (\$4) and the Kheer Mango Float (\$4), both of which were extremely rich and refreshing. The Kheer Mango Float was a rice pudding done in a very unique way, which I loved, and the other was a fruit salad nicely tossed in a creamy sauce, which was absolutely refreshing and a perfect ending to a fabulous meal. We topped off our night with a cup of the Masala Chai (\$3) tea spiced with cinnamon, cloves, cardamom, milk and sugar and Madras Coffee (\$3) free brewed Indian-style coffee with sweet milk. The Chai was one of the best Chai teas I've ever had.

If you can't decide what to order from the menu one of the best options in All India is their enormous buffet. The buffet is an amazing bargain too: just \$6 for lunch and \$10 for dinner. The buffet has a good sampling of the dishes that are offered on the menu. This gives you the option of trying something new and different, and trust me, there is definitely something for everyone on this buffet. After eating at All India you will want to come back often as there is always some new dish waiting to tantalize your taste buds. Overall the food is totally amazing, flavorful and delicious. Plus, the service is great, and the owner/chef is always smiling and happy to see you. All India is very welcoming, the interior is very comfortable and inviting, the food is excellent, their portions are large and very reasonably priced. Overall All India is a new favorite of mine. If you want to try something new I highly recommend giving them a try. Hope to see you there!



Green Flash Brewing

rriving in the craft beer scene just over a decade ago in San Diego, Green Flash Brewing Company has already left a memorable mark. In 2002 two pub owners, Mike and Lisa Hinkley, decided they wanted to take their love for beer to the next level and opened Green Flash. It wasn't until their brewmaster, Chuck Silva, got there in 2005 that things really started to get interesting. Now they're creating brews that never before existed, facilitating the creation of new categories and the blurring the lines of old. They have and they're not looking back. With Chuck at the helm, Green Flash has come a long way, and the voyage just keeps getting better. The current part of this voyage is so spectacular that Green Flash has named it the Hop Odyssey, and it's lasting all year! They've made some friends along the way as well, concocting collaboration brews with Stone Brewing Company and Pizza Port (a brew pub in California) called Highway 78 Scotch Ale, and with St-Feuillien brewery in Belgium to craft their Friendship Brew, a black saison. These two collaborations just touch the surface of the distinctive style that is Green Flash. Stretching to fit their brews into readymade definitions, they've won a plethora of awards, and if history repeats itself, their future looks awfully tasty.

The Hop Odyssey is homage to the

complicated bitter climber we all know and love: hops. To complete this homage Green Flash is releasing a new hop centric every other month; thus, six new brews will be released for a limited amount of time. These six beers will be like nothing you've ever tasted before, from black to pale and floral to grapefruit, they're breaking ground. The brews are as follows, reaching back to this past February: Black IPA with Warrior, Citra and Cascade hops at 7.2% ABV and 85 IBUs; in April, the Imperial Red Rye with Columbus and Mosaic hops at 8.5% ABV and 80 IBUs; in June there's the Citra Session IPA with Citra hops and an ABV of 4.5% and 45 IBUs; in August the Symposium IPA using Simcoe, Tomahawk, Amarilla, Cascade, and Centennial hops and coming in at 7% ABV and 75 IBUs; October has the Cedar Plank Pale using Warrior, El Dorado and Cascade hops at 6.3% ABV and 45 IBUs; and finally for December and January we have the Double Columbus IPA with generous amounts of Columbus hops coming in at hefty 8.8% ABV and 98 IBUs. If you've ever had a craving to experience a wide range of hop flavors, now is the time, but take note: they're only available in draft form, so check out your local watering hole to enjoy. Luckily for us over here on the east coast, Green Flash is expanding: they're moving in to a second location in Virginia Beach. Soon we will be flooded with the delicious

libations, 100,000 barrels worth, filling all the shelves of the stores near you. Another plus of the Virginia Beach location is the closer proximity. In case you couldn't make the trek across the country, Virginia Beach is only a seven-hour drive. The new location will house a tasting room, space for private events and a vast outdoor beer garden and is expected to be open sometime in 2015.

The following is only a sampling of the abundance of brews Green Flash produces,

West Coast IPA

Bringing home the cake with 9 different awards and accolades, the West Coast IPA is not only their most popular but a defining brew for IPAs in the west coast style. A unique layering process is employed for this beer (and most of their IPAs) to garner a complex range of hop flavors. In this we have the Simcoe, Columbus and Centennial hops, three classic hops that when combined with the power of Green Flash, evokes a feeling of utter so, so smooth, the West Coast IPA draws you in with the first sip and yearning for more when that last one's gone. Standing at 7.3% ABV and 95 IBUs, drink slowly so you don't miss anything.

Barleywine Style Ale


Arriving on the scene in 2004, this barleywine is one for the ages; you'll need to buy two, one for now and one to age until you can't wait any longer. Taking tips from the old-world styles of barleywine, Green Flash slow boils for four hours to get the sugars as deep and caramelly as possible. As it ages, the aggressive hoppiness turns into a smooth and complicated brew best sipped slowly. Weighing in a hefty 10.9% ABV, it's best enjoyed to help keep warm on a cool Pittsburgh spring evening, or stash it away and let it give you a nice winter blanket when the winter comes back around.

Le Freak

Words cannot sufficiently describe this brew. Here we have the epitome of Green Flash, hoppy, Belgium, and trailblazing. What Le Freak consists of is an American Imperial IPA and a Belgium Trippel mixed together to form something spectacular. The international coupling has led to a brew unlike any other; dry-hopped and bottle-conditioned, this ale has the best of both worlds. From bitter to malty and everything in between, Le Freak should be drunk any time and at 9.2% ABV a couple of them will have you feeling le freaky.

Saison Diego

Can you guess where the name came from? Technically, a saison is a farmhouse ale, but Green Flash likes to call it their beach house ale— it's more appropriate. With Saaz hops, orange zest,





ginger and grains of paradise, this brew will be the perfect summer libation: crisp, zesty and at 5% ABV, totally ready for a summer session. Expect to see it hit shelves come summer time when you can start your summer of saison.

Just so you can mark your calendars now, get ready for what are sure to be amazing brews in the future:

Green Bullet will be released in the fall of this year, and get ready to try some New Zealand hops. Two types of hops, Green Bullet and Pacific Gem, will be the stars, working together to produce a triple IPA that's very well-rounded for a brew of such strength (10.1% ABV and over 100 IBUs!). With soft pine, citrus and notes of mango and pineapple, Green Bullet will be the perfect brew to reign in the fall while reminiscing of those summer nights.

Not even a month ago, Green Flash put their Silva Stout into some whiskey barrels, and there it will stay for 18 months. That's right, 18 months, and with that amount of time there's no doubt in my mind that come fall of 2014 a very, very delicious Green Flash brew will be on the market. It will be limited and selective, so check out their website at http://www.greenflashbrew.com/ to stay up to date about where and when you can experience the experience.



n the unassuming town of North Versailles sits a friendly little brewery that doesn't' get the recognition it deserves. Don't let the façade of the building fool you; there's more to Full Pint than their hidden location, once inside you will discover a brewery that brews world class beers. The brew master's are down to earth people, with a good sense of humor and an even better taste in beer. To prepare for this article, I spent an afternoon at the brewery surveying the facility, talking to locals and tasting the local fair. And by surveying, talking and tasting I really mean walking around talking to Sean Hallisey (brewer and part owner) while drinking beer. Even though I technically went there for work, it was a fantastic afternoon, and I already can't wait to go back.

Nestled up a hidden road in an industrial park is a prototypical hidden gem in the rough. Established only three years ago in 2010, Full Pint is still in the growing stage, but they're growing fast. Contrary to popular belief they actually don't brew out of their basement. In fact, they have a peak output of 8,000 barrels a year and distribute to Pennsylvania, Ohio and Florida. Why Florida, you ask? Well to be frank, they're just that good, and Florida was lucky enough to figure that out before all the other states between here and there. And they pay more, what's your excuse? As with any business, they're always looking for ways to grow and improve in the most uniquely fashionable way possible.

One of their main goals for the brewery in the future is to enhance the pub side of the business. What they currently have is not too shabby as is; they have the standard brew pub fair of their beers on tap. Now you might be thinking, "what's so special about that?" Well, not only do they do the standard of sixers,

growlers, cases, kegs, etc., but they have all of their beers on tap, and I'm not just saying the ones you can get in your local retailer, but special in-house only brews. So for those of you who want to try something new and interesting that you can't get anywhere else you must visit the brewery. They colloquially refer to these brews as "Nerds Reserve," and they're each crafted by a single brewer on a rotating schedule. Some of these brews include Gus, an IPA, an elderflower saison, and a weizenbock.

But wait, there's more: for your stomach-filling needs they also make pizzas to order so you can stay longer and enjoy more. Is there really a better combination? There might be, and it's happening soon. They're still ironing out the details, but expect to see some meat and cheese platters from Wild Purveyors that will have you thinking you're in the original Versailles. With an amazing relationship between Wild Purveyors and Full Pint (meat, cheese and beer) something unique will certainly come from this; meat beer? Cheese beer? These guys just may have enough cahones to pull off a prosciutto IPA...keep your fingers crossed. Adding to the authentic feel of the pub side of Full Pint is the handmade bar. The bar is a beautiful piece of work of cherry, handcrafted, and complete with malt right in the top of the bar. Jake's (another brewer/owner) father was the mastermind behind the creation; you might recognize him from the Hobnobber label.

Now what you all came here for, the liquid gold, the social lubricant, the brew. I'm only going to cover a sampling since, with over ten brews, you might get a contact inebriation just from reading about them. Strap yourself in, from the Whiskey Rebellion to Zeus, and 4-10% ABV this'll be the ride of your life.

Rye Rebellion This is the broughtest standard it all. As hourt of five posters beyond with the standard of the line of the land of the line of the l

This is the brew that started it all.

The name isn't just a name but also representative of what the fellas at Full Pint did to start it all: a few guys pooling their life savings and going all in to do what they love. This amber ale is a favorite among the locals in the pub, a smooth, satisfying beer to satiate that five o'clock thirst. 25 IBUs and 5.8% ABV.

White Lightning

One of their most popular brews and for a reason: wheat, sweet and a little spicy, this brew coats your pallet like a warm bath. No, not warm and soapy, but relaxing, calming, and the perfect thing after some physical labor. And for further enjoyment take note of the label, there's an Easter egg, an homage, if you will, to their astrological cousin. Hint: Zeus doesn't particularly enjoy this other brew... 18 IBUs and 5.5% ABV.

Chinookie

A playful brew with a playful name, loaded with Chinook hops, four times during the brewing process and then dry hopped some more. Even though there's Magnum, Warrior, and Centennial as well, Chinook is what makes this IPA so special. At 103.1 IBUs you will be happily surprised at how drinkable it is. So chin up with someone close and enjoy some 'nookie. 7.2% ABV.

A robust coffee porter brewed with Percolated Guatemalan coffee from the Commonplace Coffee Company in Squirrel Hill. I'll just let you figure out the humor in this name (check out the label). This robust porter is made with ten different types of malts that creates a pallet so complementary to the coffee that you can't help but think that it was meant to be. 52 IBUs and 5.8% ABV.

Hobnobber

A personal favorite of mine, the name, the label and of course, the flavor. In case you're like me and never heard of the word hobnob, you will surely use it now. Hobnob: v. 1. To associate with on friendly terms. 2. To drink socially. A session IPA that keeps you coming back for more, perfect for your inner hobnob. It pours a hazy golden yellow and smells like a venerable IPA, hoppy, but laid back enough to enjoy time and time again. At only 4% ABV that means only 129 Calories, so have yourself a couple and save yourself from another lap around the block. So pick up a few Hobnobbers and hobnob the night away! 50 IBUs.

Rye, rye, and some more rye is what makes this imperial rye stout so special. In honor of those brave souls who stood up to the man, Rye Rebellion is aged in rye whiskey barrels from Wiggle Whiskey in the Strip District. In case the rye flavor didn't come through enough from the aging process Full Pint used four different types of rye malt: rye, crystal rye, flaked rye and, chocolate rye. Now don't be scared, you don't have to be able to enjoy a glass of rye whiskey to handle this brew, but it does taste like rye. With a little alcohol in the nose and whole lotta rye in the mouth, Rye Rebellion is remarkably smooth for being 11% ABV. That being said, take it slow with this one; you don't want the brew you rebel on you. 55 IBUs.

Full Pint is distributed by Wilson-McGinley Co Beer Distributors in Pittsburgh so if your favorite bar doesn't have it, be sure and tell them to order it for you. You can visit the Full Pint pub -Daily Mon-Wed 5-9, Thur-Fri 5-11, Sat 12-11. Hours are subject to change if pub is empty after 9. Beer Paradise, Belgian

Where else can you experience medieval history, a place that has had a few world wars fought on their land, a country the size of Maryland but has over 100 Michelin restaurants, the best chocolate in the world and the best beer? Belgium of course! What you can't believe in your first visit to this great country is the amount restaurants, bars and breweries scattered across the country side. With every turn around the block you will find world renowned selections of a diverse selection of their beers, not to mention the restaurants.

Depending on which part of the country you go to, you will find individual styles of beer. The world famous lambic country is where you can find beer brewed like no other in the world. Breweries add yeast to ferment their beer, but in the lambic region (southwest of Brussels) the fermentation vessels are open to the outside air and magically air borne yeast lands in the vessels,

called spontaneous fermentation, cooking with. In the northwest you will find the unique sour beers. These beers are usually finished in wooden casks, this allows wild yeast to be introduced into the beer to impart the wood flavor along with the sourness, better well known examples are Rodenbach, Petrus Oud Brune and Goudenband. There are Belgian beers like "Champagne" beers (Deus and Grottenbier), that use the champagne yeast strain to give beer those tiny bubbles like the French champagne. Dubbel style beers (Maredsous 8 and Bornem), usually around 8% in alcohol, the beer recipes are from the monasteries but now made in family brewed breweries and royalities paid back to the monasteries. Wit Bier which is a style of the German Hefe-Weiss, (Wittekerke, Hoegaarden) Belgians brew this wheat beer with coriander and orange peel. Lately the Belgian breweries have been adding fruit for a refreshing flavor. My favorite



style is the Triple beers (Westmalle Triple and Gulden Draak, voted best tasting beer in the world in 1998), these beers are usually 10% on up, a strong pale ale. If you are ever interested in having a beer tour in Belgium, one of the best tours that I have been on is the "Fun & Beer Tour", in a weeks time you will visit at least 6 breweries and some of the best cooking from beer restaurants that you will ever have in Europe (www. globalbeer.com). Or email me and I can suggest a personal private tour director out of Bruge that will take you to a few amazing places. If you love beer and great food, a visit to Belgian must be on your bucket list!



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rooklyn Brewery has a cool history of how it became what it is today. Steve Hindy, who was a correspondent an avid home brewer, who had just moved back to the states and settled in Brooklyn, originally started it in 1984. Later that year with his downstairs neighbor, Tom Potter, they founded the Brooklyn Brewery. They founded the brewery in hopes of continuing the great heritage in the Brooklyn area in producing beers before prohibition and before the invasion of the American adjunct lager. The first beer they brewed was their signature Brooklyn Lager which was the only beer they produced for the first few years of production. After having success and deciding to open their own brewery, they hired renowned brew master Garrett Oliver in 1994, who then developed many of the signature beers the company is known for today. The brewery is currently undergoing a major expansion project that will increase beer production and allow for more special edition beers to be brewed. 2013 is also the 25th anniversary of the brewery, which they will be releasing a few limited edition brews to commemorate their Silver Anniversary.

The first beer to be discussed is the Brooklyn Brown Ale, which is a hybrid English ale that combines characteristics of both northern and southern style English ales to create a unique tour of the English Isle. In terms of flavor it is very unique; it isn't just your typical English Ale but leaves you definitely wanting more. It is very smooth and drinkable for a darker beer, which normally tend to be on the heavier side. The thing that makes it unique is the hoppiness that is added due to the late hopping which is their own addition to the traditionally non-hoppy brown ale.

The next beer is the East India Pale Ale. IPA's were originally brewed so a beer could survive a long boat ride. The name comes from where most of those ship voyages were heading, the East Indies. IPA's are strongly hopped with a bitter note, very refreshing on a hot day. This IPA has many spices in it,

such as lemongrass, pine and citrus. The combinations of all of these flavors create a unique IPA that is very good and allows you appreciate the beer for and all of the ingredients that are added to the beer.


Brooklyn Lager is their first original beer that the company was founded on. It is a Vienna style lager that is a very drinkable and smooth European style lager. This lager is dry hopped while cold which gives it a rich and extremely flavorful finish that makes it easy to pair with any food. It's a great summer beer that is crisp and refreshing, yet full bodied in its own way.

The Local #1 and Local #2 are very special and unique beers all the way from the ingredients used to brew them to the way they are fermented. They use fresh, many local, ingredients to add an almost local flavor for lack of a better word to the two beers. The #2 uses honey from a local farm that give it the






flavor of the area. Another local addition is the light and dark raw sugars that are used in the fermentation process to give sugars to the yeast. This is an important step that adds to the fermentation of the beer that Brooklyn Brewing uses their own unique yeast chain in. One of the most unique things about the two are the way that they are both bottle and re-fermented which is a very rare thing today. This process is very old school and has almost been extinct except for a few breweries around



Garrett Oliver - Brewmaster Brooklyn Brewery




the world that keep the tradition alive. Local #1 is a lighter ale where #2 is a little bit darker and richer, both are amazing and play off of each other allowing them to be an appropriate beer to enjoy with any meal.

Sorachi Ace is a very special beer in that Brooklyn Brewing is the only brewery to make it. What makes it unique is that sorachi ace are actually a type of hops. These hops were invented in Japan by a local brewery there in the late 1980's. The beer itself is a saison, which is an unfiltered farmhouse ale that makes it a perfect beer for the summer months. The beer originally was only released as a seasonal beer, that was part of the brewmaster's reserve series, but it was so popular they decided to make it all year long. They dry hop the beer with the unique hops that allow it to have an even stronger flavor of the unique hops that gives the beer its name.

The brewery has many other beers that are only available in the Brooklyn area and are part of the Brewmasters Reserve series that are quite good. The brewery has successfully brought back that heritage of making great beer in the Brooklyn area that was started by the immigrants throughout history. They will also continue to create new beers that play off of their great heritage and 25 years of success that has come with their dream that started with just two friends making a home brew.

hose who talk about beer identify one basic distinction between American and European brews.

Major American macrobrews like Budweiser and Coors are popular with beer fans for their drinkability; these brewers pride themselves in creating beer that has a pleasant taste but also has drinkability.

One need only remember the early-2000s marketing campaign for Miller Lite in which beer fans debate (often violently) over the beer's superior characteristic: that it tastes great or that it's less filling than other beers.

On the other hand, European beers – and European-style American craft beers – fill you up faster but provide a stronger and flavor than their
macrobrew
counterparts. This
difference between
American-style
and European-style beers can be pretty
obvious: look at a glass of Bud Light next
to a glass of Guinness; you can guess
which is more "drinkable."

Most of Pittsburgh Brewing Company's Iron City label matches the American-style, and does it well. The label's flagship beers, Iron City and IC Light, are city staples, found in bars and distributors throughout Pittsburgh and beyond. It's as Pittsburgh as


the Steelers and steep hills.

But Pittsburgh's pub-goers may have noticed more developments in the Iron City brand over the past few years – one of which being Iron City Amber, the subject of this week's feature. Released in November 2011, coinciding with the brewery's 150th anniversary, Iron City Amber adds a distinctly European flavor to the time-tested formula of Iron City beer without weakening the latter.

This amber lager, make no mistake, is still American-style. The drinkability is still there, as any fan of Iron City's beer would be right to expect. However, this particular brew has more flavor and a more robust taste than its lighter counterparts. The taste is slightly but pleasurable added bitterness than the average American macrobrew, and it has an appealing deep copper color to it.

I had the pleasure of speaking with Pittsburgh Brewing Company president and CEO Ed Lozano, who was quick to defer credit for the brew to the brewmaster, Mike Carota. Carota is, according to Lozano, one







of the finest brewmasters in the country, and his resume supports that argument: he's managed recipes and formulas for 40 years, at breweries across the country, and even has experience brewing teas, sodas, and juice. Safe to say, the man knows his brews, and the taste of Iron City Amber corroborates us.

Iron City Amber is made with higher quality ingredients than your average American lager. Starting with caramelized malted barley, the brew features a unique blend of cascade hops – a staple in American breweries - and hops from Germany and the Czech Republic. The integration of these European hops gives the beer its stronger flavor, distinguishing it from beers that use solely American hops. It's a new flavor with a familiar feel, that same old drinkability. Any fans of Iron City's product line who don't try Iron City Amber would be missing out. Iron City Amber is just one of a list of new developments that have come to the Iron City brand in recent years. IC Light Mango (and its comic-style billboards) made its appearance in Pittsburgh in 2011 as well, and has been a huge hit. The brewery is launching IC Light Berry in May as well, giving drinkers a light, fruity beer to enjoy with the warm weather. And Lozano clued me in that the Pittsburgh Brewing Company was also making preparations for two more beers that may possibly see shelves and bars this year: a seasonal pumpkin beer, tentatively to be released in the fall, and a possible pale ale or IPA.

The Iron City brand is expanding its taste frontiers, adding more and more to its repertoire. Iron City Amber is a strong representative of that strategy: taking the same drinkable American style that got Iron City into bars and hearts across Pennsylvania, and adding to it the deeper levels of flavor found in European brews, a style becoming more and more popular in the states. Iron City Amber is a crossroads between American and European styles, right here in our very own Pittsburgh.





Fuller's, Fruti and Hacker-Pschorr Brews

Fuller, Smith & Turner - a.k.a. Fuller's Beer has been brewed on Fuller's Chiswick site for over 350 years -- as far back as the era of Oliver Cromwell. From the original brewery in the gardens of Bedford House on Chiswick Mall, the business expanded and thrived until the early part of the nineteenth century. In 1829, owners Douglas and Henry Thompson and Phillip Wood welcomed a new partner, John Fuller. The partnership dissolved in 1841, leaving Fuller's son, John Bird Fuller, alone to run the large enterprise. In 1845, Fuller was joined by Henry Smith from the Romford Brewery of Ind & Smith and his brother-in-law, head brewer John Turner, thereby forming Fuller Smith & Turner, as it is still known today. Based at the historic Griffin Brewery in Chiswick, London, between the serenity of the Thames River and the hustle and bustle of the Hogarth Roundabout, Fuller's has been brewing quality beers and running excellent pubs since 1845. From its flagship London Pride to the exclusive Vintage Ale, they are crafted with pride and passion.

London Pride

London Pride, Fuller's flagship beer, was crowned the Supreme Champion at the 2000 International Beer and Cider competition. London Pride was named Champion Best Bitter at the CAMRA Great British Beer Festival in 1995, and in 1979 when it also achieved the ultimate accolade of Beer of the Year. London Pride is a smooth and astonishingly complex beer with a distinctive malty base complemented by a rich balance of well-developed hop flavors from the Target, Challenger and Northdown varieties. It is 4.7% ABV.

ESB

Fuller's is the father of the ESB style, and first introduced it as a winter brew in 1971. The potential of the beer was soon realized, and Fuller's began producing it year-round. ESB's reputation as the best British beer around can be credited to the multiple CAMRA awards (Campaign for Real Ales) and World Championships that it has won. Since it was created, many breweries have tried to imitate the Fuller's ESB, and the style has become very popular; however, the Fuller's ESB is unrivaled in flavor and balance. A robust 5.9% alcohol by volume, it is brewed from Pale Ale and Crystal malts and from Target, Challenger, Northdown and Goldings hops. Andrew Jefford, the respected U.K. drinks critic, sums up ESB's flavor this way: "An ample, grainy-nutty aroma and a broad, authoritative flavour, with lashings of dry marmalade-like bitters." 


