## The Perennial Playoff Pirates

The pang in your stomach. The feeling of angst. Living and dying with every single pitch. All familiar to Pirates fans, but no longer is it because the team drives you mad with constant ineptitude. No longer is it because you want to fire the manager and front office. No longer is it because you're tired of baseball being a third class sport in your proud city.

It's because there's a chance. A chance the Pirates could go deep in the postseason. A chance they could get to the World Series.

And even a chance they could – gulp – win it.

And you don't want to squander it. There's still a fear there, lurking



for some. A fear that any season now, your beloved Buccos will backslide into the depths of the division basement. Hard to blame anyone for the deeply rooted 'here we go again' residue covering the back of the mind. Two decades of futility will do that to you.

But there's good news. General Manager Neal Huntington has stayed the course in his master plan to take over the baseball world . . . to build a home grown perennial contender dotted with value based veterans, not a big money free agent heavy flash in the pan. His steadfast leadership and organizational commitment to this strategy amid a couple of late season collapse-inducing calls for change, has been rewarded with back-to-back-to-back postseason appearances. There's no flukiness to this folks.

Through 155 games, the Pirates are 95-60, sitting 3 games back of the Cardinals with the N.L. Central division lead in their sights as



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they welcome St. Louis to PNC Park for a three game series that will make or break their chances at a division title. If you're reading this, you know how that played out, but regardless of how many more games the Buccos will have won this season, the 2015 Pittsburgh Pirates will have the most wins since the 1992 team that finished with 96, and they might even have bested the 1991 squad who were two shy of the century mark. They're riding an eight road game win streak, a feat that hasn't been performed in over 75 years and for the first time in the team's storied history, they employ a pair of pitchers that have struck out two hundred or more batters in a single season. It's a darn good team.

While there is no limit to how far the Pirates can go in the playoffs, no matter how this season ends the team is built to contend for the foreseeable future.

Yearly MVP candidate, Andrew McCutchen is signed through 2018 and his outfield mates are under team control even longer. Starling Marte is inked through 2019 with two more years of club options and this is Gregory Polanco's first full season in the majors, so he won't be a free agent until 2020. At least three more years of the best outfield in baseball. Plus there are guys in the minors ready to step in when the guard changes. Top prospect Austin Meadows, for instance.

Two of the cogs in the wheel that powered the resurgence of the Pirates' relevancy are not long for the team they helped turn around, however. Pedro Alvarez has undeniable power, but is undeniably unreliable as a defender. He is a man made for hitting and with that designation, belongs in the American League. Not many hitters have the ability to change the game with one swing like El Toro – although fans wish he would strike more often with men on base – but that

hasn't been his only contribution. Alvarez was the first client of notorious big money agent Scott Boras that the Pirates drafted and signed. Infamously passing over three time all-star and gold glove catcher, Matt Wieters, for pitcher Daniel Moskos (who never started a game in the majors), in the 2007 draft because his agent was Boras, wasn't good for team image building. Drafting Alvarez was. He won't resign in Pittsburgh though so if he isn't traded in the offseason, 2016 will be his last year in black and gold.

The same can be said for hometown hero, Neil Walker. The writing is on the wall instead of on a contract extension. The fact that there





is none in place is all you need to know about the silver slugger's future with his favorite team. While watching him leave via trade or free agency will undoubtedly hurt the fandom, it's what they call business and the front office has prepared for these break ups by grooming talented replacements. Alen Hanson was moved from short stop to second base to step in when Walker departs and all-star futures game veteran Josh Bell is transitioning from outfield to first base to fill the void left by Alvarez.

The left side of the infield is in great shape, with Jung Ho Kang signed through 2018 with a team option for 2019 and Jordy Mercer also on the books through '18. Super utility man Josh Harrison just received an extension this season that keeps him a Pirate for three more years with options after that. Huntington has the players

to reload once the time comes including 2015 draftees, SS Kevin Newman and 3B Ke'Bryan Hayes.

This team is built around pitching and staff ace Gerrit Cole, another Boras client, is under control through 2019 and Francisco Liriano has two more years on his deal. Heralded prospect Tyler Glasnow will most likely be called up next year and 2010 first round pick Jameson Taillon is close to returning to action after missing two years recovering from Tommy John and then hernia surgery. Of course, there's always opportunity for pitching coach Ray Searage and his right hand man, Jim Benedict to resurrect veteran pitchers' careers to fill in the gaps.


Currently the Pirates have the best bullpen ERA (2.61) in baseball. While single season franchise leader in saves, Mark Melancon

will be a free agent in 2017 and eighth inning hurler Tony Watson the following year, if they don't resign in Pittsburgh, there will be pitchers to fall back on. For instance, flame throwing rookie, Arquimedes Caminero. You can't have a strong pitching staff without a strong catcher and Francisco Cervelli is just that. He somehow replaced the "irreplaceable" Russell Martin this year and the trade to bring him to the Pirates is a big feather in Huntington's cap. Cervelli has one more season on his current deal and if he leaves, Elias Diaz can step in and 2013 first rounder Reese McGuire is working his way through the organization.

Huntington's plan is working. All of this major league success is sustainable because it's erected on top of a sturdy foundation, laid with strong international scouting, omnipresence in Latin America through their sprawling facilities in the Dominican Republic, a focus on analytics and a draft strategy that emphasizes athleticism and character. So fear not, Pirate fans. There are plenty more years of contending baseball to come.

# At The Movies...

## BLACK MASS

The buzz in Hollywood claims Johnny Depp is already a shoe-in for a nomination for Best Actor for his performance in BLACK MASS. The trade magazines and pundits are claiming it's a done deal. Depp is always good. His, or his agent's selection of material is questionable, but his performances are always top-notch. The breakfast scene alone in BLACK MASS clearly demonstrates Depp's onscreen presence. But, really, the story here is Joel Edgerton. He is truly Oscar worthy. His performance outshines even Depp's. Unfortunately, if Depp is nominated for Best Actor, Edgerton may have to settle for Best Supporting Actor.

BLACK MASS is one of the best ensemble dramas of the year. It tells the story of famed Irish gangster James "Whitey" Bulger and his rise from small time hood to criminal kingpin. BLACK MASS deals primarily with the relationship of Bulger (Depp) and his childhood friend John Connolly (Edgerton). Raised on the streets of South Boston, Bulger and Connolly form a tight rapport that carries over into adulthood where Bulger has chosen a life of crime and Connolly is an agent for the FBI.

The cinematography by Masanobu Takayanagi is fitting for the era. He incorporates the usually troublesome New York style imagery, with its trademark grainy and gritty look. For this film, it works well. Editor David Rosenbloom made the film too long. Even though it clocks in at two hours, the latter scenes become redundant. Viewers already know Bulger is a criminal, so one or two murders, especially the sequence with the hooker, could easily have danced on the editing room floor. There is also sweeping orchestration by Junkie XL, who provides a soundtrack worthy of John Williams. This is a little out of Junkie XL's milieu. To this point, his specialty has been action films, which he scores with aplomb. This soundtrack opens a new page to his status as a Hollywood music force.

The problem with BLACK MASS is a problem often plaguing ensemble cast films; many actors give fine performances that are ignored to propel the main stars. Even stars who are reduced to extended cameos in BLACK MASS, such as Benedict Cumberbatch, Corey Stall and Kevin Bacon, offer exceptional performances. Though supporting roles, they help make BLACK MASS worthy of the price of admission.

The moral of BLACK MASS does not appear to be avoiding a life of crime. It is presented more as knowing when friendships and loyalty need to be placed on a backburner for personal good. And, of course, never mess with the Italians. Bulger's entire world collapsed after he messed with the Italians. Good lesson to learn.

### **THE TRANSPORTER: REFUELED**

Last summer, Luc Besson returned to the action sci-fi genre he mastered in the FIST OF FIORE AWARD winner, THE FIFTH ELEMENT, with LUCY, starring Scarlett Johansson. The film proved to be a critical and box office success. So this summer, Besson opted to bring back the iconic Frank Martin, ex-mercenary now quirky transporter with an odd, but strict set of rules. The Transporter, like Agent 47, is a great character and I certainly can't blame Besson for wanting to bring him back to the Silver Screen.

The Transporter was Jason Statham. It's exceptionally difficult to replace Statham. Even Sly is discovering this fact with Statham's character Christmas Jones in THE EXPENDABLES series. Statham was still building his reputation as a premiere action film star when Besson tagged him for the role. He signed a three picture deal. Unfortunately, while the first endeavor was most excellent, and a FIST OF FIORE AWARD winner, the successive films slipped considerably in quality. By the time TRANSPORTER 3 hit the screens, the series had run its course. The final movie hired one of the best fight choreographers in the game, Jeff Imada, and then had Editors Camille Delamarre and Carlo Rizzo ruin all his work by short-shirting the fight scenes with GLADIATOR style cutting.

THE TRANSPORTER was made into a TV series. Chris Vance plays Frank Martin on TV. At first, he didn't seem to fit the part and it took a while for fans of the character to warm up to him. Luckily, that happened before the end of the first season, and the show is currently in its second season. Oddly, Vance was not asked to reprise the role for the movie, though that ploy would certainly help the show. This is the same twist D.C. is doing with THE FLASH. The TV show is exceptionally popular, even more so than the show that spawned it, ARROW. Grant Gustin plays the Flash on TV, and even the fanboys seem to like him, but he was not asked to play the part for the stand alone Flash movie, nor the JUSTICE LEAGUE series.

Amid all this hoopla comes Ed Skrein as Frank Martin in THE TRANSPORTER: REFUELED. He demonstrates all the fancy car maneuvers the stunt team can muster. Martin is known for engaging unique fight scenes, such as oil slicks, buses and car repair shops, and this one does the same. It utilizes a narrow file cabinet hallway, a life preserver and steel cable purloined directly from the master, Jackie Chan.

To help introduce Skrein to audiences, Besson brings in Ray Stevenson as Frank Martin, Sr. The interplay between father and son in THE TRANSPORTER: REFUELED is akin to Sean Connery and Harrison Ford in INDIANA JONES AND THE LAST CRUSADE.

Frank Martin is a good character. Besson is one of the best action genre film writers and producers in the game. All his standard elements are present here, including impossible car stunts, amazing fight scenes, off-guard one liners, all set to a frantic pace. It is hard to get past Statham, but it was also hard to get past Connery as Bond. Once you do though, THE TRANSPORTER: REFUELED will be a lot of fun.

# Ligonier Highland Games 2015

On Saturday, September 26th, thousands joined in the fun and festivities of the 57th Annual Ligonier Highland Games at Idlewild Park in Ligonier, Pennsylvania. The 2015 Games drew 6000+ visitors from as far away as Michigan, Texas, and California, as well as many from across the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. As the sun rose up over the Laurel Highlands, the day started with the individual competitions: pipers, drummers, dancers, and the heavy athletes. From the Highland Fling, to tossing the caber, it was a flurry of traditional Celtic activities!

One of the nicest features of the Games is that they cover the expanse of beautiful Idlewild Park. When you first came into the Park, you could hear hand bell ringers, and visit the 30+ varieties of dogs at the Scottish breed dog exhibit. The thump of the dancers performing the Sword Dance was a nice counterpoint to the dulcet tones of the Celtic harp competition. A path that wound throughout the (closed) waterpark featured individual pipers being tested on Piobaireachd, hornpipes, jigs, marches, the Strathspey and reels! A highlight was a stop to experience the U.S. National Mòd, which featured competitors and participants from across the country contending for prizes and awards in several categories of singing Gaelic songs, reciting Gaelic poetry and storytelling in Gaelic.

Towards the middle of the park, there were children's games and face painting, across from a Scottish military demonstration. Forty clans were there that day, sharing the legend and lore of their individual families, representing many of the oldest families in Scotland. Three stages were busy all day with performances by Celtic Roots group MacTalla Mor, troubadour Red McWilliams,



singer/songwriter Steel Clover, the talented duo Burns and Fallon, and veteran Celtic musician DruidSong. Twice, we had the chance to experience the mesmerizing tales of the Ligonier Highland Games' seannachie, or storyteller. She was celebrating her 25th anniversary of holding court in Ligonier and announced the publication of her book!

The bleacher seating around the Main Games Field, at the far end of the park, was jam-packed for most of the day. People came early to see ancient athletic events such as the stone put (similar to the shot put – except with a stone!), the hammer throw (a steel-headed hammer is twirled above the head and thrown over the shoulder for distance), the sheaf toss (throwing





a 16- or 20-pound burlap sack with a pitch fork over a cross bar), and the iconic caber toss (throwing a tree trunk end-over-end).

At noon, everyone – two- and four-legged -- met at the Games Field for the Opening Ceremonies and Massed Bands. Thirteen pipe bands, hundreds of clan representatives, and canine clansmen from the dog exhibit marched onto the field for the official start to the day. The bands were from Pennsylvania, Ohio, Maryland and Kentucky; they perform in unison, which is an incredibly stirring sight to see and hear.

Once the ceremonial activities finished, it was time for more competition! The pipe bands, tenor drummers, and drum majors vied for medals and accolades throughout the afternoon. Those at the main field were then treated to a



demonstration of hurling, one of the oldest and fastest Celtic sports.

The moving back and forth between events meant plenty of chances to browse through the vendors, more than 20 in all, with a broad selection of items. Jewelry and kilts, crafts, clothing for both people and dogs, and music and artwork were available from a nicely-curated range of vendors. While they were all pleasantly busy, one vendor (Gaelic Imports of Ohio), had lines all day as people queued up for meat pies, sausage rolls, empire biscuits, and more Scottish delicacies. In addition, you could stop by booths of various heritage groups, including the St. Andrews Society of Pittsburgh and Bushy Run Battlefield Historical Society.

As the sun was moving closer to the horizon, the pipe bands and people gathered once again at the Main Games Field. The announcing of the winners and a final playing of Amazing Grace, and the 2015 Ligonier Highland Games came to a close.

For the Scottish, as well as for the Scottish-for-a-day, mark your calendars for September 24, 2016. Family and friends, clanspeople and athletes, will be gathering in Ligonier for the next installment of the Ligonier Highland Games. # Meet The Dead Guy at Rogue Brewing Company

Rogue Ales takes their name seriously. Their dedication to being a unique brewery and producing amazing craft beers makes their name more appropriate than most. Rogue Ales started back in 1988, when saying the term “craft beer” would get you some funny looks. There really wasn’t craft beer back then per se, but instead there were the standard macro breweries, and then there were these...well... rogues. People that wanted better beer and didn’t want to accept the current status as quo, so to speak.

Rogue listened and opened their first brewpub in October of 1988 in beautiful Ashland, Oregon. The first beers they brewed were American Amber and Oregon Golden. Over the years Rogue opened a second brewpub in Newport, Oregon as well as starting Rogue Farms where they grow many of the ingredients used in their beers. All in all, a very “Rogue” way of looking at the beer industry.

Today Rogue Ales makes a wide variety of beers from Sriracha Stout to the Voodoo Series to a variety of stouts, IPAs, and many other award winning ales and lagers. Heck, they even make spirits out of the same ingredients as their beer to make a perfect match.

Rogue Ales is all about innovation, trying something new, and giving back to their community, and while we may not see those as very rogue acts, in a world where most industries place the almighty dollar first and the self comes before the neighbor, it’s great to see some true Rogues making a statement, and some really great beer in an industry that truly supports both.

## Dead Guy Ale

Dead Guy is somewhat of a conundrum when it comes to

description. The closest beer to compare it to is a German Maibock, but that style doesn’t quite fit, mostly because a Maibock is a lager and Dead Guy is an ale.

It’s this obduracy at meeting traditional conventions that make Dead Guy a truly interesting and amazing beer. Sure, the skeleton on the label makes it a perfect fit for Halloween, and the pseudo-Maibock style makes it perfect for the fall, but thankfully Dead Guy Ale is available all year.

Only available in Pennsylvania, the Dead Guy 12-Pack features 12 Dead Guys all lined up with some new Dead Guy artwork on the box. Of course you can always get Dead Guy Ale as a six-pack, 22-ounce bottle, or on draft but why get more of a good thing, right?

## Box of Rogues

The old saying goes that variety is the spice of life, and the folks at Rogue couldn’t agree more. Because of this they decided to put together a sampler pack that’s only available in Pennsylvania. In the mixed 12-pack you get 3 each of four different Rogue beers, running the gamut in flavors.

**Hazelnut Brown Nectar** – Rogue decided to give a nutty twist to a traditional European brown ale. Hazelnut Brown Ale features a nutty hazelnut aroma that gives way to a bready, malty middle and a clean, somewhat dry finish. Expect to taste some caramel as this one warms slightly, giving it a nutty, caramel body that’s nearly like candy, just nowhere near as sweet.

Hazelnut Brown Nectar was actually inspired by homebrewer Chris Studach, a friend of Rogue’s John Maier. Originally brewed for the 1993 American Homebrewers Association convention, it lives on today with it’s nutty twist on a classic. Hazelnut Brown Nectar is 5.6% ABV with 33 IBUs.

**Shakespeare Oatmeal Stout** – Oatmeal stouts are known for being rich and creamy, and Rogue’s Shakespeare Oatmeal Stout gives these both and more in strides. Ebony in color, this beer pours with a rich creamy beige head for a presentation that’s exactly what you’d expect from a stout. You should be able to pick up on some oatmeal aroma, especially as the beer warms. Unlike other stouts, oatmeal stouts tend to lean towards the bitter side of things, and while this is true for Shakespeare, it does so in a very balanced way, with some chocolate and coffee to back things up.

Shakespeare Oatmeal Stout comes in at 5.8% ABV and a substantial 60 IBU.





**Brutal India Pale Ale** – With a name like Brutal, one might think this beer is more mission than pleasure, but one would be dead wrong. Surprisingly enough, the bitterness in this beer is far from brutal levels, and it is in fact a very well balanced IPA.

Brutal IPA features a big, citrusy hop flavor along with some pretty intense hop aroma. The mouthfeel on this IPA is in the medium range, giving it a nice overall feeling, as you can drink it without feeling like it's coating your tongue. The citrus comes from the Rogue Farms Alluvial hops, and the balance comes from a mix of standard and Rogue Farms hops, making this an all-around amazing beer, and at 6.3% ABV and 46 IBUs, it's easy to enjoy, too.

Think of it this way, the name Brutal should scare the lesser-read folks away, leaving this amazing beer for those of us in the know to enjoy. Just don't let them know, ok?

**Dead Guy Ale** – You already know about Dead Guy from above, but a beer this good is worth talking about twice. Originally brewed back in the early 1990's, Dead Guy Ale started its life as a tap sticker to celebrate the Mayan Day of

the Dead on November 1st. The design became so loved that Rogue decided it had to do something great with it, so they chose to make it the label for their Maibock ale, and changed the name to be, what else, but Dead Guy Ale.

Brewed in the style of a German Maibock lager, but with Pacman ale yeast, Dead Guy is truly a unique beer that's easy to drink and love. Dead Guy is deep honey in color with a malty, bready aroma up front with more bready taste in the middle, finishing up with a balanced mix of hop and malt.

# Fall Into Spring House Brewing

What's the first thing that comes to mind when you think of Lancaster, PA? If you're like me, the Amish, farm country, and horse and buggies are the first to pop into your head, but with the craft beer movement there's another staple of the Lancaster area that needs to join those thoughts, and that's beer.

More specifically craft beer. In the past few years craft beer in and around Lancaster, PA has boomed with more than a dozen craft breweries in the area. Take for example Spring House Brewing. Brothers Greg and Matt Keasey started Spring House in 2007 in what else, but an old barn. Surprisingly enough, there are more than eight breweries in Lancaster County, placing Spring House in very good company.

Head brewer Matt wasn't new to the beer world with Spring House, as he started off working for Appalachian Brewing in Harrisburg for two years, and was a chemist at a local laboratory. Both jobs helped to prepare him for the demanding world of brewing on his own, which if his beers have anything to say about it, he's done an outstanding job of.

So where did the name come from? While Spring House might bring up thoughts of a farm house in the spring, with fields of flowers and even some crops in the background, this isn't exactly where the name came from. Remember that barn that Matt started brewing in? Well, the house on the same property as the barn is where Matt and his family called home, and was first settled in 1794. As you may have guessed, there wasn't too much in the way of municipal water back then so in the basement of the house an actual spring was tapped, and supplied water to the house up until 1970, hence the name Spring House Brewing.



Fast forward to today and the new brewery is going strong, and Matt doesn't have to worry about people parking in his front yard to get a taste of his beers any more.

## The Beers

The story behind any brewery is great, but what really matters is the beer, right? Spring House Brewing has a solid lineup of both year-round and seasonal beers, each with their own unique taste and story behind them.

**Seven Gates Pale Ale** – The flagship beer for Spring House, Seven Gates Pale Ale is named for a story out of rural Pennsylvania. According to this legend, there was an insane asylum deep in the woods that was surrounded by, you guessed it, seven gates to keep the “guests” of the asylum safe and sound. One night the asylum caught fire, and to their peril the seven gates did their job and kept everyone in, where they haunt still today.

In honor of this not-so-urban legend, Spring House brewed a terrifyingly delicious beer that has a heavy focus on the hop profile while keeping the alcohol in check with 5.6% ABV. Expect a light toasted bread body with citrus and pine hop notes, finishing up with a healthy dose of bitterness. One taste and you'll see why this is their flagship beer.

**Big Gruesome Chocolate Peanut Butter Stout** – Scarily good, Big Gruesome is a lot friendlier once you get to know him. This creamy, malty beer uses two different types of chocolate malt with a healthy dose of cocoa nibs thrown in for good measure. Spring House could stop here and have a pretty



great chocolate stout, but instead they age it on whole vanilla beans and more raw cocoa nibs to really bring the chocolate character out.

This 7.7% ABV beer features ripe mango as well as tropical hop aroma up front followed with some amazing hop flavor and bitterness in the middle and end. Add in some alcoholic warmth and you have yourself a dangerously delicious beer that thinks it's a mango.



## Seasonal Beers

Not every beer can be around all year, and that makes them all that much more special. You need to find these seasonal beauties when you can, and enjoy them often. Each of the seasonal beers from Spring House Brewing comes in either 22oz bottles or on draft.

**Braaiins! Pumpkin Ale For Zombies** – Zombies need to enjoy a good beer from time to time, too and to suit their special needs, Spring House brewed their Braaiins! Pumpkin Ale just for them. Instead of using real brains, Matt chose to use real pumpkins and just pretend instead.

# After-Dinner Treats Little-Known Dessert Wines of the World

Considering America's infamous sweet tooth, it is surprising how many of the world's dessert wines have fallen into obscurity. Most wine-producing countries have sweet gems that remain mysterious to an entire generation of wine-lovers.

The satisfaction of relaxing after a meal with a digestif is steeped in history and tradition. Long ago, it was deemed medically necessary to have a small morsel after a big meal. In some cultures, the morsel was cheese; in others, it was something sweet, like fruit or a confection. Although science eventually disproved the theory, the tradition continued, giving families and friends extra time to enjoy each other's company and extend the pleasure of eating. Decadent dessert wines are the perfect cap to an evening's end.

Dessert wines are made in almost every wine-growing region of France. Vin doux naturel, a fortified wine, is made in the southern Rhône and Languedoc-Roussillon regions using a process called mutage, which stops fermentation with the addition of neutral grape spirits. This results in strong, rich and engaging wines replete with residual sugar. White versions are made with the Muscat grape, while Grenache is largely responsible for the red. Muscat Blanc à Petits Grains, the oldest and finest variety of Muscat, is employed in the production of the Rhône's Muscat de Beaumes de

Venise. This fragrant wine is hailed for its pale gold color and delicate yet luxurious flavors of orange and spice. The appellations of Banyuls and Maury in Roussillon use the Grenache grape to make wines of exceptional depth and flavor that age extremely well.

Rasteau makes a vin doux naturel from Grenache. Wines labeled as Rasteau Rancio have been exposed to oxygen and/or heat, creating a Madeira-like effect with flavors reminiscent of candied and dried fruit.

Italy's dessert wine traditions date to antiquity, and passito is the name given to the dried-grape wines made here. The harvested grapes are spread out to dry, traditionally on straw mats, with the goal of evaporating most of the water in the fruit, thus concentrating grape sugars. The resulting wines are rich, complex and sweet. Red grapes are used for Umbria's Sagrantino Passito and Veneto's Recioto della Valpolicella, while whites are used for Tuscany's Vin Santo, Friuli's Picolit, and Recioto di Soave from Veneto. Classically made Recioto della Valpolicella and Vin Santo are produced in an oxidative style that increases complexity and depth in the finished wine. Picolit and Recioto di Soave are lighter in style with an accent on delicate fruit aromas and a buoyant sweetness.

The Achaia region of Greece, on the northern coast of the Peloponnesus, is home to the aromatic Mavrodaphne of Pátras.





This fortified wine is somewhat similar to Port, with a slightly oxidized character. Mavrodaphne, also the name of the grape, means “black laurel” and is a red, dark-skinned variety. The wine was invented by a man named Gustav Clauss in the 19th century, and is traditionally served as an aperitif with fruit or an almond biscuit.

On the Island of Cyprus, a wine called Commandaria has been treasured for centuries. Made of partially raisined Mavro (red) and Xynisteri (white) grapes in a strictly defined production area of just 14 villages, it is meant to be drunk in the spring after bottling and is prized for its honey-raisin flavor.

Virtually every other winemaking country has a dessert wine to call its own. Austria is famed for its Ausbruch. Spain makes late-harvest Monastrell, Malaga and PX. Australian “stickies” include Muscats and Tokays.

When pairing these wines with confectionary, it is important that the wine be sweeter than the food, otherwise unpleasant flavors may develop on the palate. Fruit desserts tend to pair best with fruity wines, while those with chocolate or caramel are terrific with oxidized wines. However, the best pairing of all may just be a full stomach and time to relax.


## Ah, Face Lifts.....
