


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ARE YOU READY FOR SOME FOOTBALL?

It's that time of year again. Break out your football jerseys and beer koozies people, football is taking center stage. Of course baseball season is heading down the homestretch, with the Pirates' playoff push in full labor, but there's nothing like the beginning of the football season. The week by week battle, the living and dying with each game and Monday morning quarterbacking that surrounds the water coolers and social media sites, it's all here for our consumption.

Football is emotional. Long scoring strikes exalt us. Lost fumbles at the goal line crush us. Penalties negating big plays convince us the game is rigged. It's that emotional undercurrent that makes Sundays in the fall an event. Whether tailgating in the parking lots, huddled around the television at home with your family and friends, or in a sports bar where there are no strangers in Steeler Nation, football brings us together.

This year, it certainly seems like the Steelers have it together and are primed for a deep playoff run with an electric offense and an improving defense that just has to hold teams to less than 27 points, since Ben Roethlisberger and company will score 30 a game. Maybe that's exaggerated. But not by much. Last season the offense averaged 26.4 points, fourth best in the NFL. Many of the key cogs from that team, who was a fumble away from the AFC Championship game, are returning and despite losing deep threat Martavis Bryant to a year-long suspension and Le'Veon Bell to a three gamer, there are guys to step in and

mitigate those losses.

When the season opens on Monday night September 12th in Washington DC, there will be plenty of names you are familiar with, but some you are not. While the roster won't be set at 53 players until after this writing, there's a strong possibility – if not a sure one – that these guys will be on it. Get to know a little more about them.

Linebacker Tyler Matakevich: Filed under the little engine that could, Matakevich was an All-American defensive standout for Temple, winning the Bednarik Award and Bronco Nagurski Award as college football's most outstanding defensive player, despite his small stature and lack of speed. Those measurables turned teams off in the draft, allowing the Steelers to pick him up in the last round. The immeasurables are what the team likes in Matakevich, especially linebackers coach, Jerry Olsavsky, who sees a lot of himself in the rookie. Olsavsky said that it's a speed game, but if you are in the right place at the right time, you can negate below average speed. That's how Tyler is. Sounds like a hard-working, blue collar backer to me. A Steeler.

Wide Receiver Eli Rogers: In his second year, Rogers is taking advantage of the opportunity afforded him by Bryant's suspension, turning heads not just in the return game but on offense as well. The 23-year-old receiver was undrafted out of Louisville in 2015 and spent last season on injured reserve. This year, it looks like Rogers will be the team's slot receiver as



Markus Wheaton moves into WR2 territory. With an uncanny resemblance in build to Antonio Brown, the young pass catcher is making the coaches take notice.

Tight End Xavier Grimble: With Ladarius Green's status in question, the journeyman out of USC will get a shot. Grimble was undrafted in 2014 and landed on the Steelers' practice squad last year. He has shown a knack for run blocking and absorbing big hits in the passing game. In the first year of the post Heath Miller era, the team will look for several players to fill his role, and they'll take a gamble on Grimble. Although he'll probably head

back to the practice squad when Green is healthy.

Cornerback Montell Garner: As was the case with Grimble, Garner gets a look due to injury. With Senquez Golson having foot surgery and missing at least half the season, the Steelers need depth. They'll turn to Garner to work in the nickel defense. A rookie out of South Alabama, he was signed as an undrafted free agent by the Rams, then cut late, spending last season without a team. His hold on a roster spot is tenuous, however and might be edged out by a veteran signing.

Defensive End L.T. Walton: The team's sixth round pick in the






2015 draft, Walton will provide depth on a shallow defensive line, made even shallower if Captain Cam Heyward can't get on the field after suffering a high ankle sprain in the Steelers' preseason game at New Orleans. A former offensive lineman, Walton is athletic and has good vision. He played in six games as a rookie, but didn't have much impact. We'll see how much difference a year of experience makes when spent next to veterans like Heyward.

The deadline to whittle the roster down from 75 players to the final 53 is September 3rd so much can change, especially with 31 other teams also whittling down, and more players becoming available. No matter who makes the squad, we know this. The Steelers are one of the favorites in the AFC and the season will be an exciting one. So hold onto your hardhats people. Here we go.

STAR TREK: BEYOND

The original Star Trek franchise is known for its keen, sometimes misshaped, cultural observations and commentaries. Pittsburgh's own Frank Gorshin starred in one of the better episodes, concerning racial prejudice, playing characters who had split back and white faces. But, the overriding social commentary in STAR TREK: BEYOND is nothing more than a watered down cheerleading rant for the Progressive Movement. The rest of the movie is Director Justin Lin pretending he is doing another Fast and Furious movie with starships.

Captain James Kirk, played again by Chris Pine, is in the third year of the U.S.S. Enterprise's five-year mission, and he's bored with all the scientific gathering and analysis. He is so lackadaisical since stopping the genetically enhanced madman Kahn, that he is considering a promotion to a desk job.

While he and the crew are on shore leave at the Yorktown, a deep space "snow globe ready to burst", a ship arrives with a frantic SOS. The ship's captain claims her research vessel is in distress and her crew injured, on the opposite side of a nebula, in deep space. Before vetting the claim, the crew of the Enterprise is dispatched to help those in need.

Undaunted, the Enterprise embarks on its rescue mission only to discover it's all a ruse by yet another madman, Krall, played by Idris Elba, determined to rule the universe. His main malfunction is his lack of belief in the Progressive Movement. He wants the status quo, filled with conflict and war. It's not long before the Enterprise is reduced to rubble and the crew is left to its own innovativeness to save the day. For a spaceship

as famous as The Millennium Falcon, The Nostromo, and The Botany Bay, Paramount producers seem all too eager to blow the Enterprise up.

Returning are: Pine; Karl Urban, as Dr. McCoy; Simon Pegg, as Montgomery Scott; Zoe Saldana as Uhura; Pittsburgh's Zachary Quinto as Spock; the late Anton Yelchin as Chekov. Joining the cast this time around are: Elba; Sofia Boutella as Jaylah; and Joe Taslim as Manas.

KEY SCENES TO LOOK FOR:

- 1. Transportation of Bones and Spock
- 2. The togst between Bones and Kirk
- 3. Filtering the scanners for Vulcan metals

STAR TREK: BEYOND is SFX eye candy. Interspersed with the action is an acceptable, though stogy story. The studio, initially was not impressed with the script. They asked Pegg to lend his talents as part of the writing team. In the film's final credits, he is listed as the prime screenwriter. His influence is noticeable, since STAR TREK: BEYOND is infused with myriad humorous moments. This is a good thing, since the rest of the plot is rather mundane.

Of all the new Star Trek characters, Pegg's version of Montgomery Scott and Karl Urban's of Dr. Leonard McCoy are the best. In fact, at the risk of upsetting Trekkers everywhere, I'll go as far to say Urban's portrayal of Bones surpasses DeForrest Kelley. Fortunately, these two characters dominate the screen and have some of the best scenes. Pegg even gives a well-deserved nod to screenwriter Nicholas Myers. Myers wrote the two best scripts in the original Star Trek film series, STAR TREK II: THE WRATH OF KAHN, and STAR TREK VI: THE



UNDISCOVERED COUNTRY. In both, he quoted classic literary works, including Shakespeare. There is a dramatic scene where Spock quotes the Bard, and not coincidentally, it's Bones who makes the observation.

The sequences are cut too quickly and too many shots are close-ups, giving a disjointed sense to the scene. Kirk and Scotty's escape from the saucer section, the penetration into the Yorktown and the gravity swirls in the ventilation tower are all a blur of colors and shapes, suitable for small children. Part of the problem is the shot options of Cinematographer Stephen F. Windon, and the other part is allowing a posse to edit the film. A keener sense of linear continuity is always achieved with one editor.

STAR TREK: BEYOND is fun, primarily for Pegg and Urban. And certainly no one would ever expect Rhianna and Public Enemy to play an integral role in the salvation of mankind. So, there are a few surprises. Despite convoluted race scenes with space ships, a watered down social commentary surrounding unity and an antagonist with no creativity, STAR TREK: BEYOND fits into this new timeline, though it does come in third place. It's certainly not as good as STAR TREK: INTO THE DARKNESS, but then, it's tough to beat Benedict Cumberbatch.

SUICIDE SQUAD

Ah, the joy of being totally surprised by a film. It is truly one of the highlights of being a film critic. I must admit, I held no hope at all for SUICIDE SQUAD. Most of the characters are second rate, at best and it just seemed to be a ploy to capitalize on the superhero craze in movies with minor characters. When the troupe was introduced on ARROW, they were appropriate for TV and for a B-class hero. I wasn't convinced they were worthy enough for the big screen treatment.

Trailers for the film revealed Margot Robbie as Harley Quinn, flaunting her curves, but lacking the high cackling heavily accented New York voice generally associated with the character. Despite the missing trademark, she actually pulls the part off rather well. As does Jared Leto who interpreted The Joker as a tattooed, grill-grinning joke (pardon the pun); but he too, serves



the part with aplomb.

All told, Director and Writer David Ayer has put together the best popcorn picture of this summer. Combined with the efforts of Editor John Gilroy, who moves this film with the best pace in recent viewing history, Ayers presents a rousing superhero film that will quickly let viewers and DC fans forget the lackluster BATMAN V. SUPERMAN.

The star of SUICIDE SQUAD is, without question, Jerome Chen. He is the Visual Effects Supervisor and he gives the film a classy and eloquent visage. From the sewers of Midland to the doomsday device of the Enchantress, SUICIDE SQUAD is topnotch alternating from gritty Crime Alley type darkness to other world STAR TREK destructiveness.

The concept is one prevalent in films since THE DIRTY DOZEN; utilize a group of criminal misfits to band together for the common good, and of course, saving the world. In the film's only weakness, the participants of the SUICIDE SQUAD are introduced rather quickly in the film's beginning. The introductions are so fast, they give the opening reels a hurried, rushed aura.

The squad is comprised of Harley Quinn (Robbie), the looney-tune psychiatrist from Arkham Asylum, who disastrously falls in love with the Joker. While Robbie dominates many of the scenes, and of course the film's trailers, she is over-shadowed by Cara Delevingne. Delevingne plays two roles, Dr. June Moone and her evil counterpart, The Enchantress. Her performance is easily the best in the film.

Will Smith plays Deadshot. Originally, Deadshot is a mutilated, cold-blooded assassin. But, because this is Will Smith, the character is restructured for him to be a kind-hearted family man assassin. It doesn't fit the character, and I'm sure true Deadshot fans will be appauled, but remember this is Will Smith and it says in his contract, he can play a bad guy, but he can never be a true antagonist.

The rest of the Squad includes: Jai Courtney, as Boomerang (he comes from a land down under); Jay Hernandez as Diablo, DC's



answer to the Human Torch; and Adewle Akinnuoye-Agbaie as Killer Croc. Ezra Miller makes a cameo as The Flash and Ben Affleck has a minor part as Batman, though his appearance and performance are uncredited.

Characters noteworthy, but not in the squad are Joel Kinneman as Col. Rick Flagg, Leto and Viola Davis as Amanda Waller. Davis is brutal. As head or ARGOS, she is nastier than the members of SUICIDE SQUAD. This is a great deviation for Davis who has been toiling in benevolent roles for too long. She shines by going over to the dark side and should be given Best Supporting Actress consideration.

KEY SCENES TO LOOK FOR:

- 1. The bar scene.
- 2. The Joker's wedding
- 3. The End Credits scene.

SUICIDE SQUAD is filled with action. The action and fight supervisor is Richard Norton. Norton is an Australian martial artist who is very close friends with Chuck Norris. He starred in most of Norris' action films and even made appearances on WALKER, TEXAS RANGER. He is probably best remembered as the masked assassin who battled Norris in THE OCTAGON. He puts together action sequences that make JASON BOURNE look like a fifth grade video project.

SUICIDE SQUAD is tremendous fun. I entered the press screening with much trepidation and ended up totally enjoying the experience. I could easily watch this film again, and would definitely make it part of my home video collection. It is the epitome of excellence in film entertainment, and as such wins the coveted FIST OF FIORE AWARD for 2016. You're going to like this one; be sure to see it on the big screen.

JASON BOURNE

The troubles that plagued the previous Jason Bourne films, also hinder this latest endeavor from Director and Screenwriter Paul Greengrass, except this time, all of those cinematic ills are on steroids.

Our story begins when Nicky Parsons, played by Julia Stiles, one of Jason Bourne's comrades, hacks into the CIA server and downloads all of the agency's black ops material. She contacts Bourne because the material reveals even more secrets about his past. Here, the script turns sour.

All through the Bourne series, Jason is trekking to self-discovery. Batman and Spider-Man didn't go through this much angst. Greengrass demonstrates lack of creativity in resorting to the same plot lines and same antagonists as the previous films. Any reader of the Robert Ludlum novels knows there is more to the character than these one dimensional premises contain.

So, well into movie number four, Bourne is still trying to discern new elements of his past. This causes CIA Director Robert Dewey, played by Tommy Lee Jones, a bit of consternation because he doesn't want the black ops made public. He enlists two associates, Heather Lee, played by Alicia Vikander and "The Asset" played by Vincent Cassel.

Jones has little more than a cameo role, in which he displays all the manic foibles Greengrass wants associated with the CIA. Vikander, who burst on the cinematic scene in EX MACHINA, offers a rather mundane performance. Cassel is great. I do not recall ever seeing this man in a bad performance. He holds the entire mishmash together and is the only reason I didn't walk out on this debacle.

KEY SCENES TO LOOK FOR:

1. The end credits.

This film is an absolute nightmare to watch. Greengrass combines with Cinematographer Barry Ackroyd and Editor Christopher Rouse to create a hodgepodge of nonsensical visual elements.

The film's action sequences consistently cross the 180-degree line. In addition, when the cross is made, the shot is slightly out of focus and then quickly adjusts. Ackroyd uses, almost exclusively, tight close-up shots, which totally ruin all the fine work by Fight Choreographer Roger Yuan. Yuan knows how to stage fight scenes. He has worked on BLADE, with Wesley Snipes; SPAWN, with Michael Jai White; and on this year's WARCRAFT, which is one of the year's better films.

In addition, Simon Crane serves as Second Unit Director, and he is known throughout the industry for his stunt work and fight choreography. The combination of Yuan and Crane should be dynamic. Not content with ruining their work, Ackroyd then incorporates WWE zooms on the action. Rouse then takes the close-up shots and quick cuts all of them. The results are action



sequences that flash and blur, like a child's cartoon, but cannot be deciphered in any aspect of reality.

With the combination of anti-American sentiment, horrible cinematography and editing, JASON BOURNE is a celluloid disaster.

HELL OR HIGH WATER

Westerns are one genre of film simply not made often enough. I'm not sure what alienated Hollywood producers from Westerns. Not many are produced and it's a shame because as a film genre, they are generally quite entertaining. This is why I had so much fun with HELL OR HIGH WATER. It is, essentially, a modern day Western. It features the stogy, die-hard lawman in the vein of Wyatt Earp, the citizen popular criminals reminiscent of Jesse James, and of course the ultimate antagonists, the large banks and their unscrupulous barons. Combine these elements with incredibly fine performances by Jeff Bridges, Chris Pine and Ben Foster and HELL OR HIGH WATER proves to be an adult film worth watching.

Pine and Foster are the Howard brothers. Upon the death of their mother, the leeches from the bank move in to foreclose on her farm, offering a mere pittance of its value. Toby is a ranch hand who has no marketable skills off the farm, while Tanner is fresh from prison, where he served a ten-year sentence for murder.

Pine elevates his thespian skills to an adult level, not having to worry about aggressive phaser fire or warp drive engines. Foster is in top form and could be considered for supporting actor considerations. Relegated mostly to secondary roles, Foster never fails to deliver stunning performances, whether it is an adult drama, like HELL OR HIGH WATER, or a cheesy sci-fi yarn with space zombies. The man has talent.

Not happy about the muscling of the Midland Texas Bank, the



boys opt to begin a series of bank robberies to halt the farm's foreclosure. This catches the eye of Texas Ranger Marcus Hamilton, played by Bridges. With his partner Alberto Parker, played by Gil Birmingham, he seeks to stop the boys and return law and order to this small part of Texas. Though he has a small part, Birmingham offers his best, making his character most endearing.

- 1. THE DINER
- 2. THE POV SHOT AROUND THE S-CURVE
- 3. THE FINAL CONVERSATION

At the heart of HELL OR HIGH WATER is a simple tale everyone can relate to: a small, insignificant man seeking justice in a system rigged for the wealthy and powerful. The underdog battling and beating the system. The cast is in top form. Cinematographer Giles Nuttgens offers yeoman, but effective shots and screenwriter Taylor Sheridan delivers a script intended for adults in an industry that caters to the Millennials.

HANDS OF STONE

HANDS OF STONE is another in a continuing stream of boxing films Hollywood is determined to produce. While other sports films are periodic, boxing is enjoying a massive entrenchment in the Hollywood staples. CREED, SOUTHPAW, HANDS OF STONE and WE BLEED FOR THIS will all be released within 11 months of each other. No other sport enjoys that type of celluloid celebrity.

HANDS OF STONE is about Robert Duran, for that was his moniker in the ring. But Scriptwriter and Director Jonathan Jakubowicz actually approaches the story from the aspect of Duran's trainer, Ray Arcel, played by Robert DeNiro. HANDS

OF STONE is really his story; how he trained over 20 champion fighters in his career, how he fell in disfavor with the mob over televising boxing, and how he made a triumphant return to the sport when he discovered Duran. But no one knows Arcel; they do know Duran. So Jakubowicz spends script pages bouncing from one character to another, never really giving Arcel the main spotlight and diminishing the relationship between the two men.

Edgar Ramierez plays Duran and does a credible job. Unfortunately, he shares a lot of screen time with DeNiro and Rueben Blades, who plays Carlos Eleta, Duran's shady, greedy manager. Blades is solid and presents Eleta in a fashion that makes viewers want Duran to punch him out instead of Sugar Ray Leonard. Leonard, by the way, is played by Usher, the only pop singer to date to rhyme the words floor and blow in his hit "Yeah". As an actor, Usher is a pretty good singer. He plays Leonard like a black Howdy Doody, constantly grinning and bobbing his head. He does, however have a love scene with Janelle Davidson, so I guess all is well in the end.

KEY SCENES TO LOOK FOR:

- 1. The bar smackdown
- 2. The talk in the corner
- 3. The fight with Moore

Neither Ramierez or Usher can fight. I'm sure they went through hours of arduous training, but it is not Leonard-Duran caliber. Cinematographer Miguel loann Littin Menz (see, this name is ridiculous - two names and done) covers the faux pas by utilizing close-up shots and quick editing. Though not as confusing as the camera work in JASON BOURNE, it is still obvious there is no real boxing going on in the ring. Gylenhaal's rounds and all of Stallone's were considerably better, and those





guys couldn't fight either.

HANDS OF STONE is edited sporadically. While Arcel and Duran supposedly have this intense relationship, it is not presented well. More emphasis is placed on the two fights with Leonard. As a result, when the film's final reels are displayed it is difficult to comprehend the emotional bond between the two. It is understandable why Editor Ethan Maniquis approached the film in this manner. In order to pace the film well, a lot of the byplay and bonding is short-circuited and the audience is forced to do a lot of reading between the scenes.

One advantage of having both Usher and Blades in the film is both are accomplished musicians. They perform individually and together on a majority of the film's soundtrack. Its good music. It may sound odd to say about a boxing film, but personally I would like to have seen more scenes on the development of the relationship between Arcel and Duran, and less of the family and political scenarios used to set the stage. HANDS OF STONE is an average film, but one that had so much more potential, especially with DeNiro on set.

DON'T BREATHE

As a film critic, there are certain signposts that signal a film's worthiness. For example, if a film is made through the Asylum production studio, you can bank on cheesy effects, a substandard plot and a formulaic tale with an ending worthy of a groan. The same can be said of Ghost House Pictures and Stage 6. So when DON'T BREATHE, the latest thriller to hit the screens opened as a co-production of Stage 6 and Ghost House, I immediately changed my outlook for the film and was not disappointed when it unfolded. Unfortunately, my guests at the screening had no clue what was coming, and did not have an enjoyable evening.

DON'T BREATHE has a plethora of problems, however one of them is not star Steven Lang. Lang holds the film together and his performance as The Blind Man is commendable. Lang, who has been playing bit parts for decades, made a bit of a wave as Increase Mather, the infamous witch hunter and puritan on WGN's original series SALEM. Lang's character portrayal was so good, they brought him back in season two, even though he died in season one. You can do that when you're dealing with the supernatural. He is proving to be the spotlight of the second season as well. So it is probably no great surprise he dominates the screen in DON'T BREATHE. Though he has limited dialogue, his mere presence, and some creative make-up for his eyes, help provide most of the thrills in the film.

Where the film goes south is in the script. Writer and Director Fede Alvarez gives the audience no one to like. It concerns three youths who make a living by robbing houses tied to a certain security outfit. The trio is made up of the nerd, Alex, who has all the security company connections, played by Dylan Minnette; the gangster wannabe, Money, played by Daniel Zovatto; and the tramp love interest, Rocky, played by Jane Levy. The storyline prompts the audience to empathize with Rocky, but she is just not a likable character. Alvarez tries to win over the audience by making her a single mother concerned about her child, and presenting her as the product of an abusive drug slut mom, but none of these social concerns make her any more likeable. Through most of the film you want The Blind Man to kill everyone. By the end of the movie, you would rather all these characters die.

KEY SCENES TO LOOK FOR:

- 1. The cracked window
- 2. The dog in the car

As I watched DON'T BREATHE I kept thinking of Jason Statham in THE TRANSPORTER. Rule number one – never look in the package. Rule number two – never change the deal. Our pitiful trio have a great system working and then decide to break all their established rules for one possible big score. Their entire plan is so flawed it reeks of stupidity. Who decides to search a house while the owner is in it? Really?

Just when you think you have a handle on this film, Alvarez turns it down another dead end. Each turn proves disastrous. By the time the insemination scene occurs, there is nothing left, save for a few standard jump ploys.

All told, DON'T BREATHE is a decent thriller, but one more worthy of Netflix than a theatre ticket price. It is, however, a great date movie, especially if you're looking to have someone special clinging on to you for dear life. In that case, it is worth the price of admission, and could make for an interesting evening.



to find one that's more universally loved that Bell's Brewery Best Brown Ale. With hints of caramel and cocoa, this well-balanced beer has a deep malt body that's balanced out nicely by the generous use of American hops. 5.8% ABV

Buffalo Bill's Brewery - Pumpkin: America's Original Pumpkin Ale was first brewed in 1985. Made with real pumpkin, it has a golden amber color, and the sweet aroma of pumpkin pie. This brew is perfect for Fall, Halloween, and Thanksgiving. Pumpkin Ale is available from August through November. 6% ABV

Dogfish Head Craft Brewery - Punkin' Ale: A full-bodied brown ale with smooth hints of pumpkin and brown sugar. Dogfish Head brews Punkin Ale with pumpkin meat, brown sugar and spices. As the season cools, this is the perfect beer to warm up with. 7% ABV

Dogfish Head Craft Brewery – Seaquenchale: A beer doesn't have to be dark and spicy to be a fall beer, and this is shown best with the newest beer in Dogfish Head's seasonal lineup: Seaquenchale. This beer is classified as a sour session ale that features lime juice, lime peel, salt, black limes, and coriander. A closer look at Seaquenchale will show a mix between a Kolsch, Berliner Weisse, and a Gose that is perfectly mated to give a refreshing sour taste that's not overly sour while being exactly what we need to send summer off in style. 4.9% ABV

Dogfish Head Craft Brewery - Red and White: Originally released in 2006, Dogfish Head's Red and White is a big Belgianstyle witbier that's brewed with coriander and orange peel, then fermented with pinot noir grape juice. Think of Red and White as a refreshing mix of the ideas behind both beer and wine while staying safely on the side of beer. 10% ABV

East End Brewing Company - Big Hop Harvest: There's fresh, then there's Big Hop Harvest fresh. This IPA starts its life just like any other batch of East End Brewing's Big Hop IPA and gets so much better from there. Big Hop Harvest gets more malt, more hops, and more ABV. Hops are driven from the farm they're grown on and added to the beer the same day they're picked, making Big Hop Harvest just about the freshest beer you'll get all year.

Erie Brewing Company - Johnny Rails Pumpkin: A blonde based ale. It is a fruit beer with delicious flavor, a great nose, and the perfect poise of pumpkin and spice. This flavorful brew is sure to get you in the fall spirit. 6.5% ABV

Hacker-Pschorr Brewery - Oktoberfest: When you're having an Oktoberfest-style beer, you might as well make it a true Oktoberfest brew, which Hacker-Pschorr's version definitely is. This beer is brewed in Munich for the annual Oktoberfest celebration and features a malt body that's complimented by a slight hoppy note in the finish. 5.8% ABV


Heavy Seas Beer - Greater Pumpkin: In the most worthy of pumpkin patches and during the silence of the midnight hour, the Greater Pumpkin rises up and pours a rich deep and orange color. Heady aromas of bourbon, cinnamon, ginger, allspice and clove linger over the thick white head of this giant brew. Its love at first sip as the full malt body, dominated by British crystal malt, brown sugar and pumpkin, slowly washes over your tongue. Bourbon barrel aging rounds out the flavors with notes of oak, vanilla, and bourbon. 10% ABV

Lancaster Brewing Company - Baked Pumpkin: Have your pie and drink it too! Bold flavor with a deep amber color, our big Baked Pumpkin Ale is sure to remind you of Grandma's homemade pumpkin pie. 7.3% ABV

Lancaster Brewing Company - Oktoberfest: Oktoberfest uses seven different malts and three varieties of imported and domestic hops, as well as authentic Bavarian lager yeast. Light in copper color, this beer is full-bodied with a nice malt sweetness. 5.5% ABV

North Country Brewing Company - Late Night Pumpkin: For the fall season, North Country brews their Late Night Pumpkin with a healthy dose of pumpkin, spice, and of course this is all done late at night, when the pumpkins taste their best. Coming in at 6.1% ABV with a gold color and a nice spiced character, Late Night Pumpkin is a canned beer you definitely need to try. 6.1% ABV

Ofter Creek Brewing Company - Overgrown Ale: Dripping with dank, American hop flavors and aromas, Overgrown is balanced by a subtle, sweet malt backbone that takes a back seat to the bountiful hop additions. A celebration of the hop-growing season, this one will tangle up your taste buds. 5.5% ABV



Smuttynose Brewing Company - Pumpkin Ale: This beer is a homage to the craft and heritage of America's brewers. Recipes calling for the use of pumpkins in beer date back to early colonial times, when brewers sought to extend their supply of costly imported malt with locally grown ingredients, such as squash and "pompions." in that spirit, Smuttynose brews this ale with the addition of pumpkin to the mash, along with traditional spices to create a delicious American original. 6.35% ABV

Spring House Brewing Company - Braaaiins Pumpkin:

Available this year for the first time in cans, the "pumpkin ale for Zombies" is brewed with generous amounts of pumpkin added right to the mash, giving the beer a subtle pumpkin flavor that's accentuated by traditional autumn spices that has a bold malt body and a nice, crisp finish. 8.5% ABV

Stoudt's Brewery - Oktoberfest: This medium-bodied amber beer elegantly combines a touch of malty sweetness with a pleasingly subtle aromatic hop character. 5% ABV







Tröegs Independent Brewery - Hop Knife: Hop Knife Harvest Ale recognizes the meticulous, time-honored tradition of hand-harvesting hops at the peak of maturity. Troegs HopCyclone process creates an inward spiral of hop dispersal during fermentation, releasing a bounty of citrus, resin and tropical aromas. 6.2% ABV

Tröegs Independent Brewery - Master of Pumpkins: Pulling the strings of great beer and smashing some pumpkins in the process is a pretty amazing beer from The Troegs brothers out of Hershey, PA. Master of Pumpkin is brewed with native Pennsylvania neck pumpkins that're harvested just a few miles away from the brewery, and is combined with traditional pie spices that's so good it's almost blinding. 7.5% ABV

Victory Brewing Company - Festbier: Highly aromatic and full-bodied, this novel pale ale delivers a fresh hop flavor like no other. Its secret? Fresh hops piled into the boiling kettle just hours after their harvest. With many more of their essential oils intact, these 'wet' hops add glorious middle notes of juicy, fruit and tea-like bite to play off of its lightly toasted malt character deliciously. 5.8% ABV

Victory Brewing Company - Moonglow: Weizenbocks are an amazing style of beer. Originating in Germany, these beers use German hops and wheat beer yeast. This gives Moonglow distinct flavors of clove, vanilla, and honey along with a light hop character. Much like our favorite doctor's box, this beer is definitely bigger on the inside. 8.7% ABV

Weyerbacher Brewing Company - Mellow Monks: Belgianstyle beers have a surprisingly complex character that's hard to beat. Reminiscent of Weyerbacher's Merry Monks beer, this mellow sibling is much more sessionable and features notes of apple, pear, and banana. 4.5% ABV

Weyerbacher Brewing Company - Imperial Pumpkin: This high gravity pumpkin ale is the mother of all pumpkin ales. It is heartier, spicier, and more "caramelly" and "pumpkiny" than its faint brethren! Anderson Valley added lots of pumpkin along with cinnamon, nutmeg and a touch of cardamom and clove giving this beer a spicy, full-bodied flavor. This truly is an Imperial Pumpkin Ale. 8% ABV


Weyerbacher Brewing Company - Sunday Morning Stout:

Sometimes you want a light golden ale or a bright, hoppy pale ale, but it's hard to argue that sometimes a big, strong stout is exactly what you need, and Weyerbacher is happy to help. Weyerbacher's Sunday Morning Stout features aromas of roasted coffee and bourbon that pair perfectly with flavors of chocolate, roasted malt, vanilla, and caramel, and at 11.3% ABV, it'll make your Sunday morning pretty great. 11.3% ABV

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QA with Cyndi Lauper (Music & Lyrics for Kinky Boots)

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Q – Is it true that Rodgers and Hammerstein were your initial influences?

CL – Yeah. Them, and Leonard Bernstein and Peter in the Wolf and Debussy and Tchaikovsky and things that my mother played. And a lot of opera!

Q – So, how did this musical come about?

CL – Well, it came to me from Harvey.

Q – And how do you know Harvey?

CL – Well, I'm a huge fan of Harvey and I know him because he's a very strong leader in the [LGBT] community that I'm a friend and family member of. And then, one time he wanted me to come and sing for him. He was getting an award. And it was really a lovely award; for the work that he did and recognizing and what he did. He wanted me to come and sing and I just got to know him more and more then. And I also sought him out to work on a project that I wanted to do about my relationship with my grandmother and the women in my family.

And we were talking – just the way he looks at things, just the way he views a story, the way he tells a story. And if you're watching Kinky Boots, you can see what a wonderful storyteller he is. And, much to my luck, I was brought into this by him and he's basically put me under his wing. He tells me this, he tells me that. Or even Jerry Mitchell [the director]\ tells me "I want this, I want that" and I go away and try and do what they want, because I feel that they're great at their craft. And I'm so honored to be working with them – don't tell them, I wouldn't want them to get a big head! No, I'm kidding. I really think they're brilliant.

Q – When you're writing a pop song, you don't have to worry about what some character named Charlie who has inherited a factory is thinking. Or a drag queen...

CL – No, no, no, no, no! Whatever story you ARE doing, you have to worry about. In a pop song you have to be very economical with words. And you have to have your story – a beginning, middle and end – because if the song goes nowhere, well, what are you talking about?

Everybody asks the question about pop songs and theater songs. I just think that, in some ways, they're very similar and in other ways, they're not. You need to be economical, you have to say something simply. I believe you still can have poetry. Now, Harvey believes it has to be in the most stupid, simple terms, but I think he believes in poetry! Me, I've been writing poetry all my life, so I kinda like poetry.

It's the biggest collaboration I've ever experienced. How many people are in the band? How many people are onstage? How many people are doing sound? Who's Charlie? Who's Lola? It's a

big, big thing. There's an orchestrator. There's everything!

Q – Obviously, the story spoke to you.

CL- It's a story about an outsider. You know, I have a kid and I have a husband. And I've watched their relationship now for fifteen years. When you're a parent, after a while, you start to see; you start to see when they imitate the father's walk. And you see the two of them walking away and you see the kid walking exactly like his dad. And then you see the year where they don't even want to talk to their dad; it's not cool. It's funny, I made "Girls Just Want to Be Fun" very famous. Now, I see the other side of the coin. When this came along, the biggest draw was that every parent goes through this and every

biggest draw was that every parent goes through this and every kid goes through this, and the disappointment for a kid to feel like they failed their parents is so huge, whether you're gay or straight. And the fact that the guy's a drag queen, to me, is inconsequential – except for the fact that he's so different from this factory bloke; that they can come together, overcome their differences, outside and in, for the greater good. And it's based on a true story.

It almost seems like a perfect storm, the three of us coming together at this time, doing this project and all the people who came and worked along with us on this. And I know that Daryl (Roth) called Harvey and Jerry Mitchell to do this and Harvey's brother suggested me. And it seemed like the perfect time.

Q - Which were the first songs you wrote?

CL – "The Most Beautiful Thing in the World" and "Sex is in the Heel." "The Most Beautiful Thing" is the first thing I embarked on doing. And that I did in the craziest way. In the beginning, I wanted to be by myself. I knew I'd have to bring in a musician, eventually. But I went to some guy with Pro Tools and I started mixing. I studied. I listened, a lot, a lot. And I took all the things I loved the best and put them together. I loved My Fair Lady, I loved the father. I liked the dance hall feel. That's why I have, "you can tell about a fella from his shoes," because you can! You can tell how they walk, you can tell their style, or that isn't their style.

And I could relate to the story. So I started writing the father first and then after the father I wrote – I don't have my phone on me, but I must still have Nicola's (sings) "to new beginnings" on my iPhone

Q – I do want to talk about one song. "I'm Not My Father's Son," which, I think, is one of the most beautiful songs you've ever written.

CL - Thank you.

Q – And it's such a moving moment. I just wonder if you can talk

a little bit about that.

CL – Well, they sent Stephen Oremus (music director) to play the chorus for me. And I collaborated with him on it, but I had written the chorus and I was trying to figure out how to play it for him. And I told you, I was walking around the gym, 'cuz I wanted to be alone. And I just started singing (she sings) "I'm not my father's son." And I thought that was so sad. And I thought, "I'm not the image of what he dreamed of." You know? "With the strength of Sparta," 'cuz I kept watching these little boys in hockey and they looked like little Spartans! "And the patience of Job," because my husband has the patience of Job. And then, I thought, "still couldn't be the one/to echo what he'd done/and mirror what was not in me." I didn't know anything yet, except I was lost in my own world. And then I thought it'd be nice if there was just water dripping or a clock ticking, and him say, "When I was just a kid/everything I did was to be like him/under my skin," 'cuz that's what little boys are like, right?

Q – It seems to me that this song is really the crux of what this show is all about.

CL - Well, they loved it!

Q – In Kinky Boots, you're dealing with working class people.

CL – And I am working class. And I understand them. I think the working class people that I grew up watching were very Shakespearean. And I think that all the people in my neighborhood inspired me, because they were should-couldawoulda people.

Q – And you get that in this show. Every person who works in that factory, you sort of get a sense of...

CL – Yeah, of who they are! They're great actors – that's one thing. They're great and they're funny, but they're human. And they very much look like they could work in a factory. And you should credit Jerry Mitchell for that.

Q – Yeah. You know, what's beautiful about this piece is it is a Broadway musical – it's got that uplift and joy. The end of the first act and second act just bring you to this happy place. But, it's also intimate.

CL – But the end of the first act, Lola is converting the factory. They're going to church!

Because we're all different, we brought in what we know in and we all worked together to make it right – to make you laugh and cry. And Harvey is such a good storyteller and so is Jerry. One minute you're bawling your eyes out and the next minute, it's hilarious. So, I think it's a perfect storm and I think I'm just so lucky. And I feel so blessed to be walked through by the Lion, the Scarecrow and the Tin Man! They have a lot of heart and they're great storytellers and I feel very blessed to be among them.

Q – Well, thank you and best of luck.

CL – Thank you.

Designing the boots for Kinky Boots

In a show called Kinky Boots, "you've gotta get the boots right," says Gregg Barnes, costume and footwear designer for the Tony Award-winning musical. The show, based on a real story and independent film, about a failing English shoe factory which turned its fortunes around by niche-marketing sturdy boots for drag artists, has become a sold-out Broadway phenomenon. With a book by Harvey Fierstein and a Tony winning score by pop icon Cyndi Lauper, Kinky Boots relies heavily on its visual designs, and, of course, those boots by Barnes. The designer says it was quite a challenge to create those thigh-high boots, with six inch stiletto heels. "What's really funny about our experience with Kinky Boots is that my team, and the cobblers who made the boots, we had the exact same story as in the musical," explains Barnes. "Everything they talk about in terms of reinforcing the heel and all of that stuff, we had the same learning curve!"

Those boots need to be durable, to support the six-foot tall dancers doing elaborate and joyous dance routines. Says Barnes:" We're asking them to do slam splits and quick changes, being carted up and down stairs in baskets. And we have to make them look as if they're brand new every night, but survive eight shows a week." Barnes adds that, after months of experimentation and broken heels, they ultimately came up with designs that are so reliable, they've barely had to replace any boots in the musical's Broadway run of over a year. And Barnes says he never tires of experiencing the enthusiasm audiences have shown for both his kinky boots and the show itself. "You know, it's amazing," says Barnes. "You can feel it walking into that theater. I think the audience comes so primed to have this joyous experience and it always rewards that."



"Rockin" Little Rock

Little Rock is far from little, and no one knows that more than the locals who will repeatedly tell you it's a "big-little city". Little Rock may have gotten its name from French explorers who identified the area by a small rock formation they called "La Petite Roche" on the Arkansas River in 1799, but those early settlers would not recognize the land they discovered so long ago. This city, a mini-metropolis, has developed by leaps and bounds over the last 20 years, and offers visitors more than ever before.

One thing is for sure, Little Rock is chockfull of political lure; it's a city from where governmental deals and national historical events have rocked the nation. Add to its lengthy repertoires a myriad of award-winning restaurants, entertainment venues, museums and outdoor adventure, and you've got a prime vacation destination.

Once you arrive, make a bee-line straight to the historic luxury Capitol Hotel, which opened in 1873, and is ironically known as the "Front Porch of Little Rock." Attention to detail is an understatement in this refined oasis which has a quiet grace about it. The Capitol Hotel's grand staircase is said to be a "sweet spot" for political hopefuls announcing their candidacies. (Tip: The Capitol Hotel's Chuck Magill and Stefan Piraux, the chief concierge, exude Little Rock hospitality and are full of knowledge about both the hotel and the city).

With its marble columns, grand hallways, towering ceilings and floor-to-ceiling windows in every room, you can't help but feel the history in the Capitol Hotel. The elevator is so large that, according to legend, it was constructed to easily accommodate President Grant and his horse. By the way, the historic State Capitol, the oldest state capitol building west of the Mississippi River and the location of President Clinton's election night celebration in 1992, is just down the block.

Before you head out to explore the highlights of Little Rock, make a stop at the hotel's Capitol Bar and Grill, a place where political deals have been struck for more than a century. Here you can sip a legendary cocktail and tempt your taste buds with award-winning provincial comfort dishes. (Recommended: The Best Spiced Pecans and Pimento Cheese appetizers, followed by the one of the best hamburgers in Little Rock, and finished off with some amazing house-made banana pudding). The



cocktail menu, meanwhile, is full of historical libations like The Seersucker and hand-crafted cocktails with a new twist like the Crop Duster.

Who needs the White House? The Clinton Presidential Center, which is the presidential library of Bill Clinton, showcases fascinating artifacts from his presidency including full-scale replicas of the Clinton-era Oval Office and Cabinet Room. Here you can find out how it feels to sit in the Commander in Chief's chair (be sure to take a photo).

There are 79,000 artifacts, 80 million documents, and Bill Clinton's

Presidential limousine is on display. There's even a heart-warming letter from Mother Teresa (canonized a saint September 4th) addressed to the first lady. An array of aweinspiring and one-of-a-kind gifts given to President Clinton are on display; however, for those objects not on exhibit, museum visitors can get a sneak peek inside the vaults to see more phenomenal possessions.




President Clinton's story unfolds before your eyes from his campaigns to his inaugurations to his notable policy-making, and it's all revealed through a myriad of items, photographs and videos that are sure to capture your attention. While the exhibit really brings to life President Clinton's presidency, it also intimately shows visitors a real example of how the US President lives while leading the country.

Who needs to go to the Olympic Games? You can see some of the most inspiring artifacts used in the Olympics up close and personal at the Clinton Presidential Center. The temporary exhibit called, American Champions: The Quest for Olympic Glory, includes memorabilia featuring dozens of American Olympic athletes including a U.S. Olympic Hockey Team hockey stick and puck used to win the Silver medal (also on display) in the 2010 Vancouver Olympic Games. You can also experience what it feels like to sit inside the 4-man bobsled piloted by Steven Holcom at the 2010 Games in Vancouver; this bobsled is a replica of the Night Train which was used to win the first gold medal for an American bobsledding team since 1948.

The Quest for Olympic Glory also includes artifacts dating back nearly three-quarters of a century. The Silver medal and Team USA sweater and track jersey worn by Clyde Scott in the 1948 Olympic Games in London, Peggy Fleming's figure skating costume from the 1968 Winter Olympic Games in Grenoble, France, and the 1936 Western Union Telegram to President Franklin D. Roosevelt on the selection of Jesse Owens as the head of the American Olympic 'welcome home parade' are also part of the exhibit. This display showing the strength of the human spirit through the Olympics is sure to inspire everyone. You can easily spend an entire day at the Clinton Center, so be sure to carve out a lot of time to enjoy this unmatched experience, highlighted by both permanent and temporary exhibits.

While at the Clinton Center, be sure to check out the 30-acre Clinton Presidential Park surrounding the museum on the riverfront. The site was once part of the rundowned warehouse district and has been revitalized with pathways and gardens thanks to President Clinton's vision. Be sure to cross the historic 1899 Rock Island Railroad Bridge, which was converted into a pedestrian bridge crossing and offers scenic views of the historic Arkansas River.

Little Rock has come a long way since the days of European settlers who tried to limit Quapaw Indians' alcohol consumption and the era of destroying whiskey distilleries. In fact, just a few





blocks away from the Clinton Presidential Park, the whiskey is overflowing. Here lies the Rock Town Distillery, Arkansas' first legal distillery since prohibition! In fact, in a complete paradox, while half of Arkansas' 75 counties are dry, Little Rock is pouring out its spirits and promoting its locally produced libations with a tasting tour.

Rock Town, which was named one of the ten best Southern Distillery Tours by USA Today, is one of several stops on Greater Little Rock's Locally Labeled Spirits Passport Tour. This artisan craft distillery is where you will find the coveted award-winning 2015 American Micro Whiskey of the Year, awarded in the revered Jim Murry's Whiskey Bible.

Arkansas native Phil Brandon is the founder of Rock Town, and he offers award-winning distillery tours seven days a week, and by tour's end, you'll taste all of Rock Town's award winning spirits. Phil will take you through the whole process of making spirits from grain to glass, and uncovers the genesis of bourbon, vodka and gin. But the Locally Labeled spirit tour extends beyond the Rock Town Distillery stop; it includes nearly a dozen homegrown craft breweries and wineries all of which feature beverages that are sure to please.

One of the most fascinating and unusual stops in Little Rock is the ESSE Purse Museum, the only purse museum in America

and one of only three in the world. This private museum takes an intimate look at the evolution of purses and its personal contents from American women for more than a century. Viewing the development of handbag styles and the intimate items women carried in their purses during each extraordinary decade gives one a true testament and perspective of how different eras affected women's lives. This is a 'don't miss', one-of-a-kind experience, and it's all in Little Rock!

The ESSE purse museum unveils how purses evolved from an accessory primarily designed to hold ladies' coins to an essential carrier of necessary contents reflective of a woman's core. The ESSE purse museum also reveals how purses became a fashion statement, showpieces to costly labeled designer bags. The myriad of styles, kaleidoscope of colors and materials on stage are truly an eye-full.

While the museum is a 20th century gallery, for a contemporary exhibit of the purses various women carry today and their contents the ESSE Purse Project blog continues this intriguing show online. The project encourages women to send in photos of their handbags, their contents, their age and occupations, and to share it all with the world via the internet.

While you can't buy a purse from the museum exhibit, you can purchase a handbag at the museum's store. You can choose from their collection of vintage handbags to handmade originals made of leathers, canvass and metals.

For a moving historical experience, about a mile away from the ESSE Purse Museum, you can walk up the same steps as the "Little Rock Nine" did at Central High School in 1957. The national historic landmark and proposed world heritage site also has an extensive visitor center across the street which offers interactive exhibits and details on the Little Rock Nine's place in civil rights history. (Time tip: You will need a couple hours to





really enjoy the depths of the visitor center's exhibit.)

In case you didn't know, Little Rock is a secret foodie town with a plethora of award-winning tasty dining options. In addition to the Capitol Hotel's Capitol Bar and Grill, be sure to enjoy the array of culinary offerings in Little Rock's South Main District. This must-experience of an up-and -coming neighborhood boasts unmatched restaurants and shops that make sustainability and locally-sourced products a top priority.

A visit to Little Rock is incomplete without a visit to The Root Café, a local favorite which uses local meats, eggs, bread, produce, cheese and nuts. The Root has an award-winning breakfast and lunch and its homey atmosphere exudes character with antiques and collectables. Nearly every Saturday morning you will find Little Rock Mayor Mark Stodola, who like the plethora of locals, enjoys the quality savory dishes.

Once you open its street-cornered door, you instantly realize you are in a special place. Grab a seat at the marble counter of this neighborhood soda fountain and ice cream bar located inside The Green Corner Store & Soda Fountain. There's nothing like the mouthwatering taste of a freshly churned scoop of ice cream and baked goods made with farm-fresh dairy products



and local quality ingredients. 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
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Catholic Parrots





First Grade Teacher


