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Running with Conner

Six games into the 2018 season and the Steelers sit atop the AFC North for the first time, albeit with less wins than both Cincinnati and Baltimore. Percentage points ahead with two losses and that stinkin' tie, the black and gold come out of their week seven bye looking to build on their comeback win over the Bengals and set themselves up for a big second half.

Whether or not that second half will include contributions from Le'Veon Bell has yet to be seen. With each rumor of the disgruntled running back's return and subsequent no show, the team has moved further away from talking about their all-pro "teammate." But that doesn't stop fans and media from speculating.

"It's everybody else. In our locker room, we're not even worried about it. It's unfair for me to even talk about him, and he'll have to answer his questions when he wants to,"

Cameron Heyward said when asked about Bell not showing

up for week eight. "But we're not talking about it right now.

If he joins along the way, so be it. But it's not fair to everybody in this locker room, and Le'Veon himself, for us to keep
talking about it."

The running game has survived his absence, with second year tailback James Conner carrying the load. Through six games, Conner has seven touchdowns and 710 all purpose yards. Despite the numbers, Maurkice Pouncey won't go as far to say the team doesn't need Bell.

"I don't wanna say that, 'cause he's been a great player, he's done a lot of great things, but it's always the next man up, man," Pouncey said. "We always live by that code here, being a Steeler; and he's doing a great job with it. He's excelling at a high rate, and guys on the team are loving it."

It seems it's not just the guys currently on the team, but the absentee Bell supports his understudy as well.

"Anytime I do something good on the field, I always come









back to the locker room [to] a text from him saying 'good game' or 'nice move right there,'" Conner told Fox Sports.

"Me and Le'Veon are super cool. He's a great person. With him holding out, people are going to call him selfish, but that's not the case at all. It's just business, and that's my guy."

Conner is certainly on a roll after putting together back to

back 100-yard rushing games against Atlanta and Cincinnati, with a combined 314 yards from scrimmage. Overall the offense is humming, on pace to have their highest scoring season ever at 28.5 points per game and currently ranking second in passing yards per game with 329.

Will Bell be back at all the season? Nobody knows. But it may not matter. The Steelers are okay running with Conner.

Movie Reviews

NIGHTWIRE - FILM REVIEWS by FIORE

WUNDERLAND

The Battle of the Bulge was fought in Minnesota. Not in history, but for the new film WUNDERLAND, opening this week. The Wild state serves as the background for one of the Allies' most stunning defeats during WWII. And, Minnesota must be very wild for the scenery constantly shifts from heavy snow cover, to a light dusting, to no snow at all without explanation. Editor Katerina Valenti may have been handcuffed if the footage she had was indeed shot at different times. I understand the weather in Minnesota can be fickle, but the weather shifts are noticeable and detract from the narrative. To compound the problem, the boys in the SFX department use a cheesy snow effect that looks like it came from iMovie. Katerina does manage to keep the film to under ninety minutes, which is always a plus.

Written and directed by Luke Schuetzle, WUNDERLAND is a film attempting to tell the story of a major battle, by pinpointing a small band of American soldiers and their individual exploits before the commencement of the main battle. This approach is taken because Schuetzle does not have the budget of the original BATTLE OF THE BULGE, which featured Charles Bronson, Telly Savalas, Henry Fonda, Robert Shaw and Robert Ryan. He is endeavoring to pay homage to the brave soldiers of that encounter, and to make a strong statement about the power of faith. His message is sometimes fuzzy and delayed. While the film credits dub the movie WUNDERLAND, the press releases changed the name to THE BATTLE OF THE BULGE: WUNDERLAND. No reason I can see for doing this, save for clarification.

Steven Luke plays Lt. Cappa. He heads a seasoned, successful squad of men with the help of Sgt. Rock, played by Mikeal Burgin. They just returned from a grueling assignment, but when Major McCulley, played by Tom Berenger, orders them to the front to hold a weakened line filled with green recruits, they are quick to respond. What follows is a set of minor



though seemingly impossible encounters with an advancing German army, gearing for a major offensive. There are no great war confrontations. Most encounters center on Cappa and Rock singlehandedly defeating massive amounts of Germans. The Americans duck when someone opens fire. Apparently, the Germans stand straight up and look confused until they are mowed down.

Berenger adds a bit of gravitas to WUNDERLAND. He is far from THE SUBSTITUTE, where he was a fighting machine. His time on screen is basically sitting behind a desk, or as a passenger in a Jeep, spouting stereotype comments. Burgin is solid as Rock (pun intended). His is one of the few characters digestible in the smorgasbord. Luke is miscast. He never is convincing as the danger charging lieutenant. He looks like he would be more comfortable shopping on Rodeo Drive. It's a bit obvious the two central characters are patterned after Rick Jason and Vic Morrow from TV's COMBAT series. Rick Jason played Lt. Hanley. He was a suave, but dangerous army man. WUNDERLAND tries to mold Luke in the same fashion, but it's just not kosher. Burgin is a watered down version of Morrow's Sgt. Saunders.

Peter Wigland is cinematographer. His shots are uneven as scenes shift color temperatures indiscriminately.

Where WUNDERLAND does succeed is in showing how little, almost personal skirmishes become an integral part of the

war. While this band of soldiers knows it's no match for the advancing German army, it is determined to delay their approach, allowing the Allies to regroup and retreat. There are over ten minutes of graphics, after the end credits, honoring the twenty men who earned the Medal of Honor during the final conflict. There is also a scene at the very end that, while it reinforces the concept of faith, really makes no sense.

SPOILER ALERT: All through the film, Lt. Cappa finds himself in life threatening situations. Each time he manages to survive, and quickly grasps the crucifix he wears around his neck. At the film's end, he is standing in front of a German firing squad. The film fades to black, and the end credits roll. The concluding scene has Lt. Cappa rising from a snow dune. It's like the Chewbacca Defense – it makes no sense.

The script contains almost every cliché from every war movie ever written. The cheesy dialogue, combined with the average acting and technical aspects, hurt WUNDERLAND as a worthy war epic.

VENOM

I had a smile on my face the entire time I watched VENOM. If you go to the movies for escapism and entertainment of a high quality, this movie is your cup of tea. Everything in this film works. The characters, the action, the story and the SFX. All are exceptional.

For the uninitiated, Venom is a Marvel Comics villain. He is nasty; but the comic fans love him so much, he's transformed into an anti-hero. This is similar to the roles some wrestlers play on SMACKDOWN.

Tom Hardy is Eddie Brock/Venom and is a true standout. He portrays the newspaper nerd gaining the powers of Venom, and the moral struggle it causes with aplomb. Riz Ahmed portrays a Elon Musk caricature, and given recent news headlines, he is spot on.

The real stars of VENOM are the SFX guys. They are in top form. The SFX are spectacular. Look especially for the climactic battle between Venom and Riot, and for Venom's



confrontation with the swat team.

See this film in the theaters. Pay no attention to the barrage of articles in the trades panning this film. They are the product of a Disney smear campaign. The Spider-Man Universe is still owned by Sony, and Disney is very angry about that. Most of the articles panning VENOM, are propagated by the Disney PR machine.

VENOM is worth repeated viewings and would make a fine addition to your home video collection. It wins the FIST OF FIORE AWARD for 2018, exemplifying excellence in film entertainment. This is why we go to the movies.

JOHNNY ENGLISH STRIKES AGAIN

I recommend this film highly. The reason is simple; there are so few comedies nowadays that can stand the test of time. Many are centered on political or cultural events that have no bearing several years down the road. Others rely on bathroom humor, which fades after the first viewing. JOHNNY ENGLISH STRIKES AGAIN is excellent for an evening of laughs. This is good old fashioned comedy. It will be as funny ten years hence, as it is now.

Most of the comedy relies on star Rowan Atkinson. He is someone who can create ripples of laughter with a mere look. He is in top form here. Supporting cast includes Olga Kurylenko, Ben Miller and Emma Thompson.

English is retired from MI7 and teaching in a country prep school. Someone hacks the MI7 data base, exposing all its agents. Then, the hacker targets all the computerized services in England. To find the culprit and stop him, the



spy organization must go off the grid. Enter English, who retired before the digital age. The general theme of the new digital age vs. the old fashioned methods runs throughout, without being so pompous as to declare a winner. The villain is reminiscent of Elliott Carver in TOMORROW NEVER DIES. There is a nod to Peter Sellers in THE PINK PANTHER STRIKES AGAIN, as the movies not only share a similar title, but a similar ending.

Two scenes had me rolling in the aisle: one with virtual reality; the other with the little green energy pill. The cinematography on the VR scene is particularly good, thanks to Florian Hoffmeister.

This movie is delightfully funny. It is an old-fashioned style comedy; the kind that endures. The finale is a bit weaker than the previous two films in the series, but overall this is a decidedly fine comedy. Be sure to add this to your must see list.

HALLOWEEN

The concept of throwing out all the sequels to the original, and continuing the story with this one is good. Most horror franchises die slowly after the first. The sequels to John Carpenter's original HALLOWEEN, were lame studio rip-offs. This one is good.

Jamie Lee Curtis is best known for her role as Laurie Strode. She plays it in a manic sense, much like Linda Hamilton played Sarah Connor in TERMINATOR 2.

This script is smart, sticking to the original concept and characters, and tossing in a bit of humor as well. The only flaw is



the transformation of the doctor. It really makes no sense, and simply plays a small, but unnecessary homage to one of the now moot sequels.

The sequencing and cinematography in HALLOWEEN are spectacular. It makes this movie a must see on the big screen. Watch for a segment involving "flashlight" photography, where the viewers have the point of view of the flashlight. It makes a standard chase scene quite notable.

Of course, the music is John Carpenter's original theme, with multiple variations. The soundtrack is a keeper.

The movie captures all the elements that made the original a classic. It's more intense, than horror related. The addition of a few humorous anecdotes are well placed. Many scenes pay homage to the first, and that keeps the movie grounded. Don't miss this one.

BAD TIMES AT THE EL ROYALE

This is a thriller that has everything going for it; a solid story, great acting, fine cinematography and a most excellent soundtrack. The acting is first rate. It's tough to beat Jeff Bridges as he is clearly one of Hollywood's best; and Chris Hemsworth is really stretching out of his Thor pattern. He has a dance sequence sure to please the ladies.

The script by Drew Goddard is solid. It begins with a vignette from a decade ago, and then shifts to a fateful night where seven strangers, each with a hidden purpose, meet, through circumstance, at a closing hotel. It is cleverly written with a spicing of humorous one-liners.

It is apparent Goddard fashioned this movie in the style of



Quentin Tarantino, complete with grindhouse graphics opening each scene, and sequences designed to reveal the plot, but not necessarily in chronological order.

The cinematography is great. Sheamus McGarvey is one of the finest in Tinseltown. The soundtrack, with the exception of Deep Purple's HUSH, HUSH, is comprised of classic Motown hits.

Where it fails is in the editing. It's too long. Easily 30 minutes could be trimmed, making a most noble film. The problem is with Editor Lisa Lassik. She's made the film too long, clocking in at 2 hours and 15 minutes. Easily 30 minutes could be edited, making the film tighter and more intense.

Brace yourself for a long movie. Once you have, you'll enjoy this film noir 'who done it' immensely. Most of the unnecessary footage occurs in the opening reels, but the rest of the trip is worthwhile. You'll want to see this on the big screen. It adds an engaging aura TV won't provide.

as Detective Zimmer. Veterans Ed Harris and Amy Madigan also make cameo appearances.

Despite coming from a family of pastors, Michael opts to enter the world of physic entertainers. His dream is to be a bigger TV psychic than John Edwards. Together with Chelsea, who serves as his agent and audience foil, they book a series of smaller venues, performing a scam and promoting Vaughn's treatise on communicating with the dead. Sadly, through the deception, Michael feels he is doing good by bringing closure to those suffering from lost ones.

Enter Nathan. After attending one of Michael's psychic readings, he is convinced Michael can bring him forgiveness for a crime he committed nearly two decades ago. He kidnaps Michael to force his services under the fear of death. Rather than fear, Michael sees an opportunity to springboard into the limelight as a TV psychic, by playing off Nathan's guilt.

A CROOKED SOMEBODY is smartly written by Andrew Zilch. His story is fast-paced. The tempo is augmented by Editor Craig Dewey, who keeps the film at break neck speed. Robert Lam utilizes smart camera angles, much in the style of Golden Era film noir.

I liked the ride A CROOKED SOMEBODY provided. The movie kept my interest and was enjoyable. It's a fine addition to the thriller genre. Experienced thriller viewers may be able to discern the conclusion, but most will make it to the final reel still guessing; and isn't that the mark of a good thriller?

There aren't many people that say winter is their favorite season. Fall and Spring tend to take the cake when it comes to the general consensus, but that doesn't mean there aren't some die-hard winter fans that get extra excited when the first snowflakes fall.

A great way to not only survive winter, but learn to love it is to check out all the seasonal offerings from your favorite breweries. From stouts to hoppy IPAs, to the titular winter warmers...there's a lot to love in the world of craft beer when the temperature drops.

You may not have made a Christmas list since you were young, but this list might make you start back up again, no Hills catalog required.

Bell's Brewery is no stranger to seasonal beers, and their ever-popular Winter White Ale is making a comeback once again this year. An odd entry into our list, this beer is a wheat ale fermented with Belgian yeast to give it subtle banana and clove flavors with absolutely no spices added, and at 5% ABV it's very easy to drink and very refreshing.

When it comes to fall beers it's hard to find one that's more universally loved that Bell's Brewery Best Brown Ale.

With hints of caramel and cocoa, this well-balanced 5.8%

ABV beer has a deep malt body that's balanced out nicely by the generous helping of American hops.

Founded in 1987, Anderson Valley has grown into a varied



and respected brewery that produces everything from the tried and true styles to the wild and interesting Highway 128 series. As with every winter season AVBC is once again releasing their Winter Solstice, their take on the classic winter warmer style. At 6.9% ABV, this beer pours a translucent copper with a thick and creamy head. Expect to taste sweet malt and caramel as well as some nutty tastes in the background.

Hailing from Milton, Delaware is none other than Dogfish
Head Craft Brewery. Known for their weird and wild beers
that always seem to work surprisingly well, their love of



collaboration could be argued as second to none, too.

A great example of this love of collaboration paired with a penchant for experimentation is their Pennsylvania Tuxedo. This 8.5% ABV beer is a pale ale that's brewed with Pennsylvania spruce tips and is a homage to the flannel-suited hunters that fill the woods of north-central Pennsylvania. Brewed in partnership with Woolrich clothing company, the beer features a grassy citrus kick with undertones of spruce, the source of which were hand-picked by Dogfish Head themselves.

If you look halfway between 60 Minute and 90 Minute you can find a very unique beer in the form of 75 Minute IPA. This 7.5% ABV beer blends two of the most popular beers from Dogfish Head and adds in some maple syrup to naturally carbonate it. Dry-hopped with whole-leaf Cascade hops, 75 Minute is crisp and bitter while hanging on to a soft and velvety mouthfeel. Best of all, this beer is now available in 12-oz bottles this year, making it much

SNOW MELL Winfer Ale more easy to enjoy.

It wouldn't be a holiday season without the wild and wonderful Mad Elf from Troegs. Coming in at a surprising 11% ABV, Mad Elf uses pilsner, Munich, and chocolate malts paired with spicy Belgian yeast and cherries to make a rich and flavorful beer that might possibly drive you mad, too. Mad Elf is possibly the perfect beer for the holidays.

Returning this season is Troegs' Blizzard of Hops winter IPA. This 6.4% ABV beer has notes of pine and citrus in it as well as a solid malt backbone. If you're tired of spiced and flavored beers this holiday season, Blizzard of Hops is one beer you can't miss.



finishes smooth and easy to drink.

Brewing Company loves the winter season as much as

might be possible, and they showcase that love with their



Winter Warmer Ale. This 8.9% ABV beer skips the spices found in most winter beers to give you a full-bodied beer that features a monster of a malt bill along with British and American hops to give this beer a balance that's not often found in a winter ale. Classified as an Old Ale, Winter Warmer will do as its name implies, and it'll do it with style.

Originally brewed in 2005, Jack Frost Winter Warmer Ale from North Country Brewing is a great example of what a winter warmer should be. Coming in at 7.7% ABV, this malty beer focuses on the malt body, allowing only enough spice into the beer to hint at their presence.



and Winter are perfect for big, dark beers. The



Shhh! Don't tell anyone, but the best-kept secret on the pristine Gulf Coast could arguably be Navarre Beach!

As you approach the 'Welcome to Navarre Beach' sign right before you cross the Navarre Beach Causeway over the Santa Rosa Sound, you'll read the words: "Florida's Most Relaxing Place". You might brush off its claim and say to yourself, "Of course it is; it's on the hypnotic Gulf Coast", but don't dismiss it too quickly, as there is plenty of evidence to back it up.

The very moment you drive past the sign to reach the barrier island on which Navarre Beach sits, you'll know, without a doubt, that the claim of being 'Florida's Most Relaxing Place' isn't a mere claim at all; it is reality. As you approach this stunning beach, all of your cares of the day will instantly melt away, and a calming factor--a mixture of contentment and a sense of community--will hit your soul. (Tip: The causeway bridge, which connects Navarre to Navarre Beach, is only about one-mile long, and makes it extremely easy to reach additional restaurants and activities across the sound, if you can manage to tear yourself away from this unforgettable beach community). Initially, you may notice that the people who live and work in this 'bedroom community' are truly patient and kind; they experience life to the fullest, but it's not a fast-paced lifestyle,

Depending on where you stay, all of the sites (and sights) are literally walking distance from each other. To begin with, you have entered the home of the longest fishing pier in all of Florida! A visit to the Navarre Beach Pier is a must; it only costs \$1 on weekdays, and is free on many weekends. This is the perfect place to watch dolphins or cownose rays swim by and pelicans fly ahead. The Pier is also the home of dozens upon dozens of anglers catching fish from the pier. Even if you are not a fisherman, be sure to walk all the way to the end to see them in action or just to watch the dolphins.

Want to see sea turtles? One of the best places to spot them is on the sand amid the grass at the foot of the pier. Be sure to visit the Navarre Beach Sea Turtle Conservation Center; it's here you can see Sweet Pea, the resident rescued sea turtle, and learn all about how she was rescued after being wrapped in fishing line (Sweet Pea survived the necessary amputation of her left front flipper). You will definitely leave here with a better understanding of the importance of sea turtle—and marine life-- conservation.

Speaking of sea life.....One of the best experiences to be had is by hopping aboard Lucky Chucky Charters. Captain Chuck has been fishing the inshore and offshore waters in and around Navarre since he could walk. In addition to his great knowledge of those waters, he knows where 'the honey holes' are located, and practically guarantees that you will hook several fish with him. Captain Chuck could be the nicest human being out on the water, and he's patient with first-timers of all ages (plus he will clean and bag the fish for you).

Captain Chuck is also a big fan of catch-and-release (so that younger generations can enjoy the bounty of fish and learn about conservation), plus his personal history and knowledge is fascinating. He can take you in the Santa Rosa Sound or anywhere around these parts for any time frame you heart desires. Once you board his boat you will want to return trip after trip because it will be an unforgettable experience.

Want to bike, kayak, paddle board, surf or hop on a motor scooter? Then head straight to Sage Paddle Company, a family-owned business. Sage began her business in Navarre at the tender age of eleven when she saw the need and began a grass roots effort going door-to-door to hand out her business cards. Her dad loaned her \$5,000 to get started, and this thriving business has paid her investment back ten-fold and in more ways than one. Sage, along with her mother, father and an endless



list of volunteers, make this business what it is today. There are no words that could justifiably describe the sense of family and the community support that emerges from Sage Paddle Company. You'll be missing out if you don't use their rentals to connect with stunning Navarre and its natural resources.

Want to try your hand at surfing? The surf in this breathtaking area allows for perfect wave action for surfers! Yes, surfers! This immediate area is a hot spot for both those trying their hand at surfing for the first time and those who are already well-versed in the water sport. The sand shelf beneath the surface along with the massive Navarre Beach Pier creates the unique wave action for surfing Navarre style, and of course, the view of the coastline and the sugar-white sand and hypnotic waves cannot be beat.

Want to see more wildlife up-close? Head to the Panhandle Butterfly House in Navarre where you will have the opportunity to witness native Florida butterflies fluttering about as they feed on local plants amid a colorful scene of flowers. You will also see hungry caterpillars munching away, and you can watch a butterfly emerge from its chrysalis and learn how to create your own butterfly garden. Depending on environmental conditions, the Butterfly House is open seasonally from May through August. (Big Tip: If you are visiting during the month of





Here you can dine on the side patio or in front of the Beachhouse where the beachfront fire pits are lit at sunset and continue through the night. The fire pits are surrounded by comfy chairs where you can sit and enjoy a hand-crafted cocktail or cold brew overlooking the beach. (Tip: The fresh Blackberry Margarita is delicious!). Navarre Beachhouse Bar and Grille specializes in Gulf-to-table seafood and succulent steaks cooked-toperfection, and there is an array of other great menu choices; they also serve breakfast and lunch on the patio and indoors. (Tip: Must tries: The West Indies Ellinor (marinated lump crab), Sunset Berry Salad, Filet Mignon or Ribeye, and their Gulf to Table Fish). Be sure to finish it all off with the Salted Caramel Cheese Cake.

Want a great Navarre hot-spot for a delicious breakfast or lunch? Head to Alphy's Catfish House on Highway 87. While their Southern-style Fried Catfish reigns here, so does its mouthwatering breakfast! Their breakfast menu is extensive, and while everything is delicious-- including their array of Three Egg Omelets and their Country Fried Steak-- a 'must try'





is their homemade Cinnamon Roll Pancakes or Cinnamon Roll Waffles. Also, you will never have to ask the waiter or waitress for more coffee because they are constantly filling your cup with their hot delicious brew. (Fun Fact: Alphy's is a dream come true for Al, his wife Phyllis and their kids who are all work at this local establishment). Be sure to meet Al and his wife when you visit; you will absolutely fall in love with them!




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Phipps Conservatory Marks Completion of Palm Court Restoration Commemorating 125 Years







Guests can experience Phipps largest glasshouse room newly renovated with over 5,000 panes of glass, crowning ogee, fleur-de-lis cresting and ornate finials.

Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Gardens' Palm Court renovation reached its final, historic milestone today with the installation of the final pane of glass, completing this major restoration. Guests can see this transformation firsthand upon entering Phipps, experiencing history in the making. Pittsburgh Mayor William Peduto joined Phipps President and CEO Richard Piacentini to announce the completion of the Palm Court renovation, commemorating 125 years. Mayor Peduto declared the month of October 2018 "Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Gardens 125th Anniversary Celebration Month" in a city proclamation, and construction crew members placed the final pane of glass on Palm Court during the dedication ceremony and unveiling.

The Palm Court restoration is part of Phipps' 125th anniversary commemoration, protecting and sustaining its treasured beauty for generations to come. Palm Court is part of the original nine-room glasshouse established in 1893 and is located at the heart of the conservatory. This architectural gem is the first room that guests experience at Phipps, inspiring them with breathtaking plants, floral displays, special exhibits and renowned collections.

Dedicated architectural and construction teams replaced Palm Court's wooden ribs with aluminum ribs, meticulously extruded to match the original profile from 1893. They also replaced over 5,000 panes of glass using advanced state-of-the-art glass technology.

Additionally, after over 80 years, Phipps returned the historic ogee crest to the exterior of Palm Court, restoring this crowning architectural feature to the Pittsburgh glasshouse for the first time since 1937. The term "ogee" describes the distinctive architectural molding and arch curve formation that tops the glasshouse, returning its stunning skyline profile to its original design. Seven aluminum trusses form the ogee, filled in with aluminum ribbing and over 700 panes of glass.

Stunning architectural features also include decorative new fleur-de-lis cresting and towering 8-foot tall finials. The ridge fleur-de-lis cresting is a classic, striking element found in Victorian glasshouse architecture, with each distinct shape standing between 2 and 5 feet tall, totaling 90 feet in length atop the ogee. The renovation process included the addition of new color-changing LED lights which illuminate Palm Court, making Phipps' upcoming Winter Flower Show and Light Garden the biggest, brightest yet.

Guests can join in the 125th commemoration by sponsoring a

pane of glass in Palm Court, including those located in the iconic ogee. Panes of glass can be purchased on Phipps' interactive website — phipps.conservatory.org/restore by phone at 412/622-6915, ext. 6054, or in person at the conservatory, with glass panes beginning at a gift of \$100. Supporters will receive a frameable printed certificate with pane coordinates for their selected section, making this a memorable gift or tribute. Donors will be acknowledged through a special recognition display in Palm Court. Fall Flower Show: 125 Years of Wonder takes guests on a spectacular journey to experience some of the most magical, whimsical and beloved moments from Phipps' history. Phipps' celebrated chrysanthemums will bloom by the thousands to colorfully accentuate nostalgic displays inspired by different periods of Phipps history, from the 1890s to the 1960s and beyond in this memorable new show opening Sat., Oct. 13 on display for just three weeks! Garden Railroad: Memories in Motion travels along the tracks of time, showing the dramatic transformation of

the Conservatory from its very beginnings to modernday standing as a global leader in horticultural display and sustainability — all through the magic of interactive, meticulously detailed garden-scale models - opening Sat., Oct. 13.

Pittsburgh Public Theater Presents Sweat

Set in Reading, PA, Lynn Nottage's play tells the story of what happens to a group of friends when their union jobs are in jeopardy.

Told with powerful realism and sharp humor, Pittsburgh Public Theater presents the Pittsburgh premiere of Sweat, by Lynn Nottage, winner of the 2017 Pulitzer Prize for Drama. Directed by Justin Emeka, Sweat runs November 8 – December 9, 2018 at the O'Reilly Theater, Pittsburgh Public Theater's home in the heart of Downtown's Cultural District.

Sweat begins with a quick scene in 2008 where two young men, Chris (Ananias J. Dixon) and Jason (Patrick Cannon), meet their parole officer (Monteze Freeland). The play then jumps to 2000 in a bar where Stan (Tony Bingham) is pouring drinks for his regulars: Cynthia (Tracey Conyer Lee), Jessie (Michelle Duffy), and Tracey (Amy Landis). For years these best friends have spent their days together on the factory floor at Olstead's Steel Tubing, and many nights partying at this after work hangout. Also around the bar are Cynthia's estranged husband, Brucie (Kevin Mambo) and the busboy, Oscar (Jerreme Rodriguez). But soon the status quo at Olstead's begins to erode and changes at the plant cause a rift among the longtime friends. It's also time to renegotiate the union contracts and the company is pushing for deep concessions. As the play speeds forward, Nottage ratchets up the tension and by the end she pulls all the story's threads together in an electrifying conclusion.

Nottage researched Sweat through extensive interviews with manufacturing employees in Reading, PA. As she gathered their very human stories, she also noted the shift from industrial to service economy in the United States. When the Pulitzer Committee awarded their 2017 prize to Sweat, they described the play as, "A nuanced yet powerful drama that reminds audiences of the stacked deck still facing workers searching for the American Dream." Other plays by Nottage include Mlima's Tale; By the Way, Meet Vera Stark; Ruined (Pulitzer Prize); Intimate Apparel; Fabulation, or the Re-education of Undine; Crumbs from the Table of Joy; Las Meninas; Mud, River, Stone; Por'knockers; POOF!







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Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is one of those holidays that tend to revolve around family and food. While those are definitely two important components, the important (and fascinating!) facts are often overlooked. Whether you're looking for a good conversation starter or just really want to know more about Thanksgiving, these interesting facts will make you seem like the smartest person at the dinner table.

- The first Thanksgiving was actually a three-day celebration.
 Today, Thanksgiving is one day maybe two if you count Black Friday. But apparently the Pilgrims wanted to party even harder.
 Governor William Bradford organized the feast, inviting the Plymouth colonists' Native American allies. But it was only until the Wampanoag Indian guests came and joined the Pilgrims that they decided to extend the affair.
- It's unclear if colonists and Native Americans ate turkey at their feast. There is truly no definitive proof that the bird we wait all year to eat was even offered to guests back in 1621. However, they did indulge in other interesting foods like lobster, seal, and swan.
- 3. Today, a special part of Plymouth, Massachusetts, looks just as it did in the 17th century. Modeled after an English village and a Wampanoag home site, the historic attraction Plimoth Plantation stays true to its roots. You can order tickets as early as June to attend a Thanksgiving dinner complete with numerous authentic courses, tales of colonial life, and centuries-old songs.
- 4. While president, Thomas Jefferson refused to declare Thanksgiving as a holiday. Presidents originally had to declare it a holiday every year. History says Jefferson refused because he strongly believed in the separation of church and state. Since Thanksgiving involved prayer, he thought making it a holiday would violate the First Amendment.
- 5. The woman behind "Mary Had a Little Lamb" is also responsible for Thanksgiving's recognition as a national holiday. In 1863, writer and editor Sarah Josepha Hale convinced President Abraham Lincoln to officially declare Thanksgiving a national holiday that reoccurred every year. She wrote countless articles and letters to persuade the president and the rest is history!
- 6. The first Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade didn't feature any balloons. But when the parade made its big debut in 1924, it did have something that might be even cooler than balloons: animals from the Central Park Zoo.
- But we have a Good Housekeeping illustrator to thank for the parade's first balloons.German American illustrator Tony Starg, who completed illustrations for Good Housekeeping, also had

- a passion for puppetry, which he used make the amazing floats come to life in 1927.
- 8. In 1939, Thanksgiving was celebrated on the third Thursday in November not the fourth. You might think President Roosevelt could predict the future, as he channeled a "Black Friday" mindset in making this decision. Even though the holiday had been celebrated on the fourth Thursday since its official recognition decades before, Roosevelt bumped it up a week offering seven more shopping days to the holiday season. Americans, to say the least, didn't love the change, so it was officially (and legally) switched back in 1942.
- 9. A Thanksgiving mix-up inspired the first TV dinners. In 1953, a Swanson employee accidentally ordered a colossal shipment of Thanksgiving turkeys (260 tons, to be exact). To get rid of them all, salesman Gerry Thomas came up with the idea of filling 5,000 aluminum trays with the turkey along with cornbread dressing, gravy, peas and sweet potatoes. They were sold for 98 cents, and were a hit. Within one year, over 10 million were sold.
- 10. About 46 million turkeys are cooked for Thanksgiving each year. It's tradition, after all! And on Christmas, 22 million families host an encore with another turkey.
- 11. But not everyone eats turkey on Thanksgiving. According to the National Turkey Federation, only 88% of Americans chow down on turkey. Which begs the question, what interesting dishes are the other 12% cooking up?
- 12. You might consume up to 229 grams fat during the big meal. We hate to break it to you, but that's about three to four times the amount of fat you should eat in a day. You're probably also wondering how many calories you might eat your entire Thanksgiving meal could total over 3,000 calories.
- 13. The turkeys pardoned by the President go on to do some pretty cool things. President George H.W. Bush pardoned the first turkey in 1989, and it's a tradition that persists today. 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



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
