

Steelers Preview

After a quick exit from the playoffs at the hands of the hated Baltimore Ravens – at Heinz Field, no less - capped an 11-5 season last year, the Steelers and their vast fandom were left longing for that seventh Super Bowl championship. Now it's time to try again.

Question marks have surrounded the defense for several years and if there was an uncertainty that changes needed to be made, that wild card loss proved it. Sure, people will blame the absence of one of the best backs in the NFL, Le'Veon Bell, and the lack of a running game and his presence in the passing game to move the sticks, but the biggest difference was the defense. The Ravens had it and the Steelers just didn't, allowing 30 points on their home turf.

Baltimore sacked Roethlisberger five times and picked him off twice while Pittsburgh's defenders barely laid a hand on Joe Flacco and were overmatched in the secondary.

Knowing this, General Manager Kevin Colbert and Head Coach Mike Tomlin addressed the defensive side of the ball in the draft, using six of the eight picks to fortify the defense. They also made a small trade that could pay big dividends, bringing in fourth year cornerback Brandon Boykin from Philadelphia. Boykin is one season removed from a six interception performance and has something to prove after a somewhat disappointing 2014. With Senquez Golson, their second round defensive back out for the foreseeable future after having shoulder surgery, Boykin gives the backfield more depth and a veteran ball hawk.

The defense will be a work in progress, that's been well documented, but how about the offense? Just 48 passing yards shy of 5,000 last season, I'm not sure how you can expect quarterback Ben Roethlisberger to do much more to lead his team to victory. However the offense might be even more explosive this season, believe it or not. Tall target Martavis Bryant didn't see the field until week seven in 2014 and exploded onto the scene with eight touchdowns in just ten games, averaging over 20 yards per catch. By all accounts he has gotten stronger over the offseason and can really stretch the field. Combine that with his focus in the film room and you can look for him to be the beneficiary of double coverage on Antonio Brown.

The backfield will be without Bell for the first two games of the season, due to his reduced suspension, and former Carolina Panther, DeAngelo Williams has the pedigree to step in and ease the loss of production as much as possible. Unfortunately, neither he nor Bell will have All-Pro Center Maurkice Pouncey creating holes and blocking downfield. Pouncey suffered a broken fibula above his left ankle in the preseason win over the Green Bay Packers. Experts say recovery from this injury could take eight weeks or more. So the Steelers will turn to Cody Wallace, a capable



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backup that started four games at center in 2013. That year the Steelers went 8-8 after a 0-4 start to the season without Pouncey. This year the linemen are more experienced and tight knit under sophomore Offensive Line Coach, Mike Munchak and better equipped to absorb the loss.

We'll find out sooner rather than later if these pieces fall into place as the black and gold travel to New England on Thursday, September 10th for the NFL season opener. This is the first of five national games showcasing the Steelers. On another Thursday night, Oct 1st the Ravens will be in town and the following week, they play the Chargers in San Diego on Monday Night Football. Two Sunday Night Football appearances round out the nationally televised games - at Indianapolis on Dec 6th and versus Cleveland three weeks later. It won't be an easy road to another postseason with nine games against playoff teams from last year, including both Super Bowl participants, but if the Steelers can improve in two areas, they might even win their first playoff game since 2010.

It's all about turnovers and sacks. There's been a steady improvement in the takeaway department since having a -10 turnover ratio in 2012. Last year they finally broke even and took the ball away as many times as they gave it away (20 times). Now to take the next step, I'm looking at the defense to pick a few more

passes. Heck, if the front seven gets more pressure, a lame duck or three could flutter someone's way. Which brings us to number two on the must improve list...SACKS. The once intimidating pass rush has taken down opposing quarterbacks at an alarmingly low rate the past four years and rank among the league's worst in sack totals. The onus falls on the defensive front and outside rushers to wreak havoc in pass defense. Linebackers James Harrison, Bud Dupree and Jarvis Jones all registered sacks in the preseason game against Green Bay where the Steelers had six total. An encouraging sign of more sacks to come? Yes.

Getting past the first two weeks against New England and San Francisco with at least one win will have the Steelers in good shape for Le'Veon Bell's return to action. If the defense can force turnovers and infiltrate the backfield, this season will shape up nicely for Pittsburgh, and that offense? That offense is going to be fun to watch. Here we go.

A HARD DAY

From Korea comes A HARD DAY; a true melodrama destined to be remade by an American director and studio.

The movie has a eclectic personality. It begins as a comedy, shifts to a thriller and then ends as an action romp. Screenwriter and Director Seong-hoon Kim establishes the plot with a series of incredibly stupid constructs.

Police detective Go Geon-soo, played by Sun-kyun Lee is attending the funeral of his mother. Leaving the funeral for a brief spell to attend to police work, he is involved in a hit and run and can't take the time to deal with the accident. His contacts are waiting. So, he takes the body and stashes it in the trunk of his car. Meanwhile, his team is being investigated by Internal Affairs, and when he returns to his mother's funeral, he receives a text alerting him that IA is coming to the funeral to search his car. Realizing he can't be caught with the body, he puts the dead man into the coffin with his mother.

While all this sounds ridiculous, it becomes even more bizarre when it's learned the dead man is wanted for murder and he may have already been dead when Go Geon-soo ran him over. This leads to a corrupt police drug ring, an eye witness to the hit and run and a framing of Go Geon-soo. The story becomes a thriller as the plot untwists and ends in action as protagonist and antagonist finally confront each other.

Many Asia films have proven to be sound groundwork for American remakes. One of the main problems with Korean films is editors usually don't know how to end them. In order to complete the normal and expected Korean philosophies, their movies generally run a good hour over the necessary length. A HARD DAY is the exception. It's a comfortable length at under two hours, and is a prime candidate for a reworking by an American director.

A HARD DAY is fun. It's not an award winner, but it is better than a lot of the tripe Hollywood has released this summer. Like many foreign films, it has a tiered release. A HARD DAY is already playing in the top 15 markets, but, unfortunately is not playing in the 'burgh. Keep your eyes open, you'll want to catch this one when it does get a Pittsburgh release, or when it comes available on home video or VOD.

ANT-MAN

Marvel has stumbled. Its latest superhero endeavor is not as solid as its previous endeavors. Part of the reason surely must be the ridiculousness of the main character. As superheroes go ANT-MAN is not one folk are lining up to be, even at the Comic-Con events.



When ANT-MAN was first announced in the Marvel lineup, it was listed as a comedy. The selection of Paul Rudd as the miniature hero was no fluke. Rudd was the principle scriptwriter as well as the star. This immediately conjured memories of the horrific treatment Seth Rogen gave to THE GREEN HORNET. Fans were not amused and certainly the fanboys had no desire to see their hero scoffed at for the sake of box office draw.


Marvel quickly responded to the social media outcry. The revamped the script, giving it more gravitas. Still, I laughed out loud more times during ANT-MAN than I did with MINIONS. Of humorous note are the battle sequence on the train layout with THOMAS THE TANK ENGINE and the Ant-Man's henchmen which includes a marvelous performance by Michael Pena as Luis. For years, I have heaped praise on Pena for his dramatic acting, but he truly shines as

comic relief here.

This version of ANT-MAN does not stray too far from comic book lore. It tells the story of Scott Lang, played by Rudd, who is the second incarnation of Ant-Man. The original, Hank Pym, is a mere shell of his former superhero self, and ready for retirement, in the guise of Michael Douglas. Trouble brews when Darren Cross, played by Corey Stoll, is on the verge of reproducing Pym's particle, which allows a man to shrink to ant size, but increase his strength by a whopping 200 percent. Pym wants his technology to remain hidden, while Cross has interested buyers in HYDRA. In order to stop Cross, Pym selects Scott as the new wearer of the Ant-Man costume and tasks him with saving the technology and the world. Added into the mix is Hope Pym, Hank's daughter, played by the alluring and seductive Evangeline Lilly. Hope is a character created in the Marvel Universe by Ron Frenz. Ron is a friend and has appeared on the show several times. His name, rightfully, appears in the end credits.

The cinematography by Russell Carpenter and the SFX helmed by Shepard Frankel and Marcus Rowland are exceptional. The sub-atomic sequence and all scenes with the army of ants are amazing on screen. The fight scenes, which incorporate Ant-Man shifting from normal to small size are exceptionally well staged, especially since Rudd couldn't fight his way out of a paper bag.

ANT-MAN is slow, especially during the film's first 45 minutes. It is rather funny for a ridiculous character, and there are many



tie-ins to other Marvel characters and storylines. There are also hidden scenes during the credits, so be sure to stay in your seat until the house lights are turned on.

WILL POLITICAL CORRECTNESS KILL SUPERHEROES?

While they are bona fide hits at the box office, the death of the superhero movie may come, not by Kryptonite, but by political correctness.

Graphic novels have always delved into current topics and social mores as subplots to the traditional good vs. evil tomes. Recently, political correctness, has seeped its way into the world of Superman, Batman and Spider-Man. It is doing so at the chagrin of movie-goers and is alienating the majority fan base.

One of the most embarrassing escapades involved actor Andrew Garfield. He was a young, unproven actor, who was given the opportunity of a life time when he was handed the role of Peter Parker/Spider-Man. His first endeavor, *THE AMAZING SPIDER-MAN*, was a box office hit and proved there was life for the character after Toby Maguire. After the first film, and continuing during the production of the second, Garfield went on a rant about Spidey as the first gay superhero. He wanted to portray the Web Head as a conflicted youth willing to explore further his sexual orientation. He even went so far as to suggest the role of Mary Jane Watson, Parker's girlfriend and eventual wife in the comics, be changed to Michael Watson and be played by a black man. In one social media moment, Garfield infused homosexuality and bi-racial relationships to a character who has neither trait. Marvel Studios was quick to silence Garfield. They distanced themselves from the actor and informed him he had lost the part. Another reboot of Spidey is due in 2017, without Garfield.

While Garfield was attempting to infuse social engineering into an established character, the fans and geeks who follow Spider-Man were aghast. They did not want their superhero altered to fit a social construct. Remember, these are the same fans who love alternative universe stories, but this obvious manipulation to cater to a cultural minority was beyond acceptable.

A similar situation is occurring this summer with the reboot of *FANTASTIC FOUR*. In the original story, two of the team members, Sue and Johnny Storm, aka The

Invisible Woman and the Human Torch, are brother and sister. In the newest version, Johnny, played by Michael B. Jordan, is black and Sue, played by Kate Mara is white. During a recent interview with a radio station in Atlanta, the two stars were asked about the striking racial contrast between the superhero siblings. Neither actor had viable explanations and fumbled embarrassingly over their answers. Without a believable rationale in the script for the change, movie-goers became suspect of the reboot and it is showing at the box office.

The social engineers of the Hollywood Liberal Looney Left (H3L) feel a great disservice has been done to every minority imagined because too many of the well-known and accepted superheroes are white. Even if they are from an alien race, they are still white. The H3L sees this as a gross injustice and seeks to correct it, regardless of what fans and movie-goers think.

This is a mistake. For proof, look no further than the less than stellar returns for *ANT-MAN* and the horrific opening weekend box office results for *FANTASTIC FOUR*. *FANTASTIC FOUR* performed dismally on both the foreign and domestic box offices its opening week, earning less than a third of its expected take.

If the social engineers want minority superheroes, it's a simple process of creating good ones. Both Blade and Spawn are black superheroes. They were created that way. Wesley Snipes and Michael Jai White played the characters on film, respectively. Odd that no one, for the sake of diversity, suggested the reboot of Blade should star Jason Statham. The notion is ludicrous, just like the haphazard shifting of cultural and racial identities with established characters. Tossed around as possibilities already are a Latino Spider-Man, a black James Bond, a female Thor, a gay bi-racial Captain America, a female Captain Marvel and a lesbian Wonder Woman.

Colleague, friend and fellow film critic Ed Blank often pined for the demise of the superhero movie, a genre he despises. His wish may come true, not because of viewers waning interest, but due to the political correctness infused by the studios.



Pamela Berlin directs this inspiring Tony and Pulitzer Prize-winning play based on a Jewish girl's journal written during World War II.

Pittsburgh Public Theater's season begins with the timeless drama *The Diary of Anne Frank*, by Frances Goodrich and Albert Hackett. Directed by Pamela Berlin (*The Glass Menagerie*, *Clybourne Park*, *Red*), *The Diary of Anne Frank* runs September 24 – October 25, 2015 at the O'Reilly Theater, Pittsburgh Public Theater's home in the heart of Downtown's Cultural District. Anne Frank: The Diary of a Young Girl, published in the United States in 1952, contained the authentic journal entries of a Jewish teenager who lived in hiding during the Holocaust. The public was instantly enthralled with Anne's writing. She was funny, and thoughtful, and most of all brave. Her vivid descriptions evoked what life was like during this monstrous time. The book was adapted for the stage and opened on Broadway in 1955, where it became an immediate hit. The Public's new production is a revival of this Tony and Pulitzer Prize-winner.


Remy Zaken, starring as Anne Frank, is best known for her performance in the original production of *Spring Awakening* on Broadway. Randy Kovitz and Chris Laitta play her mother and father, and Erika Cuenca appears as her sister, Margot. Four other people hid with the Franks in an Amsterdam attic. David Wohl, who appeared as Freud in The Public's production of *Freud's Last Session*, plays Mr. Van Daan. Public Theater favorite Helena Ruoti is his wife, and newcomer David Jackson plays their son, Peter. Public Theater veteran Daniel Krell is Mr. Dussel. Appearing as the two people who brought them food and news are Ken Bolden and Kelsey Carthew.

Unfolding throughout the play are the daily lives of this group in their closed quarters. There are moments of great tension, and also periods of almost normalcy. Anne has her school work



and the pictures of movie stars she's cut out of magazines. She argues with her mother, but also creates a joyous Hanukkah for her extended family. Although food is in short supply, as time goes by she outgrows her clothes and notices changes in her body. She confides her thoughts to her best friend, her diary, and its survival has allowed the world to know the spirit and courage of this remarkable girl.

The designers for *The Diary of Anne Frank* are Suzanne Chesney (Costumes), John Lasiter (Lighting), and Zach Moore (Sound). Scenic Designer Michael Schweikardt, who is creating the iconic attic setting for the production, last designed *My Fair Lady* at Pittsburgh Public Theater. Fred Noel is the Production Stage Manager and Spencer Whale is the Assistant Stage Manager.

So why have Britsburgh in September? Well, the start date of Britsburgh is set to coincide with Queen Elizabeth II overtaking Queen Victoria as Great Britain's longest-reigning monarch. To help the Queen and England celebrate this momentous achievement, Pittsburgh is going Britsburgh.

Queen Elizabeth was born on April 21st, 1926 and came to power on February 6th, 1952. Her coronation service the following year was the first ever to be televised. Along with reigning the longest, the Queen is also the longest-lived British monarch and is the world's oldest reigning monarch, as well as the longest-reigning female monarch in all of history.

Celebrating With Fuller's

Fuller's Beer

Brewed since the 1950s, London Pride is, well, the pride of Fuller's Brewery. This well-rounded beer comes in at a sessionable 4.7% ABV and is a great example of an English Pale Ale. London Pride pours a clear copper color and has both the taste and aroma of a nice bready malt with some nice



toffee in the middle. A great, full-bodied beer that's amazingly easy to drink, London Pride is possibly the best way to celebrate Britsburgh in a bottle or on draft.

If you like your beers extra special, then Fuller's ESB is just about perfect. This Extra Special Bitter (ESB) comes in at 5.9% ABV and features a sweet caramel malt body with a slight herbal bitterness in the finish. Expect some light toffee, caramel, and even a hint of dried fruit in the aroma, and bread, raisins, and a herbal undertone in the taste. Overall, ESBs are easy to drink and great to pair with a good, meaty dish. Seek out the draft.

It's the time of year when dark beers are coming back into

popularity, and in the Britsburgh spirit, Fuller's has their London Porter to offer. This 5.4% ABV beer is an award-winning example of the historic English style of beer. Smooth, creamy, and with just enough chocolate and coffee to balance the flavors out, London Porter is exactly the beer you'd expect to order in a classic English pub.

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Getting Crafty With Wyndridge Farm Brewing

Farmhouse breweries are not a new idea. For hundreds of years beer has been brewed on farms throughout the world. These farmhouse breweries are responsible for many amazing styles of beer we love today, and the methods created in barns on farms large and small are mimicked still today. While brewing has come pretty far since those days, the idea of farmhouse breweries is still one that brings up ideas of quality, freshness, and amazing beers.

Few breweries today can call themselves a true farmhouse brewery, but Wyndridge Farm Brewing in Dallastown, PA is one of them. Located in South Central PA, Wyndridge Farm Brewery is home to their lineup of craft ciders and beers. The rustic wood of the brewery stands in stark contrast to the high-tech brewhouse that lives there, reinforcing the idea of traditional farmhouse brewing brought into the modern age.

The Brewery

Wyndridge Farm Brewing opened their doors to the public in 2014, and in that short amount of time they have grown to include a 30 barrel, four vessel automated brewhouse that's capable of producing 12,000 barrels of beer per year. Not one to be left to kegging beer alone, they also have a bottling line capable of filling 3,000 bottles per hour!

All the brewing equipment in the world won't do you any good unless you have a team of talented people working on it and behind the scenes to get everything going smoothly. At Wyndridge Farm Brewery this is done by a family of beer and cider experts, even if some of them aren't related.

On the ownership side you have the Groff family consisting of Steve, Julie, and Taylor, followed by head brewer Stephen Foster and head cider maker Scott Topel. Pete Koelsch rounds out the motley crew with his engineering skills to keep everything working as expected. Together they make some of the best beer and cider to come out of the area, and are all extremely glad to finally be sharing it with us in Pittsburgh.



Crafty Beers

When it comes down to it a brewery is generally judged by the quality of their beer. Thankfully, Wyndridge has a solid lineup of beers to go along with their great story and prepossessing location.

10 Point Ale – This golden ale is an easy drinking, refreshing sessionable beer that's extremely approachable for those just getting into craft beer. 10 Point Ale is available year round and while it's approachable and easy to drink, it remains unique enough for craft beer veterans to enjoy over and over again, too.

Wyndridge uses American 2 row, caramel, and Munich malts for the base of this beer and relies on Perle hops for the bittering and aroma. 10 Point Ale comes in at 4.8% ABV with an IBU rating of 20.

Laughing Crow IPA – The ubiquitous India Pale Ale is easily the most popular style of craft beer today, and Wyndridge Brewing's Laughing Crow IPA is a shining example. Laughing Crow uses a hefty late addition hopping to give the beer tons of hop aroma without making the beer too bitter.

Laughing Crow also relies on local water with a high mineral content to give the beer a crisp taste and dry finish so there's no cloying sweetness hiding in the background. The malt bill for Laughing Crow includes 2-row, Vienna, and Aromatic malts, but the hop bill is where this beer truly shines. Wyndridge uses Zythos, Falconers Flight, Cascade, Belma, Chinook, and Galena hops to craft a beer that has tropical fruit and citrus notes with a refreshing bitterness that's far from overpowering. Laughing Crow IPA comes in at 6.5% ABV and a respectable 40 IBU.

Barn Dog Chocolate Vanilla Imperial Porter – The porter style of beer is a unique one that's come in and out of popularity






for more than 100 years, and is seeing a resurgence today as brewers add new and interesting flavor profiles to this classic style.

Wyndridge Brewing's Barndog Porter features fresh cut vanilla beans and cacao nibs from Ghana to give the porter a complex yet approachable taste that truly does the porter style justice. The vanilla is very present on the nose, with the middle and finish dominated by silky smooth dark chocolate notes.

Barn Dog features a malt bill consisting of 2 row, chocolate, Crafa III, caramel, and flaked barley along with a top-secret hop bill that gives the beer a bitterness that's present but far from dominating. Barn Dog comes in at 7% ABV and 24 IBU.

Crafty Ciders

Craft ciders are the single fastest growing segment in adult beverages, making them a pretty hot commodity. With mass-produced ciders flooding the market, it can be difficult to find a cider that's crafted with care by a family-owned brewery.




Wyndridge offers a lineup of ciders for every palate out there, even the die-hard IPA fan that might not initially try a cider.

Dry-Hopped Hard Apple Cider - If hops are your thing, the Wyndridge's Hopped Hard Apple Cider is for you. Their hopped cider is a blend of crisp apples and bitter hops that works surprisingly well together.

Wyndridge uses locally pressed apples, yeast, and hops to make their cider a truly local treat. The result of this blending of hops and apples is a fresh, clean hopped cider that's semisweet at 5.5% ABV.

Cranberry Hard Cider - If tartness is your thing, then Wyndridge's Cranberry Hard Cider is just for you. This cider starts with their base cider with a splash of fresh cranberry juice added. The light tartness of the cranberry offsets and



compliments the sweetness of the apples. Cranberry Hard Cider is a year-round cider that's 5.5% ABV.

Original Hard Cider - You always remember your first, and for Wyndridge their Original Hard Cider is their first offering to be sold. This cider is fermented with champagne yeast to give it a dry finish while keeping enough sweetness to make it refreshing and light.

Original Hard Cider is 5.5% ABV and is always made from freshly-pressed apples that are sourced locally, never from concentrate. Drink this cider chilled, but forego the ice, you'll be glad you did.

TRAVEL: Branson Ozark Paradise And Beyond

Nestled in the hills and hollows of the southern Missouri Ozarks boasts a treasure trove of spellbinding natural wonders, and within this evocative setting are some of the best musical performances available in the heartland. But before we delve into Branson's amplified entertainment genres, a visit just thirty miles southwest of the town on the Missouri-Arkansas border is necessary, a trip to the awe-inspiring Dogwood Canyon nature preserve.

This 10,000-acre nature park, owned by Bass Pro Shop Founder Johnny Morris, will mesmerize you with its endless beauty. Morris, a devout conservationist, formed a foundation to ensure the preservation of this breathtaking preserve.

Dogwood Canyon boasts unspoiled natural beauty, and at every turn there is a new discovery. Natural highlights include cascading waterfalls, and miles of winding spring-fed streams; in addition, endangered wildlife like majestic bison, elk and longhorns roam freely in the rolling prairie hills. Amidst all of this wonder is the "Great Spirit Rock Shelter", a bluff waterfall where archeologists discovered some of Missouri's oldest human remains.

This is also fly fishing heaven! There are several stunning blue-green lakes and ponds, including the extraordinary Glory Hole, all with a bounty of rainbow and golden trout swimming in water so clear you can see them at the bottom. If you don't know how to fly fish, no problem, you can partake in fly fishing school or opt to take a self-guided catch-and-release or catch-and-keep fishing adventure.

While immersing yourself in all the canyon has to offer, you will discover the spectacular Hope Wilderness Chapel, an 1800's replica made of pine logs and other local materials. Once inside, you can easily lose yourself as you bask in wonder over the unparalleled view of a waterfall plunging over towering cliffs. The back wall of this chapel is made entirely of windows through which you can see this natural marvel.

So what is the best way to experience Dogwood Canyon? There's a plethora of choices, including an awesome open air tram tour, jeep ride, or by foot. If those don't suit you, peddle your way through the canyon on a bike, hop in a saddle for a leisurely horseback ride, or take off on a Segway. While you explore this preserve you will cross a number of bridges, several formed by natural stone, and one long wooden covered bridge made by Amish craftsmen. The latter is a favorite of Dogwood Canyon visitors.



After working up an appetite from all of this splendor and adventure, head to the Dogwood Canyon's outdoor café for a mouthwatering bison or elk burger; however, for those not as adventuresome, there are several other delicious menu items including sandwiches and salads. Want something extra-special? Take the family on a chuck wagon dinner excursion where cowboys will entertain you with music by the campfire.

Back in Branson, meanwhile, are the aforementioned wonders of the music world. The town, which has been labeled the live music capital of the universe, no longer hosts mostly country and hillbilly music. High-energy concerts coupled with international acts are also satisfying audiences hungry for entertainment day and night. From Dolly Parton's Dixie Stampede to The Dublin Irish Tenors and The Celtic Ladies, there are literally hundreds of shows from which to choose, and the tickets won't break your bank.

A Branson musical phenomenon which has inspired visitors for more than half a century is the numerous jaw-dropping family-talent that lights up the Ozark stages. Among them is the legendary The Baldknobbers Jamboree, a show that began in the 1950s and is still running today. In contrast, there's also the high-energy Haygoods--all siblings--who deliver tight

harmonizing and unforgettable high-tech light performances. The Duttons, which includes multi-talent members of three generations, blows away the audience with steaming hot, stellar violin music. For even more family shows, there's the spectacular Presleys' Country Jubilee (no relation to Elvis) which is said by some to be the standard by which other shows are judged; three generations perform a variety of music styles along with comedic skits.

(Tip: Check online show reviews and the actual show websites to get even more details on performances.)

But there's even more to do in these parts that will only add to this spectacular and memorable experience. After being awed by outdoor excursions and dazzled by some of the best performers in the country, there are still plenty of additional options for must-see and one-of-a-kind experiences.

You cannot visit Branson without heading to the award-winning Silver Dollar City, an 1800s- styled theme park and essentially a re-creation of a frontier town (Fact: The Beverly Hillbillies recorded an episode here). You will feel like you stepped back in time because this place oozes nostalgia. There are dozens of exciting rides, award-winning live entertainment



and working craftsmen, to name just a few highlights.

The newest addition to the park is Fireman's Landing, which features two acres of rides designed to entertain all ages. The area harkens back to the days of fire brigades, and features rides like Fire Spotter (soaring balloons), FireFall (free-fall drop) and Up The Ladder (tower drop for younger riders).

Perhaps the most amazing discovery at Silver Dollar City actually lies hundreds of feet below the the park: the fascinating Marvel Cave, which is a National Natural Landmark. There is evidence that (1) the Spanish explored this cave in 1541 and (2) the Osage Indians knew about its existence in the early 16th century.

If that's not enough for you to do at Silver Dollar City, there's even a Midwest Living Culinary and Crafts School highlighted by live cooking demonstrations. You will feel so at home with the warm and welcoming instructor, Debbie Dance Uhrig, who grew up in her grandma's kitchen, and will teach you how to bake the best flaky pastry crust in town.

For an emotional encounter with history, board the Titanic at Branson's Titanic Museum Attraction. This museum has 400 artifacts from passengers and crew members of the ill-fated vessel, plus a captivating replica of the Titanic's grand staircase.





Upon entering, a crew member will give you a boarding pass and background information of an actual passenger or crew member's name; as you leave, you will learn the personal stories of those on board this ship and the fate of your crew member or passenger.

Branson also offers a first-class nostalgic ride aboard the Branson Scenic Railway. When you hop on board these refurbished railroad cars, you can enjoy a journey the same way passengers did 50 years ago. With its panoramic views of the countryside, it's a great experience for both the whole family or for those wanting a romantic candle-lit dinner.

An exciting way to tour Branson on land and water is by riding the Ducks, an amphibious vehicle reminiscent of those used during WWII. The ride starts with a scenic tour of Branson, after which passengers splash down for a thrilling ride into Table Rock Lake or Lake Taneycomo.

Here's a couple more "don't miss" attractions: Shoppers may want to check out Dick's Oldtime 5 & 10, which has been a Branson landmark for decades. This century-old store is filled wall-to-wall nostalgic items, and you can easily spend a couple hours in the place. Folks with appetites, meanwhile, absolutely need to visit Mel's Hard Luck Diner where singing servers entertainingly take your orders and serve your meals.

After all this fun and adventure, you'll want a good night's rest, so why not stay at a hotel that is centrally located amid even more attractions in the heart of historic downtown Branson

and on Lake Taneycomo to boot? Check-in to one of the two newly-renovated Hiltons of Branson which are both a stone's throw away from the other at the Branson Landing. Here you can shop till you drop, enjoy some spirits, dine, and cast your fishing pole.

While there, tempt your tastebuds at one of Branson's newest fine dining experiences, the Level 2 Steakhouse; it's a place where you can enjoy mouth-watering, 28-day aged corn-fed Midwest beef seared in a 1600-degree infrared oven, plus heritage Missouri pork and fresh seafood from Hawaii. Chef Jeff Luzius, who served his culinary delights for both Emerald Lagasse and legendary rock star John Cougar Melancamp, is sure to please even the most discerning palate.

A unique feature at this establishment is their signature steak knives collection from which you can choose from one of five cutting tools. Be sure to ask how you can have your name engraved on your chosen bit of cutlery and then locked up for your return throughout your lifetime.

Wet your whistle with their hand-crafted cocktails and signature drinks. They serve up their own version of southern Missouri specialty drinks like the refreshing L2 Long Island Lemonade and their Spring Spritzer. Level 2 Steakhouse has an extensive wine list and you can take part in their "wine flight" offering where you can try up to 16 different wines.

Branch Out and Plant this Fall With TreeVitalize Pittsburgh

soon celebrate the planting of its 25,000th tree in November. WPC manages TreeVitalize Pittsburgh with the help of its partners – Tree Pittsburgh, Allegheny County, City of Pittsburgh and the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.

Get Involved With TreeVitalize Pittsburgh!

1. Volunteer for a Tree Planting. Each spring and fall, volunteers from across Pittsburgh grab a shovel and help plant trees with WPC and its partners. During this year's fall planting season that begins in late October, TreeVitalize Pittsburgh will surpass the planting of its 25,000 tree.

On planting days, TreeVitalize Pittsburgh and Tree Pittsburgh staffers demonstrate how to safely move and place a tree, cut the burlap and cage away from the root ball and plant the tree at the proper depth.

2. Care for Newly Planted Trees. With 25,000 new trees in the region, it's important to remember that these trees require continued care until roots establish. That's where Tree Tenders

Not long ago, Pittsburgh was known for its smoke and soot-covered landscape. Today, more than 40,000 trees line the streets and parks of the city of Pittsburgh, transforming the city into what residents and visitors now know as one of "the most livable" cities in America. And the benefits are not just aesthetic – trees provide \$4.9 million in benefits to Pittsburgh, ranging from increased property values to managing storm water capture in our streets.

TreeVitalize Pittsburgh has been working to increase the tree cover, also referred to as tree canopy, in our urban parks, corridors and neighborhoods since 2008. The Western Pennsylvania Conservancy (WPC) works with its TreeVitalize partners to plant trees in Pittsburgh neighborhoods and Allegheny County municipalities in need to improve the environment, quality of life and scenic beauty in the region.

Thanks to thousands of volunteers, TreeVitalize Pittsburgh will





come in. Tree Tenders are trained volunteers certified to help weed, mulch, water and prune trees planted in their neighborhoods. All TreeVitalize Pittsburgh planting projects require at least one certified Tree Tender for every 10 trees planted.

Individuals interested in becoming a Tree Tender can register for a training course offered by Tree Pittsburgh. The course covers everything from tree biology to planting and pruning. More information can be found at treepittsburgh.org/become-tree-tender.

3. Plant in Your Backyard. Home or business-owners can reap the added benefits of trees in their own backyard. Properly placed trees can provide energy savings from heating and cooling, and increase residential property values. Those interested in add new trees to their property should take care to research the type of tree before planting, says WPC Community Outreach Assistant Marah Vecenie. "Each tree planted should be appropriate for its specific location. You don't want to plant a large shade tree under a utility line, or plant an invasive tree or species that is susceptible to disease or insects."

For example, callery pear, Norway maple, white poplar and Chinese elm trees are just a few commonly planted invasive species. If you're looking to plant this fall, WPC's urban forestry staff commonly plants the following trees:


- Kentucky coffee tree
- Baldcypress
- Flowering cherry

"In the fall, avoid species like birch, magnolia, paperback maple, blackgum and bur oak because they don't transplant well at this time of year," explained Vecenie.

4. Donate. TreeVitalize Pittsburgh and WPC's other urban forestry efforts are funded by foundations, businesses and individuals. You can invest in trees for neighborhoods throughout Pittsburgh. A \$30 donation will provide a yard of mulch for a community tree planting. Or, for only \$100 you can fund thirty tree stakes, and \$200 would support the cost of one street tree. 
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Blind Custodian

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
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
